FACULTY PASSES MOTIONS ON SECOND TERM REPORTS

In a circular letter sent to the members of the instructing staff, Secretary A. L. Merrill notifies them of the motions passed by the faculty at the meeting on March 3. These concern a new ruling regarding the report of grades for the second term.

For the first time, formal records will be reported at the end of the second term in all third and fourth year subjects which end at that time. A subject which continues in the third term with the same or similar term.

title will be assumed to end in March only when a single examination or record in June does not cover the work of the second term.

Records in first and second year subjects which end in March will be regarded as formal, and students who are repeating subjects in the second term may be required by their instructors to take the March condition examinations. Conditions examinations in fourth year, second term subjects for which formal records are reported will be held in the June examination period, while all other second term conditions will be made up in September.

FAVOR IDEA OF DANCE FOR 1923 DURING JUNIOR WEEK

Junior Prom Signups Too Few To Include Freshmen

A plan suggested by the Class of 1923 for running a dance for freshmen on the night of the Junior Prom was considered among other measures at a meeting, on March 4, of the Institute committee. In addition, motions were debated concerning the Junior Week Reception, medical attendance at athletic contests, and the Tech Bible.

In order to prevent over-crowding at the Junior Prom this year, the number of signups is to be strictly limited and in all probability will not be large enough to accommodate freshmen. The Class of 1923 therefore has made the suggestion that the freshmen run a dance of their own on the night of the Prom and asked the sentiment of the Institute Committee. A motion was then passed that the Committee express itself as being in favor of such a dance.

Provide for Doctors at Meets

The Committee on medical attendance then submitted a report which was accepted. It stated that the M. I. T. A. A. will hereafter provide adequate medical attention to injuries incurred. The Association will bear the expense and in the case of prolonged disability of a man in straitened circumstances, it will care for him further for a reasonable time.

A suggestion was made that \$100 be set aside from the student tax to be used for the reception to be given during Junior Week, but when it was pointed out that the tax has been distributed among the various activities and there is no part from which such an amount can be drawn, the motion was defeated. COSMOPOLITAN CLUB HEARS ADDRESS BY PROF. LIPKA

Problem of Industrial Democracy Discussed at Smoker

"The Problem of Industrial Democracy," by Professor Lipka of the Mathematics department, featured the Cosmopolitan Club Smoker, which was held last Wednesday evening in Walker Memorial.

VISIT HOOD'S

Chem Society's Trip to Rubber Co. a Decided Success

The Chemical Society's trip to the factory of the Hood Rubber Company was one of the best trips of the year according to the opinion of the 80 members who last Thursday journeyed to Watertown. The men were shown through the entire plant and saw the rubber from its raw state to the automobile tires, which are one of the finished products. Rubber shoes and boots of all descriptions are also some of the other products made at this plant.

When the men arrived at the plant they were divided into groups of from ten to twelve and each conducted through the plant by a guide. The raw rubber was first viewed and then its purification by washing. After it is washed in the calendars it is dried and the compounds for the curing are added. In this process the rubber is kept in a viscous condition so that at the end of the procedure it is made directly into the final products. The tires are built up on an iron form and the curing is accomplished artificially by means of heat and steam.

CHESS CLUB LOSES MATCH

The Technology Chess Club was defeated in a match with the Boston Chess Club last Friday night. The Technology men won two out of the six games. W. W. Adams '23 and

T. Shedlovsky '19 were the only men to win their games. This match was the last in a tournament in which the Chess Club was taking part as a member of the Metropolitan League of Boston.

FIRST FORMS OF TECHNIQUE 1921 ARE NOW BEING PRINTED

Publication of Year Book Started Month Before Issue

The first of the sixteen-page forms of Technique 1921 went to press yesterday. It is expected by the editors that three or four presses will be running on the year book by tomorrow.

One of the features of this year's volume will be the cover, which is designed with gold and red lettering and scroll work on a black background. The shape of the cover has also been slightly changed.

The best of paper, known as Warren's eighty-pound Lustror, has been secured. Eight subhead pages printed in black and red have been designed as the opening leaves to the various departments of the book, which contains a total of 534 pages and of which 2200 copies are being printed.

Redemption of the Technique signups which were taken last January will begin in the main lobby April 1. Plans for the Technique rush in the Great Court, at which five free and fifteen other autographed copies of the book will be given away, are being made for Thursday, April 15. Signups not redeemed before the day of the rush will not be accepted.
