Among his victims is one Sloman of Leland Stanford University conqueror of the great Ted Meredith. Sloman was in the naval aviation detachment at Technology and Mike took him on in a race and just beat him out.

As a result of his victory on Tuesday Mike will eat at Bossert's expense and will have as his guest, also at Bossert's expense, Doc Johnson, Coach Kanaly's rub-down man.

In his day Mike was a long distance runner, doing the five mile run in many professional races. He is no youth, for he was born fifty-six years ago and his birthday is the Fourth of July.

HOCKEY IS REVIVED

Promising Schedule Now Being Arranged

After a dormant period of three years, hockey has been reinstated as an Institute sport. At the last meeting of the M. I. T. A. A. the team which is now being organized, was officially recognized by that association. A very promising schedule is being arranged by the manager, R. F. Officer '21, and will be announced as soon as it is completed.

Indications point to a successful team, as two old members of Institute hockey teams are studying here at present, and will form an excellent nucleus around which the team will be built. The former members of the team are C. Cochran '18, and E. L. Johanson '20. Cochran was the captain of the last Institute team.

The management has secured the rink opposite Technology as a permanent place for practices and home meets will also be held there. This will solve one of the hockey teams' most serious problems. Former hockey teams had the use of the Arena, provided that it was not otherwise occupied, which made the matter of practices very uncertain.

FRESH CROSS COUNTRY TEAM WINDS UP SEASON

New Eligibility Rule Results in Best Team Ever

There were three meets, of which two were lost. The freshmen were defeated in a dual meet with Harvard and in an invitation meet at Yale, where they took third place, Harvard, Yale and Technology being first, second and third respectively. However, they triumphed in a dual meet with Dartmouth.

SKATING RINK OVER COOP IS UNDER CONSTRUCTION

The Ice Pavilion Corporation of Boston is now constructing a skating rink on the second floor of the "Pavilion" where the Co-operative Society is located. The rink will be 162 feet long and 52 feet wide enclosed by a railing. Two balconies are to be built for the use of spectators, and seats will be placed on a level with the rink where the poolroom is now situated. Four fire escapes will lead from the balconies. At the rear of one of the balconies there will be a warm area where refreshment counters, and a reception and dressing room for ladies will be located.

The rink is to be ready for use about the middle of December, and professional hockey teams from all over this country and from Canada will stage their games here.

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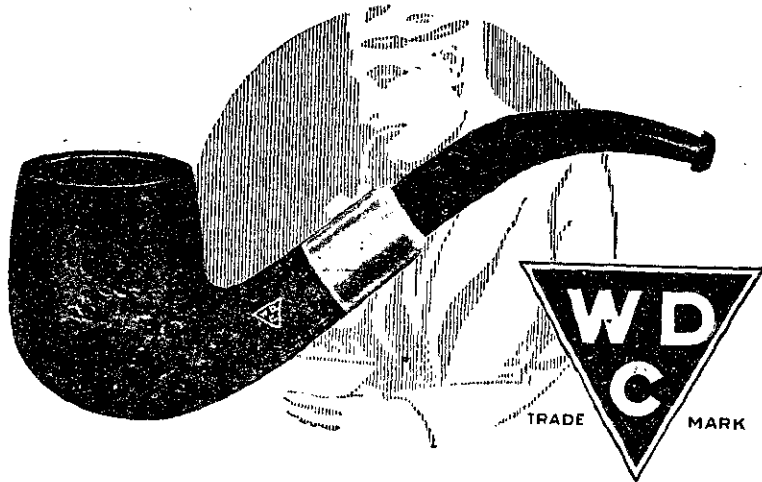
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
