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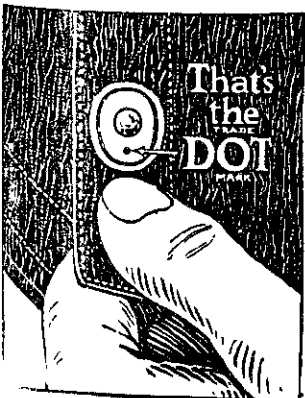
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ANNUAL DINNER GIVEN FIELD DAY CONTESTANTS (Continued from page 1)

PRATT MEMORIAL FOUNDATIONS WILL BE COMPLETED SOON

Bad Weather Causes Delay In Driving The Piles

In about a week, another pile driver will be put into operation on the foundations of the Pratt Memorial. At present 300 piles have been driven, and it will be necessary to have 953 more. After these are driven there will be a further excavation of two feet. Then everything will be ready for the start of concrete, which will take place in about one month's time. The contract calls for the completion of the foundation on January 15, 1920, but this is subject to delays caused by poor weather.

The finished building will be sixty by one hundred feet in dimensions, and will be three stories high. The wall facing Massachusetts Ave. will be finished with limestone, and the inner wall with brick, exactly like the other buildings. The main entrance on Massachusetts Ave. will be an elaborate portico.

The John T. Skully Co. of Cambridge is the firm that is working on the foundation. Stone and Webster are the engineers for the whole building.
