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NEW DORMITORY DINING ROOM WILL BE OPENED IN WALKER

Plans Under Way to Provide Three Meals Daily to Dormitory Men

The Dormitory Committee, having realized the great necessity of a general eating place where all dormitory men can congregate, have exerted every effort towards reviving the Dorm Dining Room of last year, which, due to insufficient patronage was forced to close its doors.

In accordance with this policy they have co-operated with Mrs. Scriptures who is in charge of the Walker Memorial Dining Room, and have formed a plan which has met with the general approval of the dormitories. The idea is to provide not only lunch and supper as formerly, but also breakfast, so that the dormitories will be able to give their exclusive patronage to the new dining rooms and not have to breakfast somewhere in the neighborhood.

Two plans have been proposed. One is to have the dining room open for the school week and for two meals on Saturday, and the other is to have it open the whole week, including Sundays. The price per week for the former is to be seven dollars and for the latter nine dollars. The hours are to be: breakfast from 8.30 to 10; lunch from 12 to 2; supper from 6 to 7. As previously the North Dining Room is to be used, but this time Mrs. Scriptures desires that each patron sign a contract signifying his willingness to give the service a trial till Christmas. The dormitories have objected to this, and have asked for a breaking clause in the contract stating that the Dorm Dining Room can at any time be broken up if the majority desire it so. The arrangements are not quite complete, as the dormitories have not yet voted on the plan they propose to adopt.

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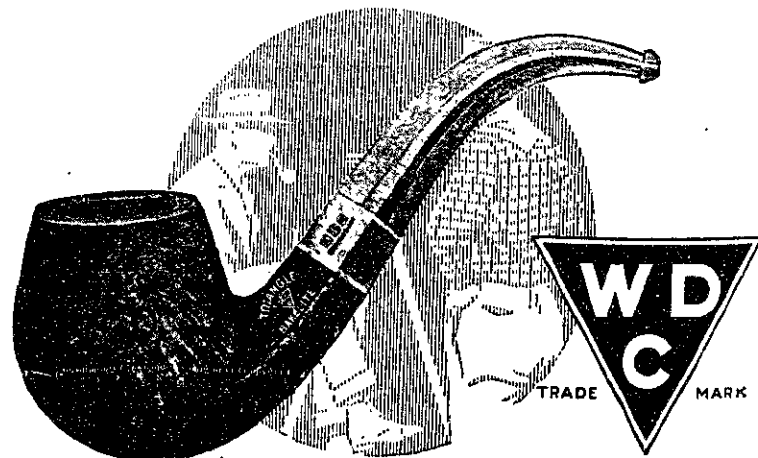
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
