HOCKEY CANDIDATES COME OUT IN FORCE

More Than One Hundred Report In Response to First Call—C. L. Foote, ex-Technology man, Will Coach

PRACTICE BEGAN YESTERDAY

Technology's hopes for a champion hockey team received a big boost Friday afternoon when over a hundred men, including three who have received offers from professional Canadian teams, met in room 10-267 in answer to the first call for candidates. At the meeting it was announced that C. L. Foote, who attended the Institute for a year as a member of the class of 1916, had been selected as coach.

The meeting was opened by the varsity manager, R. F. Officer '21, who, after saying a few words, introduced C. Cochran '18, who was captain of the 1917 team. Cochran, in a short talk, urged the students to come out regularly and support the team and emphasized the fact that the new rink in the Technology Block makes possible a more successful season than ever before.

Coach Foote was then introduced and he expressed his pleasure at the showing made at the meeting. He announced that most of the big colleges were this year to play six-man hockey as an experiment, and that this would be the style of game that the Technology team would play. Due to this change of style, men with comparatively little experience will be able to compete on even terms with those who have become expert in the old method. After making a few remarks on the subject of training and advising all those who do not expect to put their every effort into hockey to drop out, he closed with the statement that with the proper support Technology can have an intercollegiate champion team.

Coach Foote, after leaving Technology, became actively interested in hockey and has since been very prominent in the sport. He played for two years with the Colonials of Boston when they were American amateur champions, was with the B. A. A. for two years, played one year on the New Haven Wanderers, and for two years, has been coaching the hockey team at St. Marks School.

It was announced that practice would begin on Monday, December 8, with a blackboard talk in room 10-267 at 5.00 o'clock which all candidates were expected to attend, followed on Tuesday by blackboard work for the forwards and on Wednesday for the defense, in the same room at the same time. It is expected that after the rink is opened there will be two hours practice each week required of every man.

PROVISIONAL CHOICE MADE FOR FRESH WRESTLING TEAM

Five men have been temporarily picked by Coach Gracey for the freshman wrestling team and it is expected that the two remaining positions will be filled by the end of the week. The following men represent the team in their respective classes: Yung, 105 pounds; Warburton, 115 pounds; Quealy, 125 pounds; Herrick, 135 pounds; and Adams, 158 pounds.

As yet no one has been chosen in the 145 pound class and there is no heavyweight candidate. Coach Gracey says that these choices are not final, but merely represent likely candidates for the team. Any one wishing to challenge any of the above men may do so. The elimination bouts will be continued through this week and part of next.

M. K. Quealy, wrestling in the 125 pound class, is easily the best matman out for the freshman team, being able to handle with ease men twenty pounds heavier than himself. Quealy wrestled at Andover during 1918 and 1919 where he was one of the best wrestlers of his weight.

An appeal is made to any freshman of over 158 pounds to come out for heavyweight wrestler. As yet there are no candidates for this position and unless someone turns out in the near future the team will be seriously handicapped in this respect. No previous experience is necessary.

The schedule of meets is not as yet known, but all the freshman meets will be held during the winter term so that from now until the end of this term the elimination bouts will continue with the idea of definitely picking the team before next January.

SECURE GYM COACH

Dr. David Montgomery Will Handle Team This Season

There is every indication that when the gym team starts out in quest of victories after the Christmas holidays, it will be represented by a strong and well balanced aggregation. Dr. David Montgomery, the gym team's new coach, after having worked with the squad for more than a week has chosen a tentative varsity team.

Dr. Montgomery is a house surgeon at the Cambridge hospital and is an old timer on gym team work. He is proficient on every form of apparatus and will be a valuable asset to the team. He has selected the following men for the varsity squad:

Pew '22 an intercollegiate champion in club swimming and also on the parallel bars, McKinstry '21, an almost sure point winner on the parallels; Rafferty '22 and acting captain Humphrey '22, a very strong combination on the rings—the latter being of intercollegiate calibre; Follinsbee '22, a star on the rings and also a good climber; Walton '22, on the parallels; Wood '21, another tumbler; Phillips '21, on the parallel bar; Bower '20, on the horse and also in the tumbling events; Brink unclassified, on the horse and horizontal bar.

The men who will comprise the varsity squad will be fitted for uniforms this week and they will do them some time after the Christmas holidays.

SHOOTING MATCH FEATURES FIRST RIFLE CLUB SMOKER
