Pops Concert Tickets Sell Slowly—Members of Committee Invited to Meet Alumni at Prof. Pearson's Home

CHANGE PLACE OF SERMON

A meeting of the Senior Class Day Committee was held yesterday afternoon. Professor Pearson of the English Department extended an invitation to all members of this committee to come to his house Monday evening to meet the officers of the Alumni Association. This is an annual affair.

The Pops committee wishes to emphasize the fact that Friday, June 11, is Tech Night at the Pops and all undergraduates are eligible to come. Up to the present time the response has been poor on the part of the lower classmen. Tickets will be on sale in the main lobby from 1 to 2 o'clock until the end of the week.

The souvenir programs will be ready for distribution Thursday, or Friday, and the invitations will be ready Wednesday. If 250 Seniors sign up for the picnic to Pemberton and Nantasket, a special boat may be chartered to leave the beach at 10 o'clock; otherwise the party will have to take the 7.30 o'clock boat. The picnics are scheduled to leave Rowes Wharf, Boston, for Pemberton at 10.15 o'clock. From Pemberton trolleys will convey the party to Nantasket.

It has been announced that the baccalaureate sermon will be delivered at the Old South Church at 3.45 o'clock instead of at Trinity Church as originally planned.

DEAD NEVER RETURN

Imposter Calling Himself D. C. Pero '19 is Discovered

"Dead Man Returns" was a fine head, at least thought THE TECH's heeler who wrote it, but the fact that the returning man proved to be an imposter rather spoiled it. Donald C. Pero '19, who was reported to have been killed in an aero accident over the sea, was not the man who applied under that name to a western Alumnus for employment. A photograph sent by Registrar Humphreys conclusively proved that the man was an imposter attempting to gain advantage by posing as the dead man.

Mr. Ruckman, editor of the War Record, expects such a thing to happen again, as there are innumerable cases where Technology men have disappeared without leaving absolute proof of their death. The War Record contains numerous incidents of a similar nature and appears more like a dramatic story than real life although everything in it has been checked by men in a position to know.

A few of the stories have been obtained for publication. Hundreds of deaths overseas have never been satisfactorily approved. Lewis W. Prescott '15 took off in his plane from Dom-pierre, on a mission over the German lines. He was slowly lost to view, and was never seen nor heard of again.

Another man whose story is told at length in the War Record is Robert A. D. MacKay, who volunteered as a member of a French raiding party on the German trenches. He was dressed in the French uniform, and was accompanied by one other American. When the raid was over he was not to be found. This in itself is not strange, but a telegram was received by a friend saying that he had been discharged from a Red Cross hospital. Subsequent examination of the hospital records showed no trace of him.

1922 BOARD BREAKS UP FOR THE SUMMER

TECHNOLOGY SNARES SEVEN POINTS AT I. C. A. A. A. MEET

Dandrow's Second in Hammer Throw and MacMahon's Performance in 2-Mile Account for Showing—Penn Wins in Last Event

THOMSON BREAKS WORLD'S HURDLES RECORD

Technology's athletes scored seven points in the I. C. A. A. A. track meet at Franklin Park, Philadelphia, Saturday, which was featured by Penn's eleventh-hour win over Princeton and Earl Thomson breaking the world's record in the 120 yard-high hurdles. The Institute's counters were registered by George Dandrow in the hammer throw and Billy MacMahon in the two-mile.

Dandrow was the only man entered in the hammer throw who could afford any opposition to J. W. Merchant of California, a dark horse in this event. Merchant won the toss at 159 ft. 2 3/4 in. while Dandrow's heave of 154 feet was a little over seven feet better than the effort of L. H. Weld of Dartmouth, who won the title last year and ruled the favorite this season.

WALKER FURNISHES SUMMER SERVICES

North Hall Open to Diners—Room Assignments Allotted by Mrs. King—Change Building During Vacation

NO MEALS SERVED ON SUNDAYS

Dining service in Walker Memorial will be continued during the Summer in the north dining hall and in the faculty dining room every day, except Sunday, from 11:30 until 1 o'clock. There will be no special meals and only cafeteria will be available. Passage way to the north dining room will be through the rear entrance or through the library.

The Faculty and Alumni room and the east and west lounges will be open to those who will be here during the summer and room assignments for meetings may be made with Mrs. King or with A. J. Browning '22, who will have charge of the Walker Memorial Committee's work during the Summer in the absence of the chairman W. G. Loesch '21.

Several changes will be made in the Memorial building during the summer, one of which will be the opening up of the rifle range for bowling alleys. An effort is also being made to provide more space for activity offices and some changes in the present arrangement are expected to take place in the fall.

Mr. Pung, who has charge of the pool hall and bowling alleys will also have charge of assigning of the base ball field and the tennis courts.

The two-mile run was one of the features of the meet. The lead see-sawed back and forth during the contest between H. H. Brown of Williams and Allan Swede of Princeton while Billy MacMahon trailed the pair and finished a good third behind Swede in the best time ever turned in by a Technology man. He was clocked by Frank Kanaly at 9 min., 31 3/5 second. Brown led the pack for the first few laps with Crofts of Williams second, Swede third and MacMahon fourth. At the mile mark Swede jumped ahead of Brown and MacMahon moved up one place. Brown hopped in front two laps from the finish and MacMahon closed the gap on Swede. On the last turn Swede seemed to put all he had into one final attempt to nose out the purple star but Brown stuck with him as if the pair was glued together and on the back stretch opened up a spectacular spurt and won handily by ten yards. MacMahon was another ten strides behind the Tiger athlete.

Furtherance of Honor System is Object

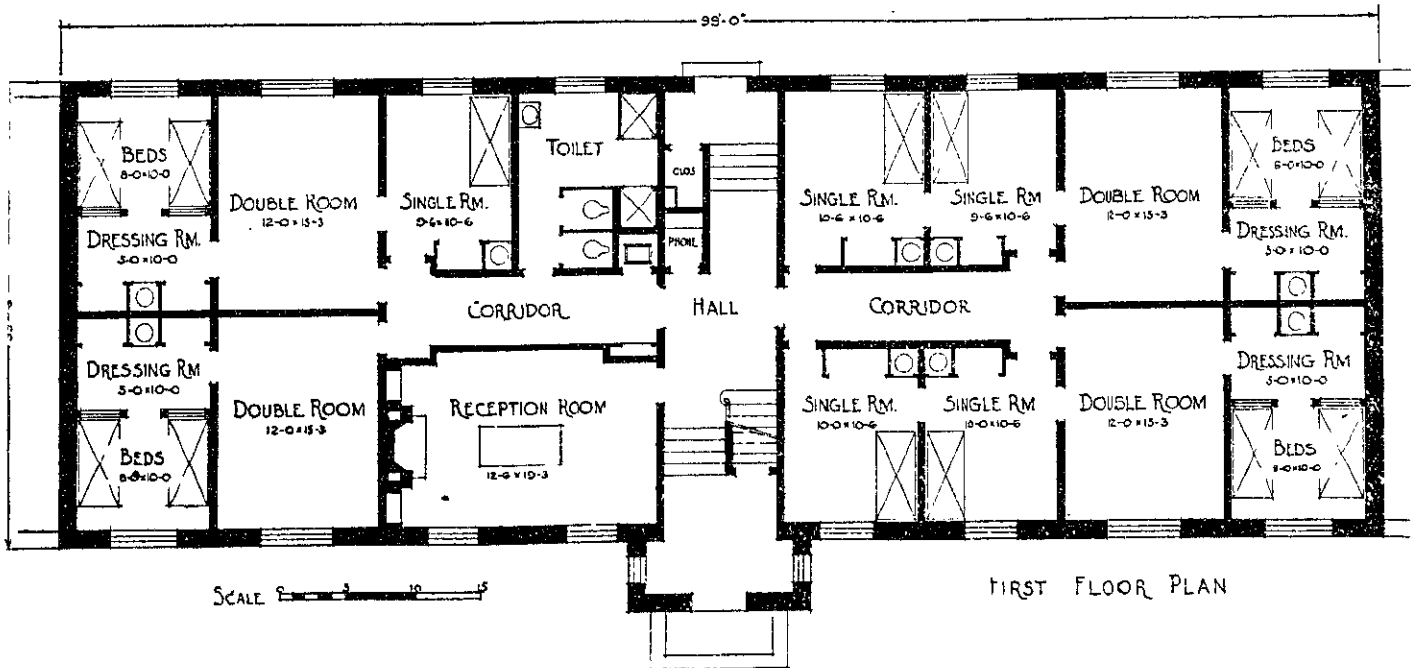

PROPOSED PLAN OF NEW DORMITORY



By 1921 the committee on housing of men hopes to have erected new dormitories to accommodate 500, designed on the above plan. The site is on the northeastern corner of the Institute grounds, so placed as not to

encroach on the athletic field. In accordance with suggestions by the present dormitory men, a reception room is planned for in each house and the buildings will be separated from each other, contrary to the present arrange-

ment, with running water in each room. The complete plans call for rooms for 2200 men but it is doubtful whether all the contemplated work will be begun at once owing to the lack of funds.
