

TECHNOLOGY RUNNERS WIN THIRD PLACE IN INTERCOLLEGIATE RACE

McMahon '22, Covers Hard Four and a Half Mile Cross Country Course in 6.05 at Syracuse—
Kanaly Satisfied

PRINCETON WINS WITH SYRACUSE SECOND

The Technology Cross Country team made an auspicious start of what promises to be a very successful season on Saturday, when they finished third in the big invitation cross country run at Syracuse. Princeton won the tilt in which 11 colleges of the East sent their best hill and dale runners. Syracuse, which had men finish first and second for individual honors, placed second.

W. K. McMahon '21 lived up to expectations when he crossed the finish line in seventh place after covering the four and a half mile course in 26 min. 5 secs. He was followed shortly after by C. L. Stone '21, who beat out Helm of Provincetown for sixteenth place. D. F. Carpenter '22, E. J. Purcell '22 and A. L. Flanders '22 crossed the tape in the order named, running practically bunched.

The first man to make an appearance in the Syracuse stadium, just before the Syracuse and Washington and Jefferson elevens started their battle was Simmons of Syracuse, who covered the distance in 24 min. 56 1-5th sec. Princeton's first five men finished third, eighth, tenth, eleventh and seventeenth.

INDOOR RINK TO OPEN

Former N. A. D. Receiving Ship Will Become Hockey Arena

Technology students will be able to enjoy indoor ice skating this winter if the plans of the newly organized corporation, of which George Adams Woods is president, are carried out. The Ice Pavilion, Inc., as the firm is known, plans to open the old receiving ship at 86 Massachusetts Ave. as an indoor skating and hockey rink, about December 1. A grandstand having a seating capacity of 1,500 will be constructed, the size of the rink being 160 by 52 feet.

The Skating Club of Boston will have the use of the rink every Tuesday and Thursday afternoon throughout the winter. There will be four days per week in which the rink will be open to the public, and it is also intended to arrange two hockey matches each week.

The rink will be equipped with the accessories of a first-class skating emporium. George Bryant Woods, recently returned from overseas, will be the local manager.

Technology Overseas Men to Have Get-together at Lenox

On the night of November 11, 1919 at the Hotel Lenox in Boston, there will be a reunion of the Technology Bureau of Paris, to which all overseas Technology men are invited.

The committee in charge of the arrangements is working hard to make Nov. 11, 1919 a second Nov. 11, 1918, and from present indications, and the number of men who have already signified their intentions of being there, this fact seems assured.

The management of the Hotel Lenox, realizing that their establishment has been selected by the first group of overseas men to celebrate the signing of the armistice in Boston, has promised an elaborate menu, and is preparing to make the event an outstanding feature of the various celebrations that will be held that day in an around greater Boston.

The committee is headed by George C. Gibbs '00, who is familiarly known to Institute men as chairman of the Technology Bureau in Paris during the war. A feature of the evening will be a speech by Gibbs in French, entitled "Nous avons entre nous." This speech was given by him first in Paris at one of the Technology dinners there, and made such an impression that he has been asked to repeat it here.

AERO CLUB WILL HOLD THREE BUSINESS MEETINGS

Dates Set for Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday of This Week

In order to reach the greatest possible percentage of the four hundred men who have just enrolled as members of the Technology Aeronautical Engineering Society, the officers of the Society have arranged for three important business meetings.

The first meeting will take place today at 2.00 o'clock in room 4-270. The second will come to-morrow, Wednesday at the same time and place. The third and final meeting will be held on Friday at two o'clock in room 3-470. All three events will be similar in every respect the idea being to give every member an opportunity to be present at some one of the three. The officers desire to make it emphatic that these affairs are of real importance to the members of the society. Considerable business will be transacted, and a printed form or questionnaire will be filled out by each man for reference purposes. The constitution which was adopted last year will be read and discussed, and appointment of committees will be announced.

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The price of a seat in one of the boxes or in the first fourteen rows of the floor is \$2.75, while in the remaining seven rows the price is \$2.20 per seat. In the first balcony, the four front rows will sell for \$2.20 a ticket, the next five rows for \$1.65, and the remaining six for \$1.10. Freshman seats will sell for 55 cents each. These prices include the war tax but not the fifteen cents to be levied on each ticket to provide novelties such as streamers and balloons. The show will be localized by Jack Coyle '21, who is working on encore numbers, and Technology jokes. Tickets will be on sale in the main lobby Friday and Saturday of this week and Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of next.

This huge, rollicking revue, which is in two acts and twenty or more scenes, was seen for the first time at the 44th Street Theatre, New York, last July, and after a run of several months, was transferred to the Winter Garden in order to provide a more ample seating capacity. Some of the more interesting scenes in this place are "A Lovely Italian Garden," "A Busy Scene on Broadway," "A Cosy Corner in a Fifth Avenue Home," "A Busy Street in Greenwich Village," "Interior of a Greenwich Village Theatre," as well as "a restaurant," "In Baby Vampire Land," "A Hotel in Paris," "The Cherry Blossom Grove," "In a Tiger's Cage," "The Revels of Neptune," and a "lovely ballroom setting."
