

CHOSE CAPTAIN

W. L. Stewart Will Lead Freshman Swimmers This Season

W. L. Stewart, Jr., '23, was elected captain of the freshman swimming team at a meeting of all the members of the yearling squad Wednesday afternoon. Stewart's choice was unanimous, only one ballot being necessary to decide the election.

The new leader's record is an enviable one, and proves his fitness for the position to which he has been chosen. Although this is his first year at the Institute, it is not his first in intercollegiate competition, as he spent twelve months at Leland Stanford University before matriculating at Technology.

At the California institution he was a member of both freshman and varsity swimming teams in 1916, being a team-mate of the famous Norman Ross and at the same time of Clark D. Greene '21, who was recently elected captain of this year's varsity at the Institute.

After a year at Leland Stanford, Stewart entered the service, and following his discharge matriculated at Technology. He appears to possess all the qualifications of an ideal cap-

tain, being generally popular among his team-mates as well as a star in the tank.

Just what events he will enter in the coming freshman meets it is difficult to state, as he is an all-around swimmer and does not center his efforts on any one distance. He will undoubtedly swim in the relay, and possibly in either the 50, 100, or the 220-yard dashes. While at Stanford, Stewart was considered one of the fastest breast-strokers on the coast.

At Wednesday's meeting R. M. Homberg was named freshman manager.

WILL SEND WEST POINTERS TO TECHNOLOGY NEXT YEAR

It is the intention of the War Department to send each year twenty-five or thirty West Pointers, upon graduation, to Technology for further instruction.

The idea underlying this plan is that the War Department realizes that the training at West Point does not give future army officers adequate technical instruction or knowledge. Therefore, the most promising men of the military academy are coming to the Institute for at least one year of intensified instruction in the technical and engineering subjects to be assigned to them.

T. C. A. INAUGURATES PLAN TO BE OF REAL SERVICE

The Technology Christian Association book exchange has decided to become more than a medium for exchanging books for the students. It plans to abandon its former policy of semi-defensive and take up an aggressive offensive.

Up to the present time any books to be sold were left at the exchange. A volume of \$500 worth of business has been done in this line. In many cases the books left at the office were not of a nature required by the present courses of study at the Institute. The association has sent out letters to men having books at the exchange informing them that all books must be called for, or some information given regarding their disposal before February 1. After that time all books will be disposed of by the T. C. A. at its discretion, and the proceeds applied to the general work of the organization.

T. C. A. Will Be of Real Help

This measure has been taken to clear up the shelves in preparation for the inauguration of the new policy. E. R. Clarke '21 of the book exchange plans to see the heads of the various departments and learn from them just what books the students will require for the future courses of study. He will then conduct an active advertising campaign to secure the books from students who wish to dispose of them.

WILL RUN HARVARD

Relay Team Will Meet Crimson at B. A. A. Games

It has been definitely decided that Technology will meet both Harvard and Dartmouth in special relay races at the B. A. A. games on February 7 in addition to the regular track and field events. The relay with Harvard will be a 1560-yard event, each man running 390 yards; a four-man team will run Dartmouth in a 730-yard per man race. The frosh will run a three-cornered race with Holy Cross and Dartmouth.

The relay teams for this meet and the rest of the indoor season will be chosen from the results of the trials on January 24. The trials on January 17 will count slightly in the picking of the teams, but the final trials will practically decide the teams.

Contrary to reports printed in the Boston papers, the meet scheduled for February at Mechanics building will be run there. The management has not heard from Tufts or Holy Cross concerning this meet and it is still doubtful whether this meet will be a dual frolic with Harvard, triangular or quadrangular.

Technology will enter a team in the Millrose games for the Intercollegiate one-mile event at Madison Square Garden, New York on February 10. The management has decided not to send a team to the Tenth Infantry games at Albany.

ELECTRICALS WILL VISIT MAIN TELEPHONE EXCHANGE

The M. I. T. Branch, American Institute of Electrical Engineers has arranged for a trip through the Milk Street exchange of the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. on Thursday, January 22. The party will leave room 10-203 at 1.15 o'clock. Members desiring to take the trip must sign up at the bulletin board outside room 10-203 before Tuesday, January 20. The men will be shown how calls are handled on the Main and Beach switchboards and will then be taken behind the scenes. There, they will have the opportunity of inspecting the automatic ringing devices and the method of connecting the labyrinth of wires from the cables of the switchboards.

The society pins have arrived and may be secured at room 10-203 daily from 1.00 until 2.00 o'clock upon payment of thirty-five cents. The men who signed up for them are requested to obtain them promptly. Otherwise, they will be issued to others who want them.

BOXING TRYOUTS TODAY

The members of this team will take all the trips to other colleges and will get their b.t.t.

Mr. Fitzpatrick, the well-known boxing enthusiast, will be here to assist in selecting the boxers. Forty colleges have been written to and matches have been arranged with the U. of P., Dartmouth, Yale, Harvard, and Boston University. Contrary to a previous announcement, Coach Frank Boutellier will accompany the team on its trip to Philadelphia. Mr. Fitzpatrick will also go.

Eight men are in the competition for managerial positions. The manager will be a Junior; the first assistant a Sophomore, and the second assistant a freshman. The competitors are: J. C. Crosby '21; E. Howard '21; H. D. Folinsbee '22; G. W. Bergman '23; C. Greenwalt '22; A. Vaughan '23; D. Sayre '23; L. F. Lovejoy '23; and G. J. Sullivan '23. The manager will be chosen before the trip to Pennsylvania, and the assistants in February.

MATMEN TO MEET BROOKLYN POLYTECH AND PRINCETON

Both these meets are to be covered on the same trip. 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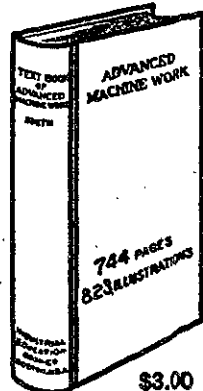
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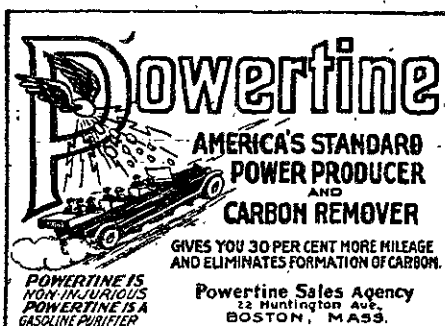
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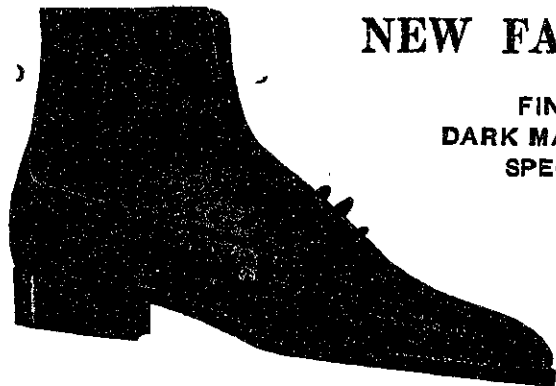
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
