son of 1917-18 Greene, with Bowen, alternated in placing either first or second in every event he entered. During that year he defeated Keyser of the University of Pennsylvania in the 220 yards dash in the remarkably fast time of 2.40. He also won the individual championship of the class of '21, capturing first places in both the 100 and 220 yards dashes, and taking second in the plunge.

Last year Greene was vice-captain of the Varsity team, and while acting in that capacity continued his good work of the previous season with almost unflinching regularity. In the intercollegiate he placed fourth out of an excellent field of entries in the 220. Although a plunger of no mean ability, it is as a sprinter that he is particularly proficient, and it is probable that he will confine his efforts to the 220 yard dash during the present season. His most recent trials in this event have been timed at 2.46.

At yesterday's meeting it was decided by the members of the freshman squad to postpone the election of a captain for that team for several weeks. The first freshman meet takes place on the afternoon of January 23, with the Huntington School in Boston, and it is probable that the yearling leader will be chosen a few days previous to this date.

As a correction to a statement appearing in a late issue of THE TECH, it may be said that the first Varsity meet is not with Wesleyan on December 12, as was then announced, but with Brown, on the evening of January 17. This initial meet will be held at Providence, and in addition to laboring under the handicap of a strange pool, Technology's representatives will be forced to face one of the most formidable teams on the

season's schedule. Every man from the strong Brown Varsity team of last year has returned to that college, and their candidates also number several aquatic stars of former seasons.

During the coming weeks, Varsity and freshman practice will be held as usual on Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons. In addition to Coach Alex Sutherland, a few of the more experienced men will aid in the training of candidates.

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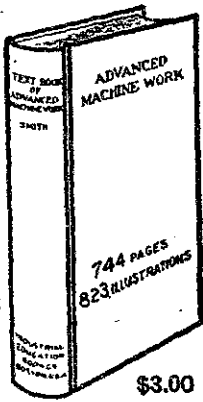
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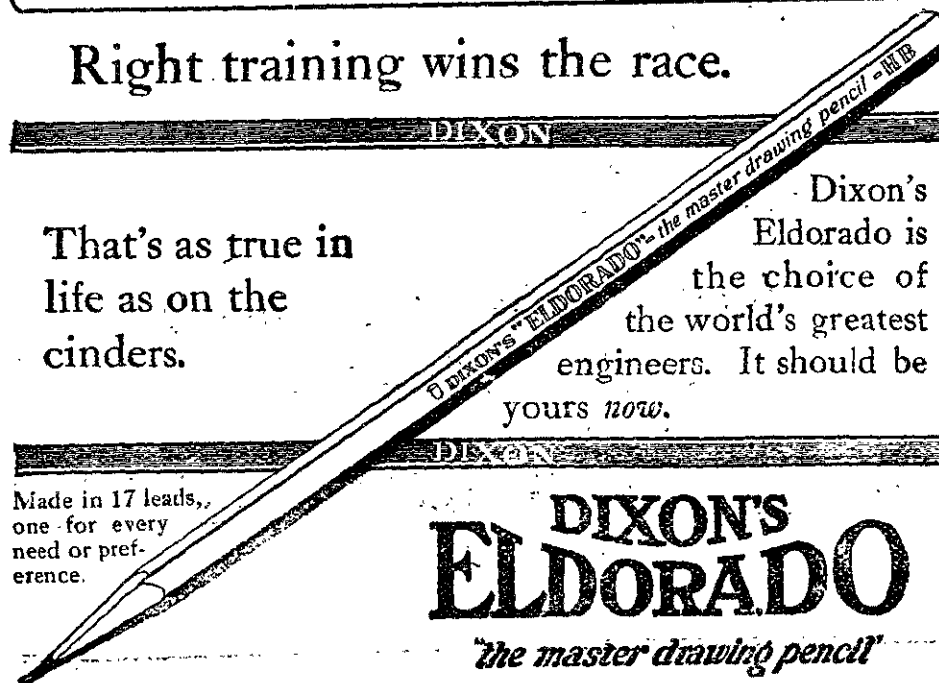


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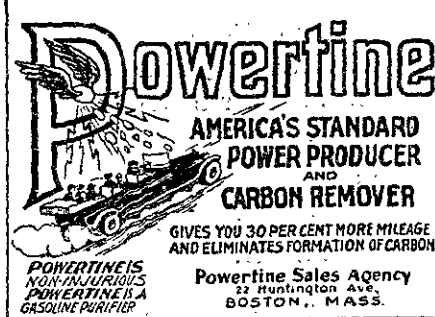
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
