

FRESHMEN LEAD FUND WHILE SENIORS GAIN

Average of 728 Pledges is \$62.00—100% Aero
Meeting Realizes \$4,067—Sections Six
And Two of 1923 100% Pledged

SUBSCRIPTION CARDS DUE TOMORROW

Five hundred and seventy-six new subscribers and \$29,617 represents the gain of the Undergraduate position of the Endowment Fund since the last issue of THE TECH. In order to secure the minimum amount necessary to meet "Mr. Smith's" offer the entire daily contributions to the Fund must average \$30,000 between now and New Years. The freshmen again lead in the percentages, having up until noon yesterday obtained 238 subscriptions for 34.3 per cent of the class with an average of \$51 per subscription. The Seniors jumped into second place in the matter of percentages, having obtained six times as many subscribers as they had last Monday or 31.7 per cent of the class. The honor of having the highest average subscription and \$70.25 per subscriber, falls to the Junior class. The Sophomore end of the campaign seems to be lacking since out of 1049 members the committee has only managed to dig up 193 subscriptions.

The Tech Night committee last Wednesday, turned over \$69.10 to the fund, representing the entire profits.

Aero Society 100% Subscribed

The officers of the Aeronautical Engineering Society succeeded in obtaining 100 per cent subscription from those present at their smoker last Tuesday. They obtained 73 new subscriptions during the course of the evening and a total of \$4,067 towards the fund. President A. L. Morse '21 expects to obtain subscriptions from all of the members of the A. E. S. who did not happen to be present at the meeting.

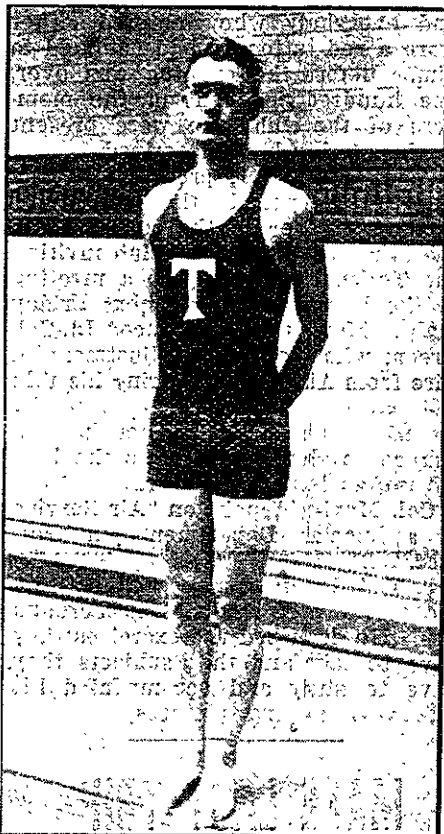
CAPTAIN IS CHOSEN FOR SWIMMING TEAM

Represent THE TECH at Student Volunteer
Convention at Des Moines

THE TECH is to be represented at the Student Volunteer Convention, to be held in Des Moines, Iowa, from December 31 to January 4, by R. A. St. Laurent '21 the Advertising Manager. His entire expenses are to be paid by the paper, and he will keep it informed on the progress of events. Provided that money can be secured for some of the delegates' expenses, the Institute will be represented by its full quota of 33 men.

This decision was reached by a unanimous vote of the Institute Committee on November 6, at which time a committee was appointed, consisting of Dean Burton, Professor Pearson, N. G. Abbott, '20, W. R. McKenney, '20, S. H. Wells '20 and Mr. W. M. Ross, general secretary of the T. C. A., to select Technology's representatives. The following names have been added to the list, which was published in THE TECH on November 14: M. H. Pai '20, P. S. Wilder '23, S. W. Freese '22, J. S. Rafferty '22, W. H. Noyes '22, I. D. Jakobson '21, H. O. Davidson '20, H. R. Kepner '20, W. L. Cofren '20 and W. L. West '23. Professor Pearson and Mr. Ross are to accompany the students.

six o'clock in the Grill Room of the Walker Memorial, to which all of the delegates have been invited. A report of the Committee in charge of the trip, viz., E. G. Farrand '20, C. H. Reed '20 and R. A. St. Laurent '21, will be submitted, a delegation leader appointed and a plan to raise the remainder of the necessary funds discussed. The following churches are considering paying all or part of the expenses of one or more delegates: Old South Congregational, Mr. Vernon Congregational, Central Congregational, First Baptist, St. Paul's Cathedral, Epworth Methodist-Episcopal, Cambridge Congregational and First Congregational of Newton Center.

The Convention, which is supposed to be held every student generation, is to be attended this year by 6,000 delegates representing 1,000 Colleges and Universities from all parts of the United States and Canada and is intended to bring into closer contact the students of these institutions, to study the problems of evangelizing the non-Christian peoples and "to unite in prayer and work for a great advance in the direction of extending the kingdom of Christ among all nations."

Mr. Wallace M. Ross has been selected to take charge of the transportation arrangements for men going from New England Colleges, an exceedingly responsible position, and one requiring no little work.

The first elections of the Class of 1923 were held in Room 2-075 Wednesday. The polls were open from 8.45 till 5.30. Three hundred and twenty eight men out of a class of 694 cast ballots for the fifty one candidates. The number who voted represented forty-seven per cent of the class, a record showing.

The voting was close all through and particularly so in the case of the men running for Treasurer, which was decided by the slight margin of two votes. These men will hold office all this year. Elections for the Sophomore class will be held in March, the men elected then, taking office in 1920.
