Mr. Fitzpatrick Will Give Gold Medals to Six Winners

The boxing team has decided to hold its preliminary tournament on February 9 and 12, from 5:00 to 6:00 o'clock. The final tournament will be held February 18 and 19. This event is one of the most important in the calendar of the team, as it actually decides what men are to represent the Institute in the sport. The boxing season formally begins at this date and runs through until the end of April.

Mr. Fitzpatrick, who is popularly known as the "Mr. Smith" of the boxing team, will award six gold medals, one to be given to the winner of each weight.

Captain Addicks wishes to announce that those varsity men who expect to take part in the tournament will have to train hard from now on, as the bouts will be of a very fast nature. Each man should be out at least three nights a week, and should make their training consist of shadow boxing and foot work.

The Harvard match has been postponed until the end of February in order to make way for the tournament, which the management wishes to have first. A tentative date has been arranged with Yale, probably March 12. Cornell, Dartmouth and Tufts will make trips to the Institute to meet the team, while the Technology boxers will journey to Springfield and to Boston University.

The competition for manager ended last Saturday, and J. D. Crosby '21, was selected.
