The club was awarded a budget, and the men on the team can get the bTt. Now actually representing the Institute, the club will have matches with Universities of Pennsylvania, Penn State, Harvard, Tufts, Boston College, and others.

Boxing started at the Institute in 1912. In 1917, when it moved to the Walker Memorial, sixty men were enrolled. Now there are 131 men connected with boxing here. There is plenty of good material for the team, but the management would like to have more candidates. There is a good chance for new men, especially those in the 158 and 175 pound classes. Frank Boutelier, who is a lieutenant in the fire department, is the coach.

There are nine men in competition for manager and assistant manager. Allen Addicks '21, the captain of the team, wants more Juniors to come out for manager. The holder of this office becomes a member of the M. I. T. A. A., and gets the bTt also. The competition for manager will be short and probably will be over by the third week in January.

The picture of the club for Technique will not be taken Saturday as previously announced, but will be taken next term. It is also announced that all freshmen who wish to substitute boxing for physical training must sign up for it before December 16.

Coach Bridson Green works with the varsity team twice a week and the men are rapidly getting into shape.

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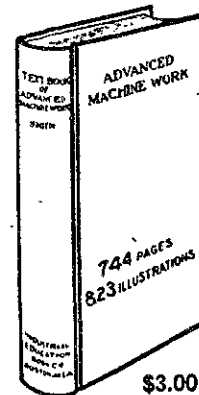
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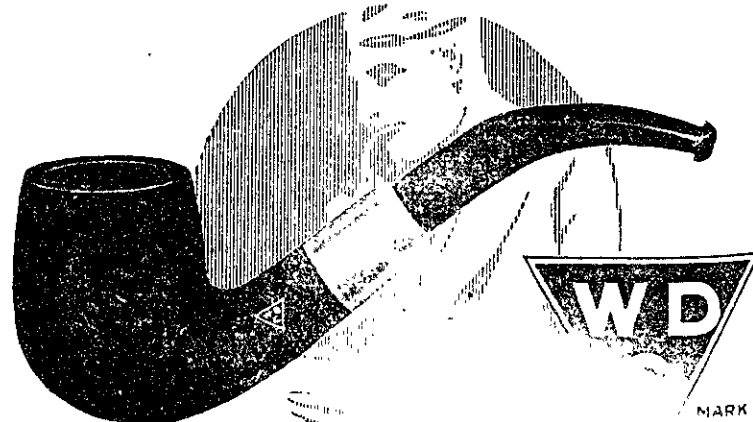
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
