

TRACK SQUAD VOTES TO ADHERE TO CODE OF STRICT TRAINING RULES

Thirty-Five Men Agree at Invation Meeting to Give up
Pleasures and Devote all Their Time to
Studies and Track Work
TEAM WILL MEET CORNELL MAY 8

A new era in Technology athletics was inaugurated at a meeting of members of the 1920 track squad Thursday, March 4. A good majority of the fifty-two men invited to attend voted with but one exception to abide faithfully by a set of training rules advanced by Coach Frank Kanaly. Coach Kanaly called the meeting to put the question of training rules before the men for a decision of a permanent policy in Institute athletics. He explained that the matter had come to a head in the defeat suffered at the hands of Harvard a short while ago.

Rules Are Stringent

There is a possibility of having a meet with Cornell or a smaller college in New England on May 8. According to Coach Kanaly, under the present regime it would be foolish to send a team to the Ithacan University. In order to compete on even terms with Cornell the men must give

up smoking, dancing, theatre parties, card games and other evening entertainments, including the Junior Prom. Kanaly asked for an honest opinion on the subject and a few of the men said that they had already made engagements for the dance and would not be able to abide by any ruling which would include the Junior Prom. Kanaly said that a let-down in this matter would have a demoralizing effect in that men who did not attend the Prom would feel entitled to a holiday on some other occasion. This, of course, would be contrary to the original purpose and the men would break rules without any scruples. Captain Mich Bawden agreed with these convictions. There were no other objections raised and Kanaly asked for a vote. Before the balloting, advantages of the plan were presented. The Harvard problem might be settled; Technology might get out of the class in which it was placed at the Penn

Relay where I was rated with class B colleges.

Vote Practically Unanimous

Every man but one, who, because of financial difficulties could not adhere to the rules, voted to train along the lines stated, from March 22 to May 31. Practically all, however, signified their intentions of going to the Junior Prom and the management has decided to let down in this case. Any other infringement of training rules will warrant dismissal from the squad. The freshmen will be placed on the same schedule of rules.

May Have Training Table

The coach predicted that Technology could win from Harvard if the men trained. The date on May 8 will be filled by Cornell. The season will open with the Inter-class games on April 16, followed by the Penn Relay Carnival on April 30 and May 1. A two-mile relay team will in all probability be sent to Philadelphia and some men may be allowed to go for individual events. May 21 and 22 are the dates set for the N. E. I. A. A. games and the I. C. A. A. A. championships will be held on May 27 and 28.
