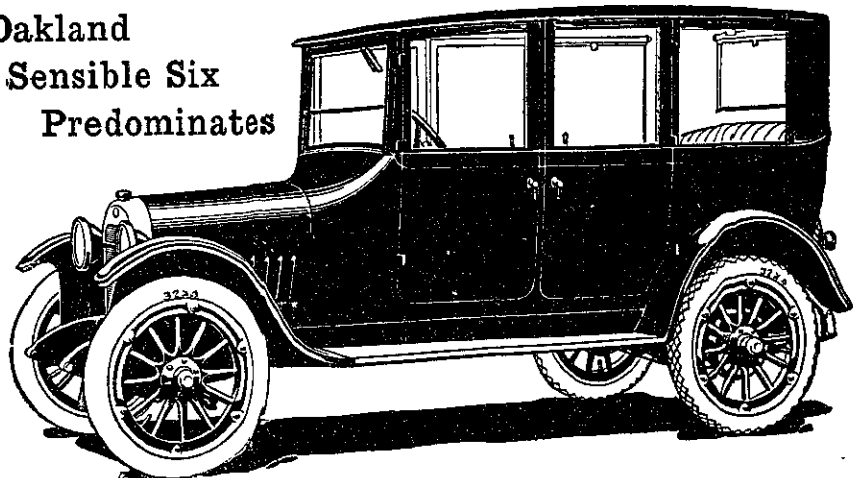


THE TECH SOLVES A MYSTERY

SAFETY ENGINEER WILL TELL
ABOUT ACCIDENT PREVENTION

The opportunity is to be given to the students of Technology to hear a lecture on "Accident Prevention and the Student Engineer" to be given by Mr. W. D. Keefer, safety engineer and representative of the National Safety Council.

The National Safety Council is a body headed by E. H. Gary as honorary chairman, and composed of forty members, men of national importance, representing nearly all the important industrial concerns of the country. Its object is the prevention of accident in all branches of industry and the furtherance of safety and comfort for all employed labor. It is in large measure due to this organization that the present interest in accident prevention has arisen in all parts of the country. With this movement has come a new valuation of human life and new standards of what are considered as unnecessary hazards. The number of preventable accidents occurring in the course of a year in this country is simply appalling and constitutes a constant drain upon the labor resources of the nation. It is for the education of employers, employees and executives regarding ways of accident prevention and the study of conditions leading to accidents that the National Safety Council was organized.

The engineer is naturally a most important factor in this movement of safeguarding human life and limb. It will therefore be with special interest that Mr. Keefer will be heard. Mr. Keefer will have with him about sixty lantern slides showing peculiar accidents, the conditions causing them and the method of prevention. Everyone who can be present is urged to attend this important lecture.

The lecture will be given in room 10-250 on Friday afternoon, November 21, from 4.00 to 5.00 o'clock. It is given under the auspices of the Student Branch of the A. S. M. E. All members of the student body, faculty and instructing staff have been cordially invited.

BRAY '22 WILL LEAD BOY'S WORK

P. A. Bray '22 has been appointed director of the department of Boys' work on the T. C. A. cabinet. This is a new department which has been formed in answer to the pleas made by Young Mens Christian Associations and settlement houses. These people need young men to aid in their work among boys.

The following places need men: East End Union (settlement house) needs one man on Mondays and Tuesdays from 7:30 to 9:30, and Tuesdays and Thursdays from 4:00 to 5:30.

The Cambridge Y. M. C. A. needs a man to help at the desk in the boys division on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 4:00 to 6:00. They also need a man to help in the newsboys' club on Wednesday evenings. The Cambridge Boy Scouts need leaders.

The Boston Y. M. C. A. wants two leaders for the Grammar School Boys Clubs on Tuesdays 5:30 to 8:00, and the High School Club, Tuesdays 5:00 to 7:30. They also need two Assistant Scout Masters, on Friday evenings, and help at the counters on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturdays from 4:00 to 6:00.

Childrens Aid Society need five men to lead Library Clubs which meet once a week at the home of one of the boys.

P. A. Bray '22 says, "There are three very good reasons why Technology men should give their support to this enterprise; first, it will make a good name for the Institute; second, it will be a service to the boys for whom the work is done; and last, it will furnish relaxation, recreation, and personal development for the men doing the work."

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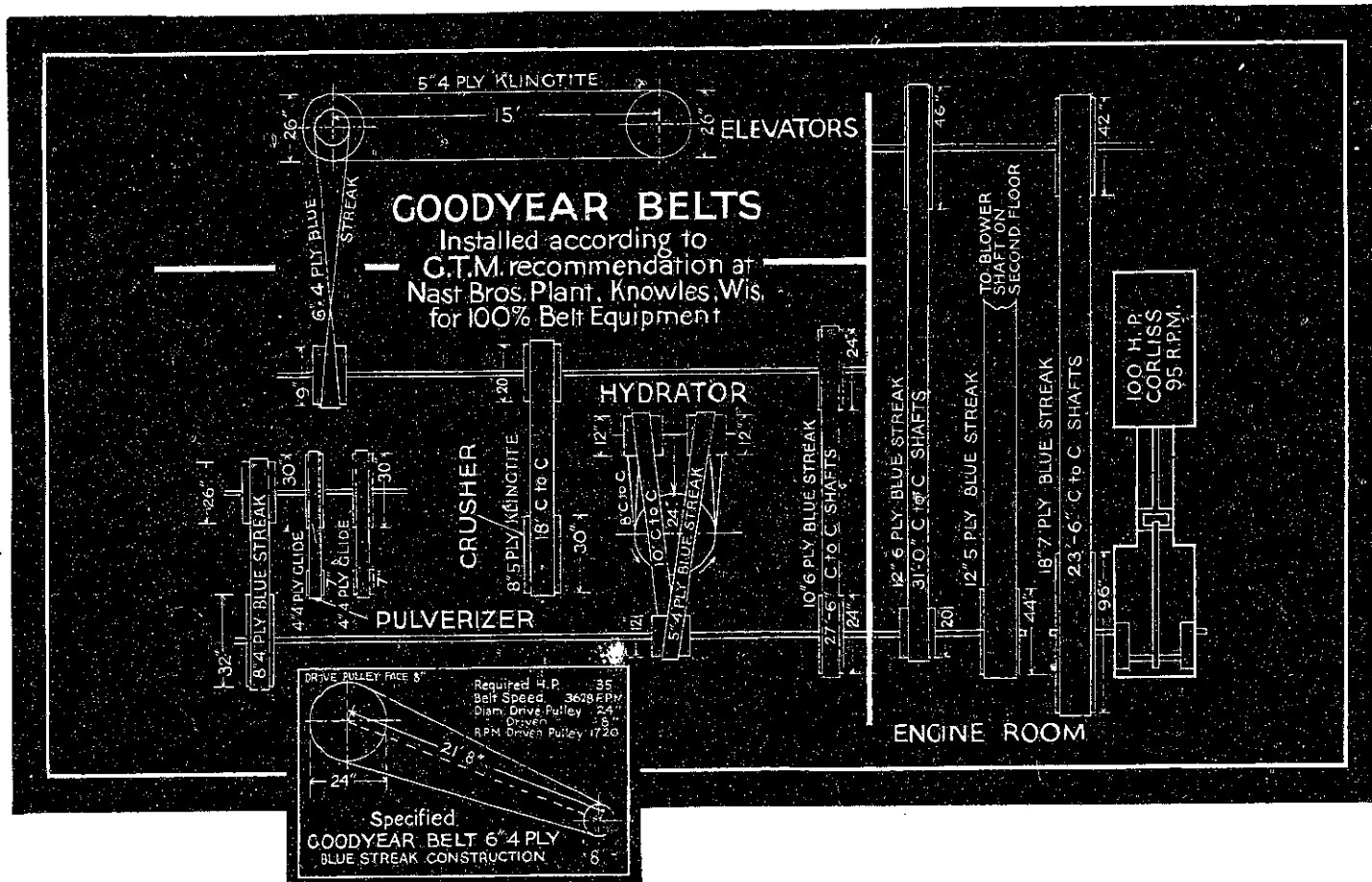
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
