

MOVIES SUPPLANT SOPHOMORE MILITARY CLASSES NEXT WEEK

Sophomores will be required to attend one of two "movie" lectures next week on coast artillery, to be given by the Military Science department in Walker Memorial. In consequence these men will be excused from some of the regular military exercises falling on the first four days of the present week. The lectures will begin at 7.30 o'clock on Tuesday and Friday evenings. The pictures to be shown consist of two parts, both pertaining to artillery firing, and both prepared under the direction of the Army General Staff. Lieut. Col. Green will have charge of the lectures.

It is to be noticed that not all of the second year military exercises of the week are to be omitted. No recitations are to be held in the following hours: Monday, 11 to 12, and 2 to 3; Tuesday, 10 to 11, 11 to 12, and 12 to 1; Wednesday, 1 to 2, 2 to 3, and 3 to 4; Thursday, 12 to 1, 2 to 3.

The military department has arranged for a similar set of pictures for Sophomores to be shown the week of December 1.

FRESHMEN PURCHASE OVERCOATS

During the last week or two, Master Engineer Krom of the Department of Military Science has been taking orders from members of the freshman class for sheepskin coats such as are required by the R. O. T. C. regulations at Technology.

We would like to engage three or four energetic and capable students for us on commission. The right men can add materially to their income for the next two months in a pleasant and congenial business, which can be done in spare time.

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To date he has received 129 orders. The coats are to be purchased through a Boston firm and will be ready for delivery in about a week. The exact days of distribution will be announced by a bulletin from the Department of Military Science. The coats are to be paid for on delivery and will cost between \$12.00 and \$13.00.

FLAG POLE BASE TO REMAIN IN EXCAVATION

There will be no attempt to remove the big concrete flag pole base which lies in the excavation for the Pratt Memorial. It lies under the place where the entrance is to be, and as there will be no basement here, it will be allowed to remain between the rows of piles. In case it should later be found to be an obstruction, it probably will be buried, as dynamiting would be dangerous on account of the proximity of the buildings.

The Class of 1910 against 1920 in 1916, their time being 15 2-5 seconds. The Sophomores got the jump right at the start and literally pulled the freshmen off their feet in the first struggle. Sophomores Win Football Contest

The Sophomores got the jump on the freshmen in the football game, scored two touchdowns early in the fray and held their lighter opponents safe for the remainder of the time, winning by the score of 12-7.

Boli scored the first touchdown for 1922, grabbing a forward pass from Brokaw over the freshmen goal line early in the first period, after Johannson had brought the ball within scoring distance by a wonderful end run from his own thirty five yard mark to the freshmen ten yards.

The second Sophomore touchdown came shortly after the second period opened. A series of line bucks late in the opening quarter had advanced the ball from midfield to the freshmen ten yard mark and it took four plays for the Sophomores to push it over from there. Johannson finally going over by diving at the 1923 line.

The freshmen tallied in the third

quarter and their touchdown was the direct result of a penalty inflicted upon the Sophomores. The latter had punted from their own twenty five yard line, but were caught holding when the ball was in the air and the freshmen were given possession on the Sophomore twenty five yard line. From here, on the very first play, Richards, diminutive freshmen half-back, twisted and squirmed his way through the entire 1922 team for a touchdown. Following a punt out, Cronin kicked the goal.

That was the only time the freshmen had a chance to score. In the first and second periods only once did they have the ball in Sophomore territory. In the final period they once reached the thirty five yard line.

They showed a wonderful defense against their heavier opponents and stopped everything that was directed against their line. Big "Red" Bouis, six feet six, weighing 215 pounds, was a whale on defense, playing a roving center and dropping everybody that essayed a gain through the middle of the freshmen line.

On offense the first year men were not so strong. In the first period they showed a flash of strength when after the Sophs had scored their first touchdown, they advanced the ball forty yards by straight rushing, spoiling their good work by a fumble when they had reached midfield. Cronin and Kelley, until the latter was hurt, proved the freshmen's best bets when it came to gaining ground. Kelley hit the line very hard and picked his holes well. Cronin tore off one good run-back of a kick-off but it went for naught when one of his teammates was caught holding.

The freshmen played far better in the second half after Richards showed that the Sophs were not impregnable by his twenty five yard run for a score.

Johannson was the individual star for the Sophomores. His end run which paved the way for the first touchdown was remarkable. In addition he made several lucrative line bucks and was a most dependable man with the ball. Brokaw, Sophomore captain, couldn't get going on the slippery field and this deprived the 1922 team of one of its greatest offensive strengths. Time and again Brokaw was hurled for a loss attempting to circle the ends.

Sayre, who went in at left tackle for the freshmen in the last period, had his collar-bone broken directly after his entry into the game, and had to be taken out.
