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TUFTS PROVES EASY VICTIM IN HOCKEY

Institute Sextet of Puck
Chasers Trips Medford
Aggregation 4-2, in Season's
Opener

MACNEILL GETS THREE GOALS

Technology's hockey team opened its season with a 4-2 victory over the Tufts sextet, Friday night at the Ice Pavilion in the Tech Block. It was the first appearance of an Institute hockey team since 1916, after which season the sport was dropped here, and Friday night's success augurs well for a big season on the ice.

The score of the game does not clearly indicate the superiority of the Institute skaters. They were on the offensive throughout the entire thirty minutes of play, in fact, it was too much offensive work that gave Kurlin of Tufts on two occasions, the oppor-

tunity to slip away with the puck and score goals.

Both scores of the Medford collegians were gathered in by the coverpoint in the second half and both scores came in the same way. Tech's defence men were drawn up into the center of the rink and Kurlin grabbed the puck and broke through, leaving no one between him and the goal, but Archibald. The Institute goalie made a game effort to stop him on each occasion, but the Tufts man's shot went true.

Des Marais Scores Early

Technology scored in the first period directly after the start of the game when Des Marais, coverpoint, took the rubber down the side of the rink and beat Murchelson with a pretty shot. The time was 1 minute and 4 seconds. This was the only score of the first half of the game, but throughout the fifteen minutes of play Technology was continually forcing the Tufts defence men to their utmost. Murchelson had eight stops in this half, several of them difficult ones.

Technology got the jump again in the second period and MacNeill caged the puck after 16 seconds of play, taking a pass from Williams and pushing the rubber past Murchelson.

Kurlin got in his two goals and tied up the score in the middle of the second half, and it looked as though the teams would have to battle a "sudden death" period, but MacNeill got busy in the last minute of play and shot a goal in 14 minutes, 32 seconds. Then on top of that he threw in another one for good measure, shooting the puck through the entire Tufts sextet from ten yards in front of the goal two seconds before time was called.

First Half Devoid of Team Play

The Institute men were much faster skaters than the Tufts men and only an absence of team play prevented them from counting more times in the first half. In the second period they appeared with more of the team work and the result was three goals.

Acting Captain Cochrane and Des Marais in the Institute defence line played a wonderful game, their only mistake being in letting Kurlin slip through for his two goals. A little more care on their parts would have prevented this.

Dan MacNeill was a tower of strength at the center position. He proved that he was a man of experience at the game. His three goals speak well for his shooting eye and his stick handling was of the best.

Williams on the left wing, a former Queen's College star, teamed up well with MacNeill. It was his feeding to the center that enabled Mac. to send in one of his goals.

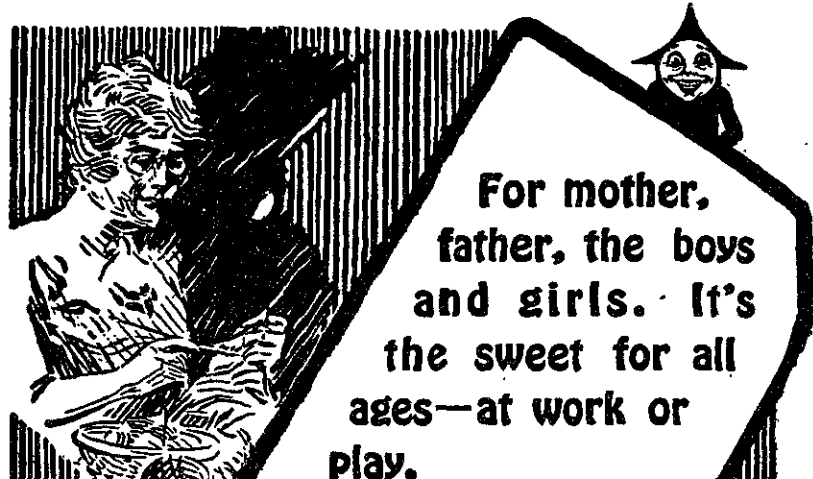
H. Rosenfeld '21 in the 158-pound class won a decision from H. Dodge of Brown after a hard-fought bout.

W. W. Russell '22 of Technology wrestled twice with B. Shurtleff. It was originally arranged for Russell to wrestle Shurtleff in the 175-pound class and also to wrestle the Brown heavyweight man, but when Shurtleff threw Russell in the 175-pound bout in 3 minutes and 40 seconds, which was the first bout of the evening, it was decided to have Shurtleff wrestle in the heavyweight class for Brown. This made two bouts between Russell and Shurtleff. The last battle between the heavyweights was excitement from beginning to end, and finally resulted in a fall for Russell in 6 minutes and 45 seconds.

Each fall counted 4 points and a decision 2 points, making the final score Technology 14—Brown 8.

After the meet W. W. Russell '22 was elected captain of the team. Russell came here from Andover after spending his share of time "over there." He was captain of the football team in 1917 and 1918 and also captain of the wrestling team in 1918.

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
