PROFESSOR JACKSON SAYS INDUSTRIAL OUTLOOK STRONG

Many Corporations Unable to Secure Trained Men.

"The present industrial outlook," said Professor C. D. Jackson, head of the Electrical Engineering Department, when asked about the employment situation, "I believe to be very favorable and strong." He went on to state that the demand for competent workers is larger now than at previous times and that there are not nearly enough men to fill vacancies.

General Electric, Stone and Webster, Western Electric, Western Union, Standard Oil and hundreds of other large corporations are looking for men about to graduate or else taking graduate courses. The salaries offered are considerably larger than those paid in the past yet suitable workers are lacking. Many concerns have written the department in an effort to secure men but the supply of technically trained men is so inadequate that only a small percentage have been successful.

MILITARY SCIENCE CLASS SIMULATES COURT-MARTIAL

The advanced units in military science substituted a mock court-martial for the regular class work last week. The trial held on Saturday was a practical application of their course in military law.

The court was composed of students, with Captain F. M. Green as advocate general and Captain E. W. Putney as counsel for the defense. They tried an imaginary sergeant on charges of A. W. O. L., stealing government property, and finally desertion. Other students acted as witnesses, inventing evidence as their ingenuity suggested, and the court acted on their testimony without coaching from the instructors.

According to the charge sheet, the accused had a date with a girl and was refused a pass, so he absented himself without leave and returned in an intoxicated condition. The first sergeant, being rather hazy as to the proper procedure, confined him to barracks until the return of the company commander. When they came to look for him, he had departed with most of his equipment. Later, he was arrested by a police officer while working on his father's farm and brought back to the post for trial. His defence was typical of such cases, being built up around an ingenious alibi about his "sick father," but with the usual flaws in the circumstantial evidence offered. The court was conducted with all the formality of a real court-martial and was an excellent exercise in the study of the army manual.

LEADING FRENCH AND AMERICAN COLLEGES EXCHANGE STUDENTS

Next year is likely to see a great influx of American students to French universities, in the opinion of H. S. Krans, secretary of the American University Union in Europe. Mr. Krans's new Paris headquarters, facing the Luxembourg Gardens, are being fitted up to receive and advise seekers after knowledge from overseas. Founded shortly after America's entrance in the war, by fifteen of the leading American universities and colleges, the union now has thirty-three American institutions on its membership list, including Harvard, Yale, Columbia, Johns Hopkins, Princeton and other leading universities and colleges throughout the United States.

French teachers and students are constant and eager inquirers at the Union's Paris home. Many of them are anxious to take a course of studies in the United States. Fourteen French students are already studying in American universities on free scholarships from a fund collected by 6000 American students in recognition of the hospitality extended to them by French universities during the war.

The Society for American Fellowships in French universities is planning to send twenty Americans each year to the Sorbonne and other French seats of learning; nor will the Alsatian University of Strasburg be neglected. Twenty-five scholarships for American girls in France are already filled.

DRIVE RESULT GRATIFYING

The recent drive made by the T. C. A. for funds to carry on its work proved most successful. In all the thirty-three sections covered the solicitors reported that every man gave freely and willingly. The results are a barometer of the feeling of the student body toward the work accomplished by the association. The final figures for the campaign show a net sum of \$366.85.

MR. EASTMAN'S FIRST GIFT ANNOUNCED IN MARCH 1912

In his report to the Corporation on March 13, 1912, President MacLaurin emphasized the magnitude of the first gift of a mysterious donor, now known to be Mr. George Eastman, and pointed out that the spirit in which it was given showed a business man at his very best. He especially admired the desire to do a great thing quietly and without any fuss. The reasons for the gift as indicated by the donor were enumerated as follows:

"(First) His belief in the need of the highest technical education today and of its growing importance in the future. (Second) His recognition of the great work that Technology has done and his knowledge of the high esteem with which its alumni are held by those they have served. (Third) His association with men of prominence in England and Germany and their assurance to him that the Institute of Technology is one of the greatest educational forces in the world. (Fourth) His appreciation of the fact that prestige is a great asset to any educational institution and his belief that it should enable the Institute to attract the best students and instructors and so continue to turn out the best product. (Fifth) His agreement with our policy of expansion and with the general plan already announced as to the expansion and the very hearty approval of our choice of a site."

In this same report the late president if the Institute announced the great gift of Gen. T. Coleman DuPont '84 of the sum of \$500,000.

ESTABLISH SCHOLARSHIP IN MINING ENGINEERING

For the purpose of giving more definite encouragement to the inter-American educational movement, the Chili-American Association announced last Tuesday in New York that it has established several scholarships.

The first of these is the association's setting up of a scholarship in the mining engineering course at Technology. It was stated that liberable financial provision has been made in connection with this valuable scholarship.
