Brush Started at Bottom

One of the surprising things about Matt Brush is that he is only forty years of age. For a man who is president of the American Shipbuilding Corporation, vice-president of the American International Shipbuilding Corporation, a director of the Missouri Pacific Railroad, and president of the stockholders of the Boston Elevated, this is exceptional.

Graduating from the Institute in 1901 in Mechanical Engineering after working part of his way through and borrowing the remainder of the money on long time, Matt Brush went to Council Bluffs, Iowa, and took a job as cleaner boy in the round house working a twelve hour night shift. In a short time he advanced to foreman of roundhouses for the Union Pacific, his object being to work up from the bottom and get acquainted with the men as well as the technical work.

Works as Riveter at Hog Island Later he came back to Massachusetts, and applying his previous knowledge, he was very successful as general manager of the western Massachusetts railway system. From this position he went to the Boston Elevated, a road which he put on its feet, although it had been systematically looted for ten years.

In 1918 the American International Corporation asked him to take charge of the Hog Island ship building plant. Dressed as a common workman he went to the yards and got a job, in order to get first-hand information on the working details of ship-building. He went to a school for riveters and then worked for some time as a riveter. In this way he was able to learn much which was invaluable to him later when he became head of the corporation.

Since 1905 Dr. Noyes has been devoting his time between the Institute and the California Institute of Technology, until recently Throop College, where he was in charge of Chemical Research work. He left the Institute two months ago and will now give his entire time to California.

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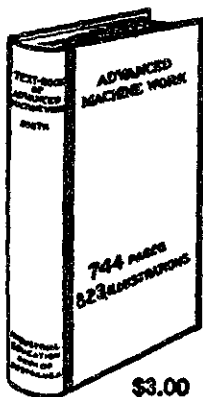
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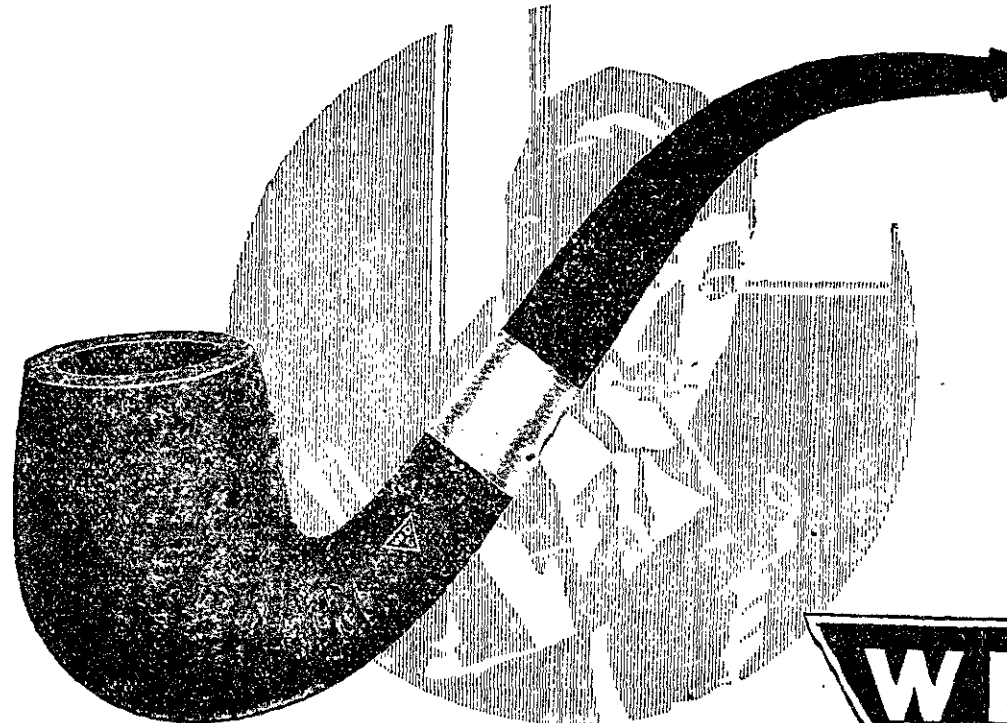
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
