

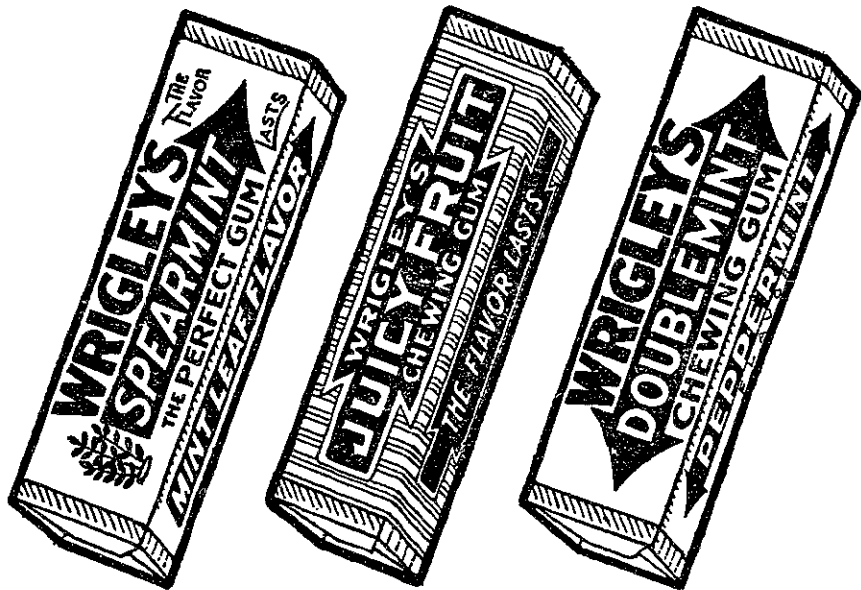
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CODE CLASS BEGINS

Radios Will Hold Smoker In Grill Room Tonight

At the Radio Society meeting to be held by special permission in the grill room of Walker Memorial tonight at 7.00 o'clock Mr. H. C. Gawler the Radio inspector, and G. R. Entwistle, the president of the New England Amateur Association, will speak to what is expected to be a large crowd. Each one of the men as well will be called on for a short talk of some kind. The criticism has been made that the professional society meetings in general are not in formal enough and are not brought home to the average man attending; so the Radio society is trying this novel way of meeting the situation.

The meeting will be of especial interest to those who expect to operate or to be in charge of the society's station, for the rules regarding operating will be given out. Among them is the one which says that a first class operator must always be in charge of the station and that he is responsible for it while he is there. Other men may operate, but are under the supervision of the man in charge. Those who have charge of the station are directly responsible to the chief operator who is at present H. M. Lane '21, also the vice-president of the society.

The Radio society has grown so that it has become necessary to form three committees that will take over some of the work. The chairman of the finance, publicity, and program committees will form an executive board. Under the finance committee will come the exchange bureau which has the facilities for testing apparatus for men who want to exchange it for other apparatus. The society has many amateurs that have wireless sets more or less complete and some of the men have duplicate parts, but lack others. They may bring those to the bureau to sell or exchange for others of equal value. The scope of this new experiment depends entirely upon the support given it by the members. The working plans are still under development.

The much heralded code class will open tomorrow, being held in room 10-275 from 1.30-2.00. The station opened Monday after being tuned up Saturday. The enrollment of the society at present is over 110 and the management expects to have over 200 members soon.

THETA CHI WINS FOOTBALL GAME

In a one sided game, Theta Chi defeated Delta Upsilon in a football game on Tech Field on Thursday, Oct 24, 14-0. classes at four o'clock the corridors were one-way streets for room 2-190. The chairs were soon filled—sometimes with two to a seat. As the crowd increased window seats were in great demand, standing room was at a premium, and still the crowd pressed in from the corridors.
