Mr. Emerson went on to explain that while all subscriptions must be in by January 1, in order to take advantage of "Mr. Smith's" offer, the first payment need not be made before July 1, 1920, and the rest of the payments may extend over a period of three or five years, and concluded by saying, "January 1 is very, very near, and a day now is worth two in December. It is not only necessary to give, because we will all give, but it is necessary to get others to give."

Several other reports were taken up, among them that of Dr. W. H. Taylor '84, chairman of the War Record Committee, who introduced Capt. John H. Ruckman '10, Editor of the Record, who stated that questionnaires were coming in steadily, though slowly.

The report of the Committee on National Service, which was read by James W. Rollins '78, was accepted and a vote to extend the thanks of the Council to the Committee, and especially to Women's Committee.

Following the recommendation of the Executive Committee, it was unanimously voted to increase the dues of the Alumni Association from \$2 to \$3 annually, besides which a sub-committee was appointed to revise the lists of representatives of Tech Clubs so that the latter may be represented by live men who are able to be in Boston.

A meeting of the entire Class Committee was held last night in the Walker Memorial at which Dr. MacLaurin told of the results of his trip through the West. A full account will appear in the next issue of THE TECH.

A representative of the Class of 1918 expressed the desire of his class to be represented on the Institute Committee. In view of the fact that in order to have representation, it must be either an activity, a class or a society, it was generally decided that representation could not be granted. It was moved that the matter be laid on the table until the next meeting.

It was moved, seconded and passed that the meeting be adjourned at 5.50 P. M.

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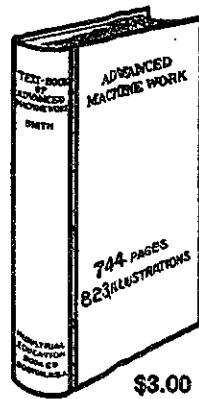
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
