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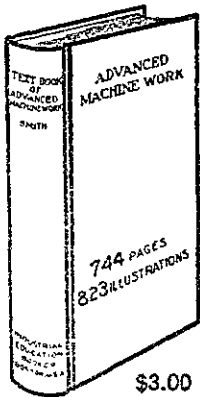
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TACKLE YALE TODAY

Yale's Sprinters are Good.

Yale has a quartet ... of sprinters which last year set a new freshman intercollegiate relay record. The men who established the mark of 2 minutes, 38 3-5 seconds, were Townsend, Cook, Neville, and Schaffer. They have shown some fast times in practice and in meets during the present season, and seem to have bettered their form of last year.

Besides the quartet of sprinters Yale has six members of the 1918 championship squad. E. P. Binney, Jr., who established a new intercollegiate record for fifty yards when he won the event last year in the individual championships in 25 seconds, is reported to be showing good form, and no doubt will be the leading sprint man in intercollegiate ranks this year.

Coach Kiputh's charges have decisively defeated every team they have encountered this year. Against Penn., one of the strongest college combinations, they turned in a score of 38 to 15.

Tomorrow's meet will begin promptly at 8.00 o'clock, and following the Yale-Technology battle, Harvard will encounter Williams in the same pool.

ACTION TAKEN ON OFFICIAL RECOGNITION OF INSIGNIA

At the M. I. T. A. A. meeting held last Tuesday the major part of the discussion referred to the unauthorized wearing of insignia. It was brought up that during the last two years certain undergraduates have worn insignia that has never been awarded to them by official action of the Advisory Council.

This has been particularly true in the case of class numerals. Many of those who have not been officially awarded insignia, have worn it, not knowing that none is authorized until the athlete has received written notification of the award.

All those who have not received insignia to which they believe themselves entitled should write to the M. I. T. A. A., Walker Memorial, stating the time, place and performance which should have been rewarded with insignia. The management of the association wishes, however, to point out the sections of the rules of the Advisory Council regarding awards of letters or numerals, which are contained in "Concerning M. I. T."

None of this applies to those who won numerals in the Field Day contests last fall. They have been awarded the insignia, and will shortly receive notification.

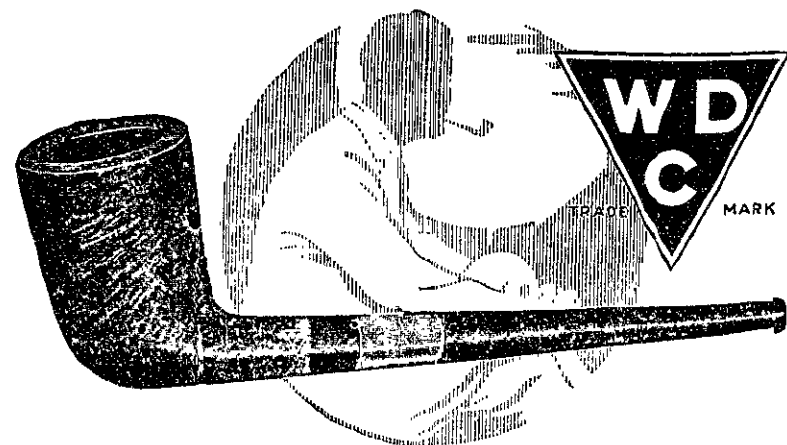
