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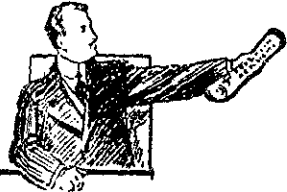

RADIO SOCIETY TO HAVE DRIVE FOR MORE MEMBERS

Trip to Tufts Laboratory Comes Next Week

The Radio Society will start its drive for new members next week. Those interested in electrical subjects will have four advantages offered them if they join. They will have the privilege of attending the code class which will help men who wish to obtain a commercial license; they can attend lectures given on radio work; will be able to go on the trips the society proposes to take; and may attend the society's smokers. A pamphlet on how to operate a station is being prepared by the society and will soon be published.

Quite a number of men have signed up for the trips to the Tufts Radio laboratory which is now used for experimental and manufacturing purposes. These trips will be taken on Tuesday and Thursday of next week. Those who are going will meet at 1.30 o'clock outside of room 10-219.

In order to complete its outfit the society has decided to purchase a one half kilowatt arc transmitting set. This will add greatly to the equipment of the station.

FRENCH MANUFACTURER INSPECTS TECHNOLOGY

The Institute was visited last Thursday by M. Eugene Schneider, chairman of the French Trade Commission, who is also president of the Schneider Co. of France, the largest steel manufacturing concern in the world. He spent nearly a whole day at the Institute with Professor Freminville of the Ecole Central, the leading technical school of France. The reason for the visit was to investigate the cooperative course in electrical engineering, known as Course VI-A. The Ecole Central and the Ecole De Mines conduct various courses in cooperation with many of the large manufacturing concerns of France; and M. Schneider and Professor Freminville were very much interested to know how the cooperative idea is working out in America.

The Schneider Co., besides being the greatest steel company in the world, also owns the mines and railroads whereby it obtains and transports its raw material. It employs over 200,000 people, many of whom are studying at French technical schools. The company has built nearly all of the French steel ships and has also done much contract work for the French Government during the war.

RIFLE CLUB HOLDS BIG SHOOT

A shooting match is one of the features of the Rifle Club smoker which is to be held next Thursday, December 4, at 8.00 o'clock in the North Dining Hall. The smoker is open to undergraduates. Colonel Maybach, at present head of the department of Military Science will be the principal speaker. At the Lynn plant the company makes every kind of small motor, from 1-30 to 30 horse power. Before leaving, the men were taken to an exhibition room where there is a cross section of each motor, so that a summary of the whole trip could be made. An official of the society who made the trip considers that, from the standpoint of interest and fine treatment, it was the best he has taken in three years.

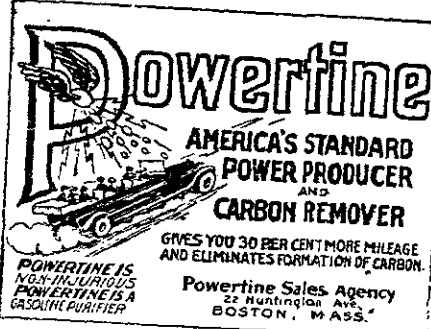
COSMOPOLITAN CLUB HOP COMES NEXT SATURDAY
