best way to avoid being that unfortunate man is to do the Institute work as it should be done and not to work problems from the answer back.

Refreshments Served

Professor Williams began by remarking that the coloring of metals was a very old industry, for even from the earliest times people have been making "gold bricks." He explained that metals can be decorated in four different ways; namely, mechanically, by alloys, by heating, and chemically. He said that one of the best known of the mechanical methods is by inlays, which were used largely in the Middle Ages for decorating armour. Then he pointed out that while heating is very effective as far as the color goes, it is rather impracticable for the high temperatures break down the metals so treated. Professor Williams told how white gold is an alloy of either gold and nickel or of gold and tin, and explained how various other effects are obtained by alloys. Finally he took up the chemical means of decorating, and pointed to the darkening of rifle-barrels as a practical application.

After Professor Williams finished, refreshments were served in the north hall.

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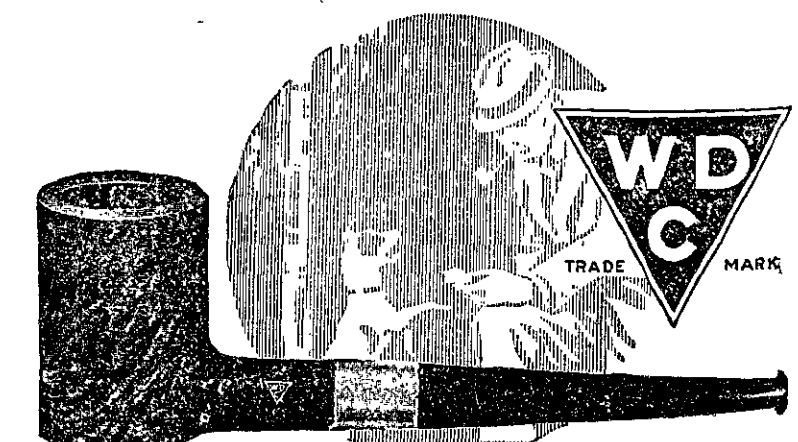
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
