Crimson Defeats Institute Cubs
Tommy Gill '22 was the only man to lead a green runner in the 780-yard race which Dartmouth captured with a half lap lead. Technology's cubs were billed to race the frosh from Holy Cross and Dartmouth but when travel conditions prevented the appearance of the Yale team, they withdrew from the triangular combination and took Yale's place against the Harvard yearlings. Harvard led at the finish despite the strong fight of R. P. Bolster '23 who overcame a lead of ten yards and passed on a three yard advantage.

Bawden Does Not Run in 600.
E. E. Sanborn '22 stayed with the leaders in the handicap mile until the last lap, finishing in fifth place. F. H. Plaisted '23 gave Paine of New Hampshire State a hard race for third place in the handicap 1000 but in the last lap just failed to catch him and Plaisted '22 finished fourth. Bill MacMahon '22 finished fourth in the three-mile with a time of 15 min., 33 sec., trailing Pores, Watson of Syracuse and Leath of New Hampshire. J. O. Merrill '21, running against Earl Thomason of Dartmouth and Sylvester of Missouri failed to place in the hurdles heat. E. A. Merrill '22 dropped out of the high jump at 5 ft., 9 in. Bawden '21 who was expected to show up well in the 660, was saved for the Harvard relay which directly followed this event.

He was a delegate to the Munich Conference of 1907, the London Conference of 1908, the Geneva Conference of 1912, and the Hague Conference of 1913.

Dr. Tryon was born in Boston. He attended Portland High School and Westbrook Seminary and then spent five years in newspaper work, during which he was successively reporter on the Portland Press, city editor on the Portland Evening Express, city editor on the Bangor Commercial, and night editor on the Portland Argus.

In 1894 Dr. Tryon received his A. B. from Harvard and three years later he was awarded a B. D. by the Episcopal Theological School of Cambridge. From then until 1907 he was pastor of All Saints' Church at Attleboro, Massachusetts, and from 1900 to 1907 he was also Rector of the Church of St. John, the Evangelist, at Mansfield, Massachusetts.

Dr. Tryon became assistant secretary of the American Peace Society in 1907, and New England secretary four years later. In 1909 he received a L. L. B. from Boston University, and in the following year a Ph. D. from the same institution. He was admitted to the Maine Bar in 1916 and two years later was admitted to the U. S. District Court Bar.

Optimistic on Treaty Situation.
Dr. Tryon was a delegate to the International Conference at Munich in 1907, at London in 1908, at Geneva in 1912, at the Hague in 1913, and at Lake Constance in 1914. He was a guest at the opening of the Peace Palace at the Hague in 1913, and is a member of the American Society of International Law and the International Law Association of London. He has contributed articles on international law to the "Yale Law Journal" and has written for other publications. During the war he lectured on International Law and War Aims at the University of Maine.

In a paper sent to be read at a meeting of the Political Science Branch of the American Association at St. Louis last December for the advancement of Science he expressed the opinion that the United States Senate would ratify the treaty with substantially the Lodge reservations, but if by any means the League could fail, the peace movement would revive and bring forward another plan for international organization. When asked what he thought of the Treaty, Dr. Tryon said, "I am in favor of the Lodge reservations. In my opinion they do not destroy the effect of the covenant of the League, but protect the interests of the United States and conform to the spirit of the Constitution. America is willing to help Europe, but insists on remaining free."
