Story of Plant is Remarkable

There were employed at the plant up to within three or four months ago about 35,000 men and women. The plant has produced so far 85 ships launched and 72 ships delivered, and these 72 ships delivered have traveled on the seas 1,000,000 miles and carried something over \$25,000 tons of cargo, and there never has been an instance of a single failure of any of these ships due to poor workmanship or material.

The story of the conception, design and construction of the plant, together with the construction and remarkable performance of the ships reads like a miracle. Mr. Brush has accepted an invitation to show to the students of Technology and to such guests as the student body may invite, a ten-reel moving picture, taken over a period of two years at the plant, showing in detail the complete construction of the plant from the time it was a marsh to the complete shipyard, and the detail construction of a ship from the time the steel arrived at the plant until the ship is entirely completed, launched, outfit, had its trial trips, delivered and gone to sea, including a moving picture of the first ship delivered unloading in a foreign port.

Will Explain Pictures

This probably is one of the most remarkable industrial moving pictures ever taken and has cost a very substantial expenditure of money and much effort and time. The picture is yet has never been shown in public, the only instance where anyone has seen it has been at small private gatherings and it is not intended in this instance that the exhibit should be of a public character but for the benefit of the Institute and its students and friends.

Mr. Brush will at the same time the picture is shown, explain the picture in detail. The fact that there are 122 ships to be built; that 85 have now been launched, with a balance of only 37 to be launched, there being 50 ways in all, leaves at present 13 vacant ways. The fact that many months past they have been delivering complete ships to the Government at the rate of seven per month, it can therefore be readily seen that the plant is rapidly approaching the time of the completion of the contract and the discontinuance of the ship construction work.

Questions May Be Asked

Mr. Brush thoroughly covered this

entire subject on January 30th, a year ago, before the Senate Commerce Committee in Washington, since which time there has been no public statement showing what has been accomplished since that time.

It is assumed that he will be prepared to answer any and all questions that may be put to him by the students about the property or the entire program of the ship construction as carried on at the time of the testimony before the Senate Commerce Committee.

The address will be of an extremely interesting nature to all Institute men, particularly those who anticipate after graduation having anything to do with engineering or industrial plants, the work of handling men in operating or any large interests. Naturally the students in Naval Architecture, Civil Engineering, Mechanical and Electrical Engineering will find much in the talk and the pictures that will directly apply to the work in their business life for which they are now preparing.

Manager Ralph C. Geckler '22 stated on Wednesday that he expects a crowd in attendance on Monday. The meet will begin promptly at 5.00 o'clock and will probably last an hour. Admission to the seats at the sides of the pool will be free, and students from both institutions will have equal opportunity to witness the contest.

Harvard's mermen, while of high-class caliber, are not generally considered the peers of the Cardinal and Gray natators. While the Crimson webfeet downed Williams last Saturday, their times were not as fast in the majority of the events as those clocked against the Institute amphibians when they were sunk by the Blue on the same evening.

VOTE BONUS TO TEACHERS

The first expenditure of any part of the eight million dollar Endowment Fund recently raised at the Institute has been announced by the administrative committee in the appropriation of \$100,000 for the award of bonuses to the members of the instructing staff for the remainder of the current academic year. The corporation is at present developing plans for a new salary schedule for the staff to take effect in the fall.

Dorm Teams Get Going.

Bawden "Obviously Best."

Captain Bawden all but refused to let his team take the field in Saturday's meet. Coach Kanaly said at the time that he would not have allowed the meet to go on but rules of the advisory council forbid him taking any such action. The Crimson foresaw the storm and acted quickly by calling the men out for the first heat of the hurdles. With the meet on, the Institute men decided to go through and take their medicine.

The trouble started when Harvard announced at the meet that there would be no two mile run. This was Technology's strong race, with Capt. Bill MacMahon of the cross country team as the stellar performer for the Cardinal and Gray. The Harvard authorities say that the calling off of the long jaunt was arranged before hand. Coach Kanaly says it was not.

But the meet went on after Harvard agreed to run off the two mile run a week later. In the six hundred yard Bawden, the Technology leader was the favorite to win but he did not. Boston papers of the following day said he was "obviously the best man in the events". Spectators and team-mates of the Institute captain said he did not have a chance to win, being completely and deliberately boxed all the way. Ted Spitz says they pushed Bawden in to the snow.

B. C. Breaks Recently

The freshman-Harvard '23 meet was scheduled for two weeks ago and due to the extremely cold weather was postponed to the following Wednesday. Wednesday came and with it word from Pooch Donovan that he wanted the board track at Soldier's Field for varsity relay trials so the freshman meet was off. Boston College officially broke relations with Harvard two months ago, alleging discrimination against by the Crimson management in the making out of one of the schedules which omitted the University Heights team from the Harvard list. Technology refrained from the drastic action taken by the B. C. authorities.

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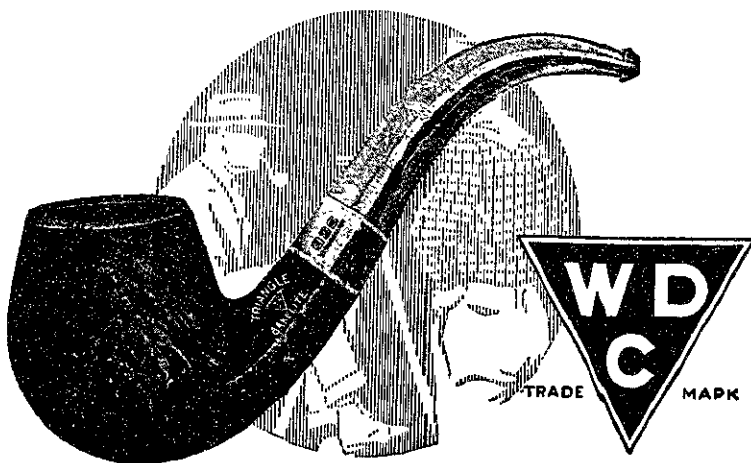
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
