Lieutenant-Colonel Drennan has charge of the military aeronautics of the Department of the Northeast. His own plane—a Curtis plane with an Hispano-Suize engine—recently flew over Boston during the Red Cross drive with Lieutenant H. B. Maynard as pilot. Colonel Drennan's talk will include information concerning the possibilities of commercial aero navigation.

In connection with his speech four reels of government movies are promised. These films depict the life of the cadet flyer from the time of the beginning of his training to his final tryout as a birdman.

Colonel Maybach and Lieutenant-Colonel F. M. Green of the Institute Department of Military Science will speak on the work of the aviation corps in cooperation with the artillery in furnishing ranges, spotting hits, and in general directing the fire of the artillery.

An invitation has been extended to all members of the society by the Aero Club of Massachusetts to attend the next regular meeting of that club. Data as to time, place and date will be given out later.

On Friday, December 12 the first Varsity meet will take place, with Wesleyan as Technology's opponent, and it is hoped that by that date the coach will have enough information concerning the abilities of each man that he will be able to pick the most representative team.

At the present time it is not expected that any further cut will be made in either Varsity or freshman squads. This means that every candidate will have an opportunity to show his worth, and a perfect record of attendance at practice will undoubtedly count for much when it is a question of the final lineup of the teams. On the swimming bulletin board opposite the Bursar's office all important notices will be posted as usual.

On Thursday of this week all members of last year's team will meet to elect a captain for the present season. Several men are mentioned as possibilities for this honor, among them Sid Biddell, the star swimmer.

SHOOTING MATCH AT RIFLE CLUB SMOKER

Speeches And Exhibition of New Sport Rifle Models Will Complete Attractive Program For Thursday

PROF. HOSMER WILL SPEAK

At the smoker of the Rifle Club which will be held Thursday, December 4, in North Dining Hall of Walker Memorial, there will be many novel and interesting features. Speeches by men actively engaged in the sport of shooting, an exhibition, a shooting match, and serving of refreshments will comprise the program.

J. R. Perkins '20, president of the club, will outline the plans for the year. Then Colonel Maybach, who is an authority on small arms, will speak and Prof. Hosmer, who has taken an active interest in the club for several years, will say a few words.

After the speeches there will be an exhibition of all the latest models of sporting rifles, shot guns, and pistols. Mr. Day, of the William Read & Sons Sporting Goods Store will answer questions concerning these guns.

A match will be held at the smoker which will be open to everybody. Each man will have one shot at twenty-five yards range. The best shot will be presented with 500 rounds of ammunition and the second best will receive 200 rounds. The championship cup will be put on exhibition. This cup will be awarded, at the end of the year, to the man having the best shooting record in the National Rifle Association Matches.

PLANS FOR INDOOR TRACK SEASON ARE BEING MADE

With the cross country season closed, arrangements are being made for the varsity indoor track season. While dates and details have not yet been decided upon, the track management plans to have Technology represented in four meets: the B. A. A. meet in Boston, the Millrose A. A. games at New York, a meet at the East Armory, and one at Hartford, Connecticut, held under the auspices of the Fourth Naval District.

The entire varsity cross country squad is continuing training preparation for the indoor relay season, and circumstances seem to indicate that Technology, whose two-mile relay team was at one time champion of America, will again be fittingly represented.

HOPES OF USING HANGAR FOR TRACK ARE SMASHED

It was hoped that the hangar which was used by the Naval Aviators during the war, might be converted into an indoor track this winter but this hope has been frustrated because of the fact that the hangar must be used as a storehouse for tractors and other material. It was of paramount importance to the track interests that an indoor track be obtained, because, while other colleges are training on indoor tracks during the winter months, Technology's jumpers, discuss throwers, and shot putters cannot get very much practice out of doors. In this way, they are greatly handicapped when spring track meets are held.

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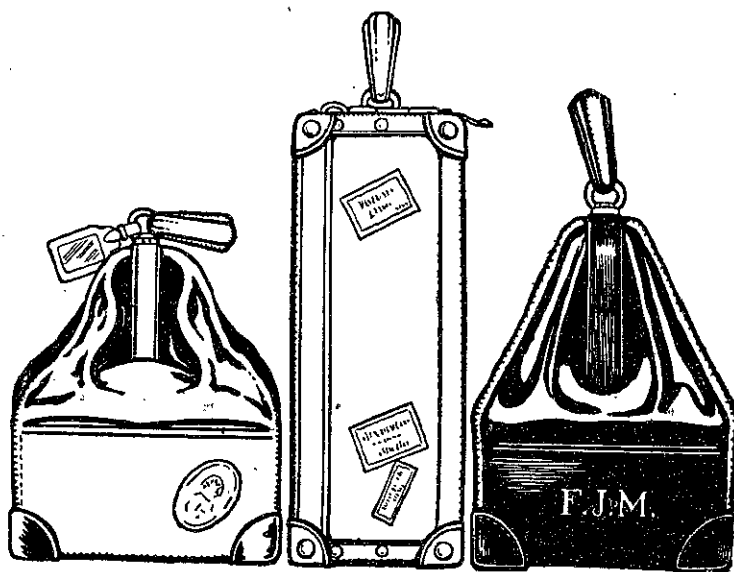
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
