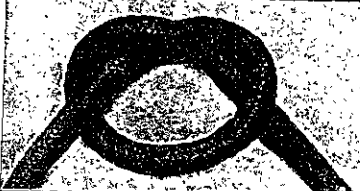

Captain Brookman, Barron, McWane, and Cauldwell Represent Institute at Matches at Merion Cricket Club

### OLD DOUBLES' TEAM BACK

Technology will be represented at the National Intercollegiate Tennis Tournament for the first time in its history. The matches are to be played at the Merion Cricket Club, Philadelphia beginning June 28.

The team that will make the trip is somewhat different from that which has been representing the Cardinal and Gray in its matches. Bill Barron, a member of last year's tennis team, resolved to keep away from the courts, but has consented to play for the Institute in the tournament. He and Captain Brookman make a fast pair in the doubles. These two men were the winners in last year's intercollegiate.

McWane has been chosen as the fourth member to match up with Bill Cauldwell. Although Technology did not win the New England title this year its entries have shown considerable improvement in practice and therefore should be strong contenders for first place.

### SUTHERLAND DECLINES OFFER TO HELP COACH AT OLYMPICS

Navy Coach Given Premier Job on Swimming Team

Alex Sutherland, Technology swimming coach, has refused the position of assistant coach for the American swimming team which is going to the Olympic games at Antwerp.

Sutherland applied for the position

of coach some time ago but lost out on the job by a single vote on the committee which had charge of making the award. Sutherland was opposed in his bid for the job by the Annapolis coach. The matter has been before the committee for some time and it became known two weeks ago that the members of this committee were deadlocked in their choice between Sutherland and the Navy mentor.

Sutherland will spend the summer at Camp Kineo in Maine. Whether he will return to coach Technology next year is a problem. Sutherland came here two years ago. Besides handling Technology he took care of the Andover mermen as well and last year added Harvard to his string.

Andover was the first place Sutherland coached in these parts and he made a wonderful reputation for himself at Phillips Academy. During the war he was a swimming instructor for the Navy.



Technology's showing against Harvard in the crew race last week was a revelation and brought the deepest regret that the eight had not been sent to the American Henley.

Billy MacMahon turned in the best time of his outdoor season Saturday at Philadelphia when he finished third in the two-mile run. It was the first time he had been clocked under ten minutes out of doors.

Just now it looks as though the big Green boy would score at least one first for the Maple Leaf country at Antwerp as well as a second, possibly, over the longer hurdle route.

George Dandrow placed second in a high class bunch of hammer throwers at Penn. Merchant of California is said to have heaved the pill 169 feet in practice. His best effort at Philly was in the big games, ten feet short of this Dandrow should have saved that 162-foot toss he got off a couple of days before leaving for Philadelphia. It would have won for him.

Dartmouth lost heavily when Cuddy Murphy, their football star, was declared ineligible last fall after it was proved he played in a pro football game for which he received \$300. Very heavily they lost, for the points Cuddy would have got for them might have been enough to put them atop Princeton and mayhap Pennsylvania Saturday. Murphy is some weight thrower and would have scored in both the hammer and shot.

Hal Brown of Williams and MacMahon were meeting for the third time at Philly. The first occasion was the New England intercollegiate cross country run at Franklin park last November when MacMahon beat Brown at the tape for finish for third place by a hair's breadth. In the New England intercollegiate at Tech Field a week ago Brown took revenge on cur Billy in the two mile event. The odd meeting resulted in another win for the Williams flyer.

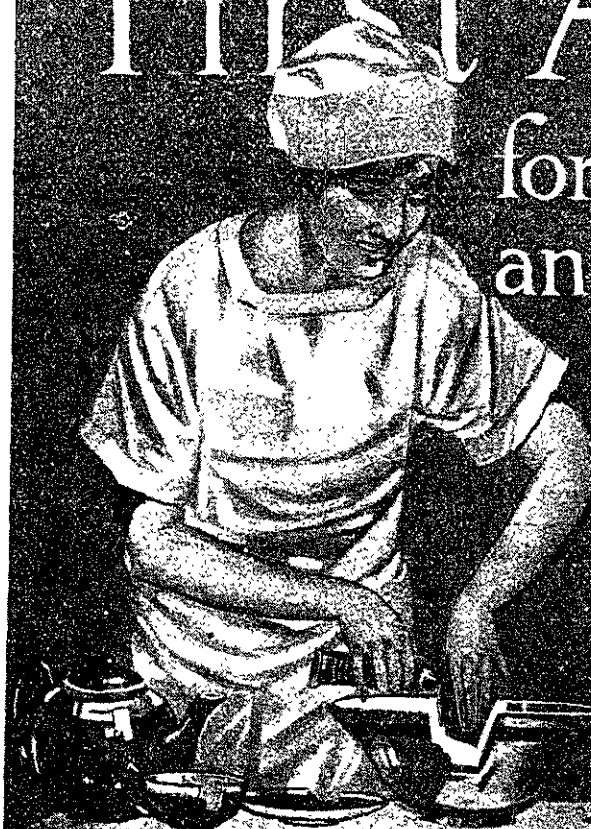
