E. J. Sperry Speaks to Naval
Arch and M. E. Societies

A joint smoker is to be given by the Mechanical Engineering and Naval Architecture Societies in the north hall of Walker Memorial on Thursday, Feb. 26 at 8.00 o'clock. Mr. Elmer J. Sperry will speak on the gyro compass.

Mr. Sperry, who is president of the Gyroscope Company, has made extensive experiments in the field of gyroscopes, and from them he has developed a gyroscopic stabilizer to prevent excessive rolling of ships and the gyroscopic compass, which does away with the uncertain deviations of the magnetic compass. The talk will be illustrated by lantern slides, and those in charge of the affair say it will be of great interest to the members of both societies.

The Yale swimming team outclassed the Technology mermen in the pool of the Boston Y. M. C. A. last Saturday night, walking away with a dual meet by the score of 42 to 11. The Elis captured first place in every event.

The battle was replete with feature performances, chief of which was the plunging of Dick Meagher of Yale. The New Haven boy broke the record for distance in the local tank, covering 73 feet 6 inches in the allotted time of a minute. Until Saturday the record had been held by Irving Jaquith of the Brookline Swimming Club, whose mark for the pool had been 73 feet.

Prof. Sedgwick Goes to England As First Exchange Professor

Head of Department of Biology
and Public Health Will Spend
His Time at Universities of
Cambridge and Leeds

WILL STAY DURING SUMMER

By an agreement between the late Dr. MacLaurin and the Vice-Chancellors of the Universities of Cambridge and Leeds for the exchange of professorships, Professor Sedgwick of the department of biology and public health will leave for England in April as the first exchange professor.

Soon after the visit of the British Educational Commission to America, Dr. MacLaurin suggested to the Vice-chancellors of the English Universities that better educational understanding and international good fellowship might be promoted by the creation of a system of exchange professorships. The suggestion was welcomed by Sir Arthur Shipley and Sir Michael Hadler, of the Universities of Cambridge and Leeds.

Dr. William Sedgwick was nominated as the first exchange professor. He will leave for England with Mrs. Sedgwick early in April, and will establish his residence at the universities, between which he will divide his time. They will spend the summer in Europe and return to Boston in September. Owing to the war conditions it is not likely that any one will be sent to the Institute until next year.

WILL REVIVE LECTURES

Dean Homer V. Albers of the Boston University School of Law is to revive next term a series of lectures in Business Law which he formerly gave at the Institute. About two years ago this course, which was required of all third year students, was discontinued because of war-time conditions. This year it is to be given during the third term as a General Study. Previous to 1918 Dean Albers lectured here for a number of years, and was very popular with the students.

Twenty six men were elected to the committee because five tied for the last four places, and it was felt that they all should be on.

These men will hold their first meeting on Friday, February 20, in room 10-275 at 5.00 o'clock. These meetings will occur at least three times a week during the next three months. This length of time is necessary as the election of the board is done carefully in order to select the best men.

The Business Manager, Treasurer, two Associate Business Managers, the Art Editor, and two Associate Art Editors are chosen by competition by the Technique 1921 Board, and are recommended to the Electoral Committee for election to the 1922 Board. The Committee picks the Editor-in-Chief and the seven Editors. These take care of the Portfolio, Societies, Athletics, Faculty, Grinds, Photographic and Statistics sections of the year book.
