FRESHMAN FOOTBALL TEAM LOSES FIRST GAME 7-0

Bentley Scores in Last Few Seconds of Play

The freshman football team went down to defeat yesterday afternoon on Tech Field at the hands of the eleven representing the Bentley School of Accounting and Finance, 7-0.

Bentley's score came in the last few seconds of play when Anderson, their left end, scooped up a freshman fumble in the middle of the field and raced for a touchdown. W. Resnick kicked the goal.

It looked as though Bentley would score in the first period when a blocked kick gave them the ball on the 1923 fifteen yard mark, but three tries at the fresh line failed to gain and a forward pass, though successful, did not net the required distance.

The freshmen failed to show any offensive strength until the final quarter when they worked the ball from their own forty yard line to Bentley's twenty-five, only to lose the ball on downs.

The team as a whole showed up well, Brantingham playing an excellent game at quarter, while Boris led the way in the line plays, his stature contributing much toward the teams opposition.

ELECT OFFICERS OF M. I. T. A. A.

Elections led off the calendar for the first meeting of the M. I. T. A. A., which was held on the afternoon of October 10. On the nomination of Mr. McKay, Paul N. Anderson '21, was unanimously elected president. The Vice-Presidency went to Garvin Bawden '21, also by unanimous choice, ballots being necessitated only in the election of a secretary. Richmond Skinner '21 and Herman Broockman '20, were the nominees for this office, the lot falling to Mr. Skinner.

The new president had several announcements for the association. Desks have been provided for the managers in the association's office in Walker Memorial. The football teams playing on field day will be provided with socks and jerseys, arrangements having been made to have measurements taken as soon as the teams are picked.

Considerable discussion was provoked by a motion by Mr. Addicks proposing boxing contests on field day, the winning contestants to be given their class numerals, but their victories not to be reckoned in the scoring. The motion met with much opposition, and as finally, passed provided only for exhibition matches, and included the restriction that any knockout on Nov. 7 will automatically prohibit boxing on future field days.

Other business transacted by the meeting included the awarding of the cup to J. R. Elliott '22 for winning the spring tennis tournament, and steps to secure officials for the football game

field day. It was decided to take up with the Advisory Committee the proposal to lay a board track in the empty airplane hangar.

T. C. A. EMPLOYMENT BUREAU HAS JOBS FOR NEEDY MEN

First Meeting Advisory Board Held in Walker

Despite the fact that the T. C. A. has settled everyone comfortably in the rooms it has secured, it has not let up its efforts to help the student body. The employment bureau is getting busy, under the leadership of B. Williams '21, and will give a statement later as to the number of positions it has supplied to students needing financial help. There are many places open. Among them is a position for a man experienced in carpenter and contracting work to teach a man to read blue prints.

The first meeting of the advisory board was held in Walker at noon Thursday, when the following members were present, O. R. Ziegler '00, chairman, H. S. Ford, treasurer, Dean Burton and R. Snow '22. The meeting consisted of a review of the work done during the past month, and the new business. It was decided to emphasize the real service work, such as the book exchange and employment bureau.

The book exchange is enabling students to get their books at a saving of forty per cent. Anyone desiring to sell books which are not being used may dispose of them at the T. C. A. office thereby helping himself and other students.

The employment bureau wishes to ask anyone who knows of any vacant positions that could be filled by the Technology men to report at the office. The bureau also requests that firms desiring any kind of work file their wants at the office and thereby help the bureau determine what sort of work is wanted.

There are at present opportunities for volunteer workers. A student is wanted to take charge of a club of small boys, in Dorchester. The Boston Y. M. C. A. wants two men to act as assistant scout masters, and the Cambridge Y. M. C. A. would like to have a fellow or two to 'lead boys' clubs of that institution. Men interested should apply at T. C. R. O. T. C. BEGINS WORK

Lectures Given in Coast Artillery and Infantry

The Reserve Officers Training Corps has begun work in earnest. During the past week classes in both Sophomore and freshman groups have been held, dealing with Coast Artillery service and infantry regulations respectively.

The Sophomores under Lieut. Colonel Green have received instruction in artillery work in general. The lectures have dealt also with the more detailed work such as the study of the light of projectiles and the construction of the gun carriage.

In his talks to the freshman class, Major Clarke has dwelt chiefly on military customs, and courtesy, including the respect due to the flag, the Star Spangled Banner, and various ceremonies such as flag raising, funerals and guard mount. The Major also spoke about the organization of the R. O. T. C. in general, the work which will be required and some of the features of the course. These include reels of "movies" which will be shown from time to time in connection with the lectures.

It is probable that the men will be given an opportunity to go on the range for marksmanship practice later in the year. At present, however, the military work for freshmen will be limited to the classroom until the complete shipment of uniforms and equipment from the government shall have arrived.

RIFLE CLUB ELECTS OFFICERS

The Rifle Club held an organization meeting on Tuesday, October 21. The following officers were elected: president, J. R. Perkins '20; vice-president, M. C. Hawes '21; secretary, L. J. Powers, r. '22; treasurer, K. B. White '20. G. G. Kearful '22 was appointed manager. At a meeting of the officers of the club the dues were fixed at \$1.50 for the entire year. Sign up books are now ready, and men wishing to join the club may do so either in the lobby or at the rifle range in Walker Memorial. Membership in the rifle club entitles men to the use of the club's guns in the Walker range, and to an allowance on service ammunition for use on the outdoor range.

FIRST DORM DANCE COMES ON HALLOWE'EN

Large Attendance Expected At Walker Memorial—Tickets Are On Sale to Outsiders Now

SERIES PLANNED FOR YEAR

The first of a series of dormitory dances will be held in the Walker Memorial on the evening of Friday, October 31, from eight o'clock until midnight. From all predictions made by members of the committee in charge, this affair will inaugurate a season that will surpass all previous years in the brilliancy and attractiveness of its entertainments. At least every five weeks a dance of some sort will be arranged, and it is planned to have special novelty dances on several occasions, including a "Mardi Gras" dance in February, and a formal affair to end the season.

Among the features for Halloween are Walter Johnson's well-known orchestra, which will furnish lively "jazz" during the evening, the serving of refreshments during the intermission, and the comparatively low admission price. This has been placed at \$1.00 to men occupying dormitory rooms, and \$1.25 to all outsiders. This difference is made in consideration of the fact that dormitory residents are required to pay a special tax at the beginning of the year, this payment entitling them to a few extra privileges. The first dance will be an informal affair, and tickets for 150 couples have been issued. Of this number nearly one hundred have already been purchased by dormitory men. The sale to outsiders will begin tomorrow, and until the quota of 150 has been disposed of, the pasteboards may be obtained either from members of the committee or after Monday, at the Co-operative Society.

Mrs. MacLaurin, Mrs. Rogers, and Mrs. Lipka have been asked to act as matrons during the evening. The members of the committee have announced that no tickets will be available for sale at the door on Friday. Those in charge of the affair are R. Pender '20, A. A. Turner '21, and F. M. Gill '20.

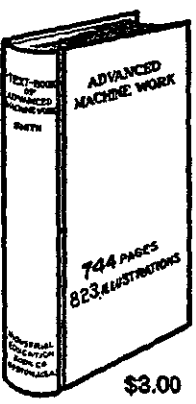
