

SERVICE CONTRACT IS GREAT SUCCESS

Many Contracts Signed with
Various Firms of the East—
Undergraduates' Fund Fig-
ures Announced

150 STUDENTS SUBSCRIBE

The totals of the student subscrip-
tions have been definitely announced
along with the number of the sub-
scribers. Up to twelve o'clock on
Friday, November 24, \$9,291.25 had
been canvassed from the undergrad-
uates and the total number of sub-
scribers was 147. The percentages of
the classes run in the following or-
der, Junior, Freshman, Senior and
Sophomore.

The contract side of the campaign
is also coming along well. The main
contracts that have just been signed
are with the following concerns:
Saco-Lowell Shops for \$2,500; the
Buffalo Bolt Company of Buffalo, N.
Y., for \$2,500; the Todd Shipyards of
New York \$5,000 and the Niagara
Lockport and Ontario Power Com-
pany for \$3,000. The American Tele-
phone and Telegraph Company is
about to sign a contract for \$25,000
a year for five years.

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SCHEDULE OF WRESTLING TEAM MEETS IS COMPLETE

Bridson Green, New England Cham-
pion To Coach Team

Bridson Green, New England wel-
ter weight champion, will coach the
wrestling team this year. Mr. Green
coached the Andover team last year
with great success, and will divide
his time between Andover and Tech-
nology this year.

The prospects for a good team are
bright, but men who have previous
experience are urged to come out, as
there are two weak spots on the line-
up. W. W. Russell '22, well known
at Andover as a wrestler, is out for
the team and will be glad to help
those who want instruction.

As the coach is to be present for
the first time Monday afternoon, it is
desirable that all varsity candidates
be present at five o'clock on that day.
An attempt is being made by the
manager Coffin to secure more room
for the wrestling, since with the
freshman and varsity wrestlers the
mat is usually overcrowded.

The lack of a captain is at the pres-
ent time hindering the team. The
present plan is to elect the captain
before the coach arrives on Monday
afternoon.

Mr. Gracey is fast getting the
freshman team into shape and an
elimination meet is to be held soon
which will help him to pick the fresh-
man team.

school, and at the same time have an
excellent trip. If possible a meet
with Springfield Y. M. C. A. College
will be arranged for sometime about
the middle of March, and shortly af-
ter that the intercollegiate will take
place.

with New Hampshire by a score of
23-32. Nightingale of New Hampshire
finished first and MacMahon second.

dition for this meet and it was not
therefore considered as a criterion

MOVIES TO FEATURE AT AERO SMOKER

Lieutenant-Colonel Drennan
Will Address Students on Sub-
ject of Training-Cadet Flying
Officers

DESIGN FOR PIN SUBMITTED

The next smoker of the Aeronauti-
cal Engineering society, to be held
in Walker Memorial Tuesday, Decem-
ber 2 at 8.00 o'clock, will include
many novel features. Movies will be
employed to supplement the lecture
which Lieutenant-Colonel Leonard H.
Drennan will give on the training of
air pilots. Other speakers will talk
on allied subjects.

Lieutenant-Colonel Drennan is at
present in charge of the military aero-
nautics of the Department of the
Northeast. He will tell the members
of the society the methods employed
in the army for the training of cadet
flying officers. Four reels of govern-
ment movies will depict the life of
the cadet from the day he enters
training, until he is turned out as a
finished pilot. In the ground school
instruction is furnished in the funda-
mentals of aerial navigation, engine
and machine gun operation and rig-
ging. Following this period the cadet is
given instruction in flying, starting
with the dual control and finally at-
taining perfection in solo flying and
combat manoeuvres.

Lieutenant-Colonel Drennan is his
own pilot, flying a Curtis JNH-6 plane
with a Hispano-Suize engine. The
Colonel's plane was flown over Bos-
ton recently by Lieutenant H. B. May-
nard, the "Flying Parson," in aid of
the Red Cross drive.

The other speakers of the evening,
Colonel A. A. Maybach and Lieuten-
ant-Colonel Fred M. Green '09, both of
the department of Military Science
at the Institute, will speak on the co-
operation of the aviation with the
artillery in furnishing ranges, spotting
bits and otherwise directing artillery
fire. A surprise in the entertainment,
followed by apple pie and ice cream
will complete the program of the
evening.

THE TECH HOST TO HEADS OF PROMINENT ACTIVITIES

Co-operation Is Keynote of Dinner Meeting Given
by Managing Board at Hotel Vendome
Tuesday Evening

MAKE ANNOUNCEMENT OF NEW PRINTER

With the object of fostering co-operation between the
activities and Technology's official news sheet, the Managing
Board of THE TECH gave a dinner at the Hotel Vendome last
Tuesday evening to which the heads of all prominent activities
were invited. The speakers were C. B. Capps '20, General
Manager of the present volume of THE TECH, who explained the
difficulties with which the paper has to contend, and H. E.
Lobdell '17, formerly General Manager of Volume XXXVI, who
gave some interesting sidelights on the Endowment Fund Cam-
paign. Announcement was made of the new system which has
gone into effect since THE TECH changed its printer at the
beginning of this week.

At the close of the dinner, General
Manager Capps introduced Lobdell
as the first speaker. "Lobby" told of
his work on the campaign for raising
the four millions to meet the condi-
tions imposed by "Mr. Smith" and ex-
plained his methods of pledging the
undergraduates. He cited several ex-
amples to show that every loyal Tech-
nology man would subscribe if prop-
erly approached, and emphasized the
fact that Institute Alumni and under-
graduates would have to respond at
once and respond generously if the
committee is to obtain the necessary
sum in the month which remains be-
fore "Mr. Smith's" offer becomes
valid. In closing, Lobdell pointed out
that the undergraduates must pledge
to their utmost immediately, and
asked each activity representative to
do all in his power to insure the suc-
cess of the campaign.

Speaking for THE TECH, General
Manager Capps then explained that
the meeting, the first of its kind ever
held, had been planned by the Manag-
ing Board of Volume XXXIX in order
to acquaint the activities with the
problems which confront a college
newspaper, so that the activities
could cooperate with THE TECH in
