Soccer Team Plays 1-1 Tie with Crimson

The Soccer team played a tie game with Harvard freshmen Saturday at Soldiers' Field, 1-1. Two extra five minute periods failed to bring another score.

Harvard was the first to score, booting a goal in the early part of the second half. The count came on a freak shot. Luyk '23 kicked the ball toward the Harvard goal and Chester of Harvard blocked the ball five feet from where it was kicked, the ball sailing like a shot between Technology's goal posts. Five minutes later, Ruiz '21, shot a goal from a difficult angle and tied up the game. There was no more scoring and the ball was on one side of the field as much as the other.

Capt. Heizer, played very well for Harvard. The Harvard goal tender also did good work. Guimaraes '22 played excellently, sending the ball way down the field on kicks from the backfield; he prevented the Harvard forwards from getting within scoring distance.

The team played better than it has been doing and showed more team work. The forward line outplayed Harvard's and the backfield was a good match for the Harvard rear guards.

RESIGNS TRACK MANAGERSHIP

Paul N. Anderson '21, manager of Technology's track team for more than a year, has resigned his position, due to parental objections to his carrying on longer. With the track managership he has also given up the presidency of the M. I. T. A. A. to which he was elected about a month ago.

Anderson became manager of the track team at the opening of school a year ago last October and discharged his duties in a most capable fashion. He retained his position at school's opening this fall and took charge of the cross country runners in their work throughout the season. He informed Coach Kanaly some time ago that he was contemplating the move but it was not until after he made the trip to Van Cortland Park N. Y., with the team that was going into the I. C. A. A. A. run there on Nov. 22 that he finally decided to give up his position.

C. H. Talcott '21, has been elected track team manager to take Anderson's place and the vacancy at the head of the A. A. will probably be filled at an early meeting.

PRO MENTOR EXPECTED TO BOOST MAT TEAM'S CHANCES

The elimination bouts for the freshman and varsity wrestling teams started yesterday. The contests will continue until the holidays and an account will be kept of each bout. In this way each man will meet every other man of his weight who is out for the teams and there will be no doubt as to who should be on the teams.

Bridson Green is now coaching the team and will have plenty of time to get the men in shape for the first outside meets. Last year the team had practically no expert coaching before the first meet which was with Andover and as a result lost the meet. The only other meet which was lost last year was the one with Harvard and it was only lost by one point. Brown and Tufts which are both on this year's schedule were defeated by the Technology team last year. As a whole the schedule this year includes much stronger teams than were met with last year.

RUSH CONSTRUCTION WORK

As a fitting closing for the season, a boxing tournament will be held probably around April 1st, which will be open to all students at the Institute. The management of this affair is rapidly completing its plans and expects to have some close competition for the four medals which will be given the victors in the respective weights. There will be four classes, 125-lb., 135, 145 and 158, with the possibility of 115 and 175-lb. classes if enough competitors in these classes can be found. The medals, which are being donated by Mr. James Fitzpatrick, who also gave the loving cups for Field Day, will be of gold, being the exact duplicate of the medals awarded in the national championships, with a slight change in the lettering. The management wishes to announce that if any men come out in the 115 and 175-lb. classes medals will be awarded.

The ultimate result of this tournament, it is expected, will be the recognizing of this activity as a minor sport so that letters may be given all worthy members, as well as the arranging of meets with other colleges. Already the management has

made tentative plans to meet Harvard and University of Penn. and Addicks, the captain expresses the hope that "if we can arrange meets with other colleges in which boxing is a recognized sport, we may secure recognition. The club, which is now in its third year of existence, carries on its activity the whole year through and there is no reason why we should not be recognized before long."

The management also wishes to state that during the week of the exams as well as during the Christmas holidays, Bouteller will not give instruction but special practice will be held, announcements concerning which will appear in THE TECH.

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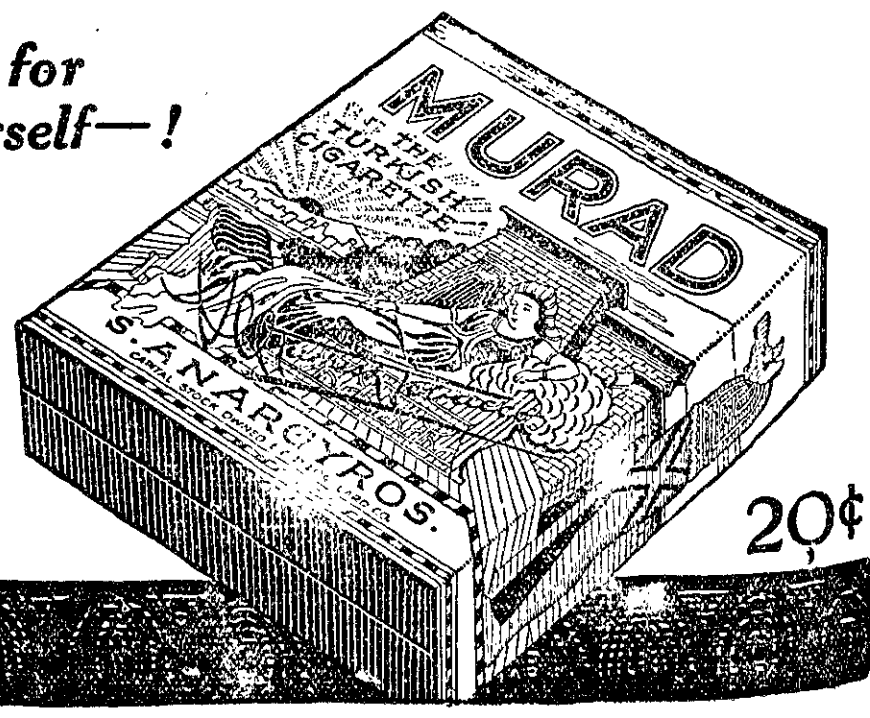
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
