

## CRITICIZES VOO DOO

Fuller Pale Considers Last Issue Above Par

Voo Doo's latest offering, "The Book of the Dead," appeared last Friday and was on the whole a little above the previous issues. In several respects, notably the cover design and the page entitled "The Reck," it was much superior to former editions in that it featured local jokes, which no matter how stale can not fail to appeal.

The cover design is unique in that it is the first that the Voo Doo has had this year that seemed more than a mess of color to cover up the first page. It is done after Millet's "The Sower," but instead of a man, a skeleton with a false face resembling some of our professors sows, not seed, but F's. Done as it is in red, white and black, it has a very striking effect.

The frontispieces have no joke connected with them and can hardly be classed as works of art. The Voo Doo's idea in running such pictures is a mystery for they take space and are duller than "dead advertisements." An introductory verse might be an excellent remedy. The Tech Show pictures are a trifle crude, but are amusing to one who has seen the show.

Although parts of "The Reck" have been seen before, it is a capital parody. The names of the Managing Board are very cleverly changed and the fake advertisements were happily conceived. The editorials are amusing although a trifle too drawn out. Most of the notes are funny. The communication bears sufficient resemblance to one that appeared a short time ago to be quite interesting.

The remainder of the jokes are about as good as usual, although the "Alumni Reunion" was a rather clever piece. The number of suggestive contributions seems somewhat less.
