HOLD PRELIM BOUTS

Boxing Club Starts Preparation for Outside Matches

The Boxing Club held a dozen bouts in the Walker gymnasium last Monday evening and as a result the varsity squad, from which the final team will be picked has been raised to twenty-five men. Most of the bouts were close and hotly contested, and a great deal of good material was discovered. The boxing room was crowded with spectators during the whole affair, which lasted from 4:00 to 6:30 o'clock. About seventy-five students were present as spectators.

The best bout was between Egil Christensen '22 and J. F. Downey, Jr. '21. Both men went at it full blast, without the slightest regard for scientific boxing, nevertheless affording spectators a very picturesque scrap. The decision was a draw. H. R. Ten Eyck '22 and C. A. Morss, '21 gave an excellent exhibition in the 135-pound class. Rivalry for the team should be close between these two men and F. C. Paul '22, C. G. Dandrow '21, is a new man in the 175-pound class who should develop fast. T. H. Barnard '22 showed up well in the 115-pound class, and from present indications should make the team. B. E. Proctor '23, a new man in the 175-pound class showed up well.

Bouts With Other Colleges

The first match will be with Harvard on January 31. The Crimson has compulsory boxing for freshmen and has had boxing teams for more than five years. More than one hundred and fifty men are interested in the sport there. Technology's varsity squad will go into training for the Harvard match immediately.

The match with U. of P. has been definitely arranged for March 6 at Philadelphia, having been shifted from January 31 to give the men time to get in shape for the hard team that they will have to meet.

In the near future it is expected that meets will also be arranged with Tufts, Boston University, Dartmouth, Yale, and possibly the N. Y. Aggies and Annapolis.

Every prominent college in New England, about thirty in number, has been written to in an effort to secure matches. There is some prospect of having a regular ring set up as part of the Institute boxing equipment. Ten men have been retained in the competition for manager and an extensive publicity campaign is planned for.

Men who desire pictures of the boxing team which was taken at Notman's should hand in name and address to the boxing room, Tuesday night from 5:00 to 6:00 o'clock.

WRESTLING MEETS POSTPONED

The wrestling meets with Princeton and Brooklyn Polytech at New York have been indefinitely postponed in keeping with the orders of the Institute Committee to suspend activities in keeping with (C. I. C. P. C.) ties until Monday. Both of these meets were to take place this week. The Polytech meet was to be tonight and the team was to go from there to Princeton for a battle tomorrow night. It may be possible to work in these meets later on, but nothing definite has been decided yet.

The meet with Harvard scheduled for January 31st. has also been canceled because the Harvard mid-years come at that time. An attempt is being made to arrange a meet with Tufts to take the place of the Harvard meet.

W. S. Humphrey '22 has been picked to wrestle in the heavyweight class. In the Brown meet Capt. W. W. Russell '22 had to wrestle both the 175-pound and heavyweight classes.

Bridson Green, the coach, says the team is in excellent condition. H. Rosenfeld '21 got a slight cauliflower ear from the Brown meet, but he has almost entirely recovered and will be able to wrestle in the next meet.

RADIO SOCIETY WILL HOLD BIG BANQUET

New England Amateur Wireless Association to Be Guests of Radio Society at Dinner Meeting in February

PROMINENT MEN TO SPEAK

What is expected to be the largest meeting of its kind ever held in this part of the country will take place in the form of a banquet to be given by the M. I. T. Radio Society on February 12. The members of the New England Amateur Wireless Association will be the invited guests of the Radio Society on that evening and will help to swell the convention. The banquet will be held in the Main dining hall of Walker Memorial and will start sharply at 6:30 o'clock.

Many men prominent in the wireless field will be present and speak on subjects of importance to the amateur. Some of the men who are expected to speak are Professor Pierce of Harvard, Professor Bush of the Institute, Professor Pichard, of the Wireless Specialty Company, and Mr. H. B. Maxim, president of the American Radio League. There will also be other entertainment during the course of the evening to be given by the orchestra. The tickets for the banquet will be on sale soon at the price of \$1.50.

The last large meeting of the amateurs of this vicinity was held about a year ago in Filene's Department Store and was attended by some three hundred men from every part of New England and New York. The coming meeting of the M. I. T. Radio Society is expected to eclipse even that.

There will also be a meeting of the Radio society on Tuesday, January 27 in the grill room of Walker Memorial at 7:45 o'clock. It has been arranged to have for speakers men who are actively engaged in amateur work. One of the speakers will be H. C. Gallier, who is the Radio Inspector of this district. In his work he comes in touch with many things that are of great interest to amateurs. The other speaker at the meeting will be Professor Bush of the Institute, who is well known to the members of the society. Following the speaking refreshment will be served.

Anyone interested in the society's work and wishing to join should send their name and address to W. C. Kohl, Box 160 at the Institute. The initiation fee is one dollar and the dues are also a dollar a year, or fifty cents for the remaining of terms.

The radio station which has been closed during the vacation and up to the present, because of repairs to the apparatus, was re-opened on January 9 with the addition of a new one kilowatt sending set, which was loaned to the society by one of its members, H. B. Deal '20. Another Crebe receiving set has been ordered from the factory and is expected daily. When the set is installed the old set will be sent away to the factory for repairs.

The society has been busy up to the present time in setting the station in the best possible condition so that it has had little time for active work among the students, but now hopes to make a drive for more members. Smokers and meetings will be held often in the future, and an effort will be made to interest more students in the study of wireless telegraphy.

T. C. A. TO MAKE DRIVE FOR RUNNING EXPENSES

MEETS CANCELLED

Even after the cancellation of the Brown meet, scheduled for last Saturday, it had been hoped that it would be possible to engage the Red and Blue natators this week, but the order of the Executive Committee decreasing the cessation of all school activities until next Monday has made it necessary for Manager Ralph Geckler '21 to call off the meet with the Philadelphia collegians.

Although the battle with Pennsylvania has been definitely cancelled, that with the Providence mermen may be held at a later date. At the present time Manager Geckler is trying to arrange a meet for some time in February, preferably on the 21st. He is also attempting to secure a contest with Harvard in Boston on either Wednesday or Saturday of next week, and it is probable that his efforts in this direction will be attended with success.

If no meet is arranged with Harvard, the Cardinal and Gray tankmen will oppose Amherst on Friday, February 6, in their first contest of the season. In the meantime practice will be held three times a week for both varsity and freshman squads as usual.

NEW DATE FOR CANCELLED M. E. SMOKER NOT YET SET

Among other activities previously planned for this week, the Smoker of the Mechanical Engineering Society has been postponed temporarily. No date has been set as yet for the meeting.

His subject is "Cooling Towers and Spray Ponds," and deals with the construction and operation of spray cooling systems as applied to condensers and the cooling of water. 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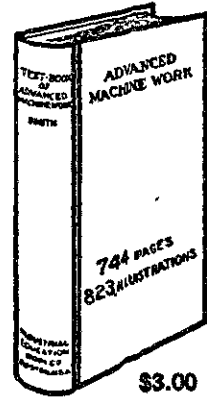
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
