

BOXING TEAM HOLDS PRELIMINARY BOUTS

Fast Work Features Tournament Which Christens New Ring—Mr. Fitzpatrick Presents Pair of Gloves

FINALS COME TOMORROW

The Boxing Team held its preliminary tournament last Thursday, using its new ring for the first time. Mr. Fitzpatrick was one of the referees, and added to his list of gifts by presenting the team with a pair of boxing gloves. There were 200 spectators present.

As a result of the bouts, T. H. Barnard '22 won in the 115 pound class, and Allen Addicks '21, captain of the team, was the successful man in the 125 pound class. There was an especially close contest in the 135 pound class between C. A. Morss, Jr. '21, who was champion at Harvard for three years, and F. C. Paul '22, who was champion at the Institute last year in his weight, Paul finally won, and will meet H. R. Ten Eyck in the finals.

In the 145 pound class M. J. Bergen '22 won in the first round, and he will meet Egil Christensen in the finals. In the 158 pound class F. L. Bradley '20 won from L. T. Blood '22. In the fastest bout of the evening, Harry Rosenfield '21 won from Arthur Craig '22. F. C. Koch '21 and J. E. Connor '22 came together and made a fine exhibition. Koch won the bout in spite of the fact that he is only a beginner. In the 175 pound class C. T. Proctor beat D. C. Sayre '23.

H. R. Ten Eyck '22 in the 135 pound class, is doing fine work. He has developed a left hand attack which is very formidable. Competition should be very keen between him and F. C. Paul '22, who made a good chowing against Willie Corbett '21 last year. Egil Christensen '22 is one of the hardest hitters in the 145 pound class, and he should show up well with a little more experience.

STUDENTS EXCHANGED

First Man From Belgium is Now at Institute

Under a special agreement with the Belgian universities, an exchange of twelve students with this country has been arranged by Herbert Hoover. Although the actual exchange will not take place until the next scholastic year an advance student under this plan, M. Deschamps, is now studying at Technology, arriving in New York on the Mauretania Monday, February 9.

The requirement for this exchange is a speaking knowledge of the English language, a certain status of social rank and a special standing in scholastic work. M. Deschamps has already done considerable work at the University of Brussels and is now studying for a doctor's degree in chemistry from that institution.
