The partnership, Stone & Webster, started in 1884 when Charles A. Stone and Edwin S. Webster sat side by side at Institute entrance examinations. They roomed together at Technology, graduated in 1888 in the first electrical engineering class ever graduated in America, and in 1889 formed the first strictly electrical engineering firm in the country. Today Stone & Webster have a nationwide reputation as doctors of "sick" enterprises. Since the beginning of the war, the activities of the firm have become international and Mr. Stone is now president of the American International Corporation. Colossal construction work in Russia, 1100 miles of railroad in China, a multiplicity of

business interests in South America; these are a few of the many achievements of the new corporation. The government shipbuilding enterprise at Hog Island was conceived, financed, and officered by Technology men under the able leadership of Stone & Webster.

Mr. Stone has always taken the keenest interest in Technology and was President of the Alumni Association when the present buildings were dedicated. The house of the president of the Institute, Dr. Richard C. MacLaurin, was a joint gift from Stone & Webster.

EDMUND HAYES

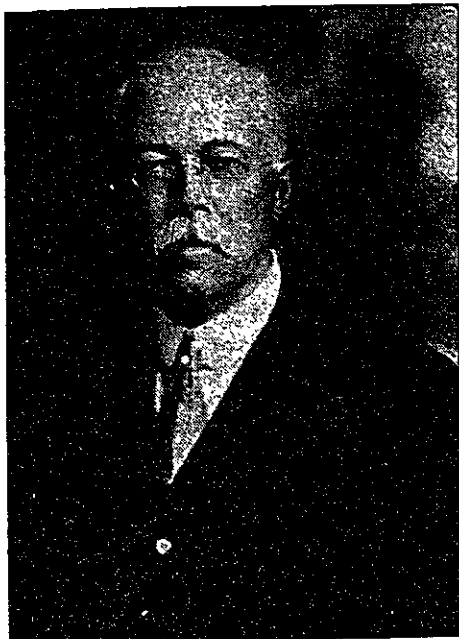
General Edmund Hayes, one of the most prominent men of Buffalo was a student at Technology in the Class of 1873. The achievement that brought him into public attention was the building of the cantilever bridge across the gorge at Niagara Falls. This undertaking was under the spur of railway necessity and was accomplished in record time. Since that date General Hayes, who holds his title through state military service, has been engaged in engineering projects in all parts of the world.

A recent newspaper article tells of the following anecdote of General Hayes:

"General Hayes is probably the only American who ever lent his bathing suit to a King. Some years ago when Albert of Belgium made his first trip to America, he spent a few days at Nantucket. General Hayes, who is 6 ft. 4 in. tall and correspondingly broad was the only man in the place whose bathing suit was big enough to fit King Albert, and during the King's stay the two men used the same suit, going in at different hours. When

King Albert wanted to go bicycle riding, a search was made for a bicycle big enough for him, and again General Hayes came to the rescue and lent the King his wheel."

General Hayes has been notable for his public spirit and has been especially devoted to Technology. He was recently elected a life member of the Corporation of the Institute.

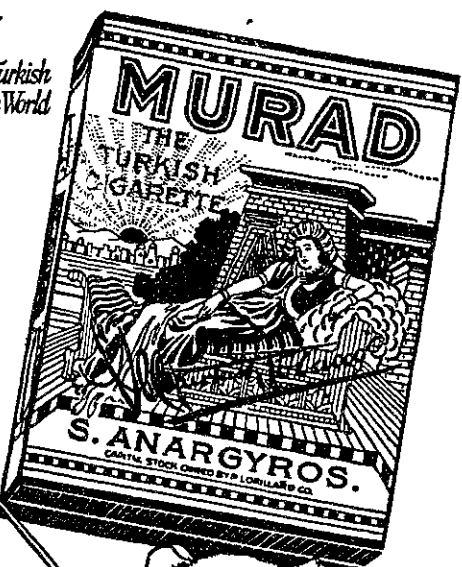
