

COSMOPOLITANS MEET

Dean Burton Extends Welcome To New Men

The Cosmopolitan Club held the biggest meeting in its history on Thursday evening, October thirtieth. The meeting was called to welcome the new foreign students to the Institute and to help them to become acquainted. It accomplished its purpose so admirably that the 96 men present, representing thirty-four nationalities, were soon made to feel thoroughly at home.

M. E. Martinez '20, president of the club, opened the meeting with an address of welcome in which he expressed his pleasure at meeting such a large number of new men and his hope that they will soon come to know the club members intimately. Dean Burton then gave an historical sketch of the club's activities, with special reference to the work it has done to promote the social side of the foreign student's life. The last speaker was W. M. Ross of the Technology Christian Association, whose success in finding rooms for the newcomers is so highly appreciated. He entertained the gathering with vivid stories of his experiences in France.

The meeting became informal with the serving of refreshments and the unique scheme of having the men wear a tag bearing their name and nationality enabled them to become acquainted rapidly. Upon leaving, they deposited the tags in a box so that the club has a complete list from which to vote in new members. The club plans to hold a second meeting in two weeks at which time plans for the year will be announced. These are expected to include a dance and several new features that have not yet been made public.

He also emphasized the need for better organization and hard work, stating that among the other problems, that of locating the Alumni whose addresses are not filed was by no means the least. In conclusion, he confirmed the statement, that, provided the required \$4,000,000 were raised before January 1, 1920, "Mr. Smith" would positively declare himself on that date and added that he hoped to be able to introduce him to Technology at that time.

The next speaker was "like" Litchfield '85, who explained the plans for obtaining contributions from individuals and organizations not connected with Technology.

The class organizations are very largely depended upon to reach the former students of the Institute, and this part of the work is under the charge of O. B. Dennison '11. Representing the undergraduate body is a committee headed by Norris G. Abbot '20, chairman of the Institute Committee.

The meeting was brought to a close with a short speech by Everett Morris '85 of the Corporation, who gave some specific directions for carrying out the 'Get' part of the 'Give and Get' program, and another 'We are Happy.'

The dinner was attended by about a hundred and fifty, with a representation from almost every class, which was seated at a table by itself, with an additional table for the representatives of the fraternities at the Institute. A report of progress was made by the different classes, but, on request of the Alumni Committee, no figures are being published at this time.

PHI KAPPA PSI HOLDS MEETING

The Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity men who are at Technology this year held a meeting in the Faculty Room of Walker Memorial on Friday, October 31. Twelve men were present and after all business had been transacted, a dinner was served in the Grill Room. FRESHMAN FOOTBALL TEAM LOSES 6-0 TO ST. JOHN'S PREP

Last Saturday afternoon, the freshman football team took a 6-0 defeat at the hands of St. John's Prep on the latter's field. It was a hard fought game and the final whistle blew with the ball in the freshmen's possession on St. John's six-yard line.

The only score of the game was made by Carpenella who carried the ball 80 yards through a broken field for a touchdown. Both teams had chances to score but lacked the final punch to put the ball over. With only a minute left to play the freshmen gained 35 yards on a long forward pass to the 6 yard line, but the whistle blew shortly afterwards.

Though defeated, the freshman team showed considerable improvement over its play against Bently, the week previous.

There will be an important meeting of the class of 1922, Wednesday, Nov. 4, at 1.00 o'clock in Room 10-250.

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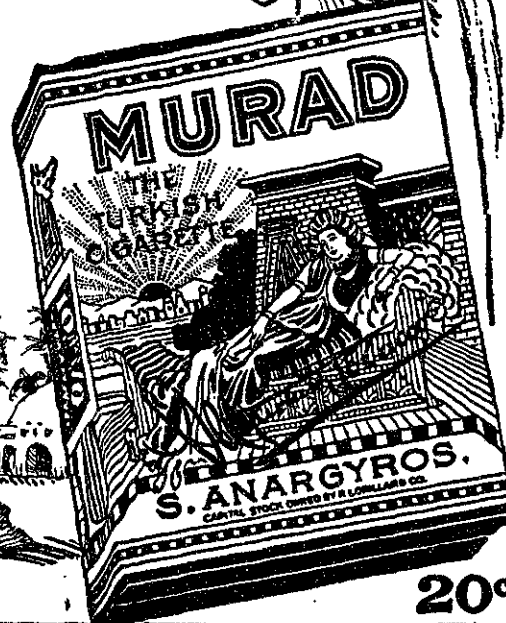
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
