May Have Special Boat

The picnic is scheduled for Tuesday, June 8, when the boat leaves Rowe's Wharf promptly at 10 o'clock in the morning. This wharf is located in Boston, but as it is rather inconvenient to get to, it is advised that the men start from their homes in greater Boston at least thirty minutes before the boat time. To get there take the subway to South Station, get a transfer for the car on Atlantic Avenue, and get out directly in front of the pier. 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LATIN-AMERICANS WILL DINE AT HOTEL HEMENWAY

Plans a Series of Lectures Delivered in Spanish

The activities of the Club will close for the school year with a farewell dinner to the graduating members, at the Hotel Hemenway on Tuesday. This was announced at the last meeting two weeks ago when the new board of officers was elected. The work accomplished during the closing year was then reviewed by M. E. Martinez '20, and plans for the future were announced by the newly elected president of the Latin American Club.

The Club will continue to develop the idea of lectures by the members on their respective countries dealing with their social, economic and political life. For the past year Central America, Chile, Mexico and Colombia were the countries on which lectures were given. The idea will be furthered next year by having prominent citizens of Central and South American nations come to the Institute to give public addresses.

As one of the main purposes of the club is to preserve the Castilian language among the members, the discussions are all conducted in Spanish, but, as the desire of the organization is to develop friendly relations between the Spanish and English speaking countries of America, it was thought advisable to have all the meetings open to everyone at the Institute, or to the friends of the students, and to all students of Spanish. Only Latin-Americans will be active members; that is, will be able to vote, but every one who attends the meetings will have the privilege of joining in the discussions which are carried out in Spanish. This will give them an opportunity to listen and practise the Spanish language and to get acquainted with the students who at the Institute represent the twenty-one republics to the south of the United States.

CONFERENCE AFFORDS RARE OPPORTUNITIES FOR STUDENT

Thirty Fifth Annual Meeting to be Given at Silver Bay on Lake George Instead of Northfield, Mass., as Previously

SEVENTY COLLEGES REPRESENTED

Through letters sent to all the fraternities at the Institute, the Technology Christian Association hopes to create enough interest in the coming International Student Conference at Silver Bay on Lake George, so that Technology may be well represented among the 850 students who are to attend from about 70 different colleges. The conference is to be held in a beautifully situated spot on a lake in the heart of the Adirondack mountains. Lake George is reached by means of the Boston and Albany railroad from which a wonderful hour and a half journey is taken by steamboat. By this trip it can easily be seen why travelers call the lake the "Switzerland of America." The lake is entirely surrounded by great mountains and affords an ideal place for such an affair.

The expense of the trip from Boston has been figured up at \$37.76 including railroad fare, room and board while at the conference, and registration. This amount will be reduced somewhat for foreign students as the T. C. A. will pay the registration fee and part of the board. A special effort is being made to influence foreign students to attend the meeting which will be held from June 25 to July 4. The conferences have previously been held at Northfield, Mass., but it was decided recently that Silver Bay affords much better facilities.

Lifelong Friendships Made

The purpose of the conference is mutual help and stimulation in the better things of life; it aims for the establishment of new and lasting friendships, and instruction in leadership and organization. Another of the subjects is to show the use of recreation in social work. Much opportunity will be afforded for athletics, the mornings being entirely devoted to sports. There are many tennis courts and baseball diamonds and there are excellent facilities for swimming and canoeing. Encouragement will be given to athletics of every sort.

Prominent Men Speak

The afternoons and evenings will be replete with up-to-the-minute addresses by leading missionaries and business men in the country. Sam Higginbottom, who organized an agricultural college in India and who, by the introduction of scientific methods increased the productivity of this section a thousand fold, will be there to entertain the delegates. Another prominent speaker to attend the conference is Harry F. Ward, who may be termed a "Christian Radical." He has caused considerable comment in New York by his declaration that the proper method of attacking evil and harmful opinions is by ad-

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INSTITUTE TRACKMEN TO ENTER OLYMPIC TRIALS

Three of the Institute's track stars have already started training for the Olympic team tryouts which will be held next month in the Harvard Stadium. The men are George Dandrow, who won the Hammer throw in the New England's, placed second in the event at the I. C. A. A. A., and won the 56lb. weight throw at the Penn. relay carnival; Wm. K. MacMahon, star distance runner and captain of next year's Cross Country team; and Jack Kellar, who won the Discus Throw in the New England's.

Dandrow is in reality just rounding into the form of which he is capable and with more advantageous training conditions after exams are over should easily throw over 160 feet, which from present indications, should more than qualify for the trip. MacMahon will have to train under very unsatisfactory conditions since he is holding down the position of mail carrier and will be working on his feet from seven in the morning until after nine at night. Because of this MacMahon will not enter the preliminary trials but will save himself for the finals. The distance which he will run is 5000 meters.

RUMANIA INTERESTED IN AMERICAN UNIVERSITIES

The passage below is an extract from a letter of Captain William E. Lucas '14, Assistant Military Attache at the American Legation in Bucharest, Rumania, to George C. Gibbs '00. Captain Lucas was formerly on the staff of the 18th Infantry and has his commission in the Regular Army. The letter was given to THE TECH by the Dear's office.

"President MacLaurin's death certainly is a great loss to Tech, one most difficult to replace. He has left his work. To me the Institute is a most fitting monument to his memory.

"Several young Rumanians have asked me about engineering schools in America. From what they say many would welcome an opportunity to take their technical training in the States rather than in Germany as formerly. The problem has deep possibilities from many points as you can well imagine. The one great difficulty at present is the cost. One dollar is so high that the expense of study in the U. S., is beyond the means of the serious class of Rumanians who are keen to learn engineering, and other lines too, in American Colleges. It some arrangement of scholarships or at least extension of credit for student courses could be arrived at to take these fellows over till their own money recovers its value, many Rumanian young chaps sure would grab the chance of their lifetime. Can't you put an idea along the above lines where it might be considered? Will you get me and send me college catalogs of the best engineering schools in the U. S.? I'm often asked a lot of questions about schools in the U. S. I can't answer as I've not detailed data, and I'm for getting real American dope to these people particularly when they are interested enough to ask. The world is beginning to see that the U. S. is no bonehead outfit, let's encourage said opinion.

"This part of the world is slowly recovering from the War which sure left an appalling hangover. Everybody even the inhabitants, are awakening to the wonderful possibilities of this country and of the East in general. I could rave on it at length but spare you.

"Here Easter lasts four days, quite as large an event as Christmas, only people omit the exchange of gifts. Saw the official state church ceremony, most impressive and interesting. It's too bad I can't write it up properly."

ALUMNI WILL HOLD MEMORIAL SERVICE

Graduates Will Inspect the New Technology on First Day—Discussion Main Event of the Second

Inspection of the buildings and equipment, a memorial service for the late President MacLaurin and the Institute's war heroes, and a discussion of the Technology Plan will be some of the important events of Old Home Week, the fourth Technology Alumni Reunion, which begins June 21 and ends on June 23. Headquarters will be in the gymnasium of Walker Memorial, where all visitors will be requested to register. Numerous class dinners, banquets, and the Plymouth trip are some of the other events of the week.

The inspection of the Institute is to take place on the morning of the first day. This will include a trip through the new Technology and investigation of the equipment of the various laboratories. Lunch will be served in the various fraternity houses and the memorial service is to come in the afternoon, while the separate classes will hold their dinners in the evening.

Plymouth Trip Comes on Last Day

A meeting will be held in Walker Memorial to discuss the Technology Plan and the future of the Alumni Association. Representatives of the Alumni from various sections of the country are to tell about the activities of their respective branches. A banquet will take place in the main hall of Walker Memorial in the evening.

SERIOUSLY INJURED

W. Kirkpatrick '23 on Danger List at Hospital

William Kirkpatrick, Jr., '23 of Montclair, N. J., was seriously injured Saturday night when an automobile in which he and Miss Helen Strong of Newtonville were following a bridal pair overturned and pinioned the couple beneath the wreckage of the machine. Both are on the danger list at the Newton Hospital.

The accident followed an attempt by the couple to overtake a machine in which Stuart M. Hill and his bride, who was Miss Margaret Strong, sister of the injured girl, were speeding away in an attempt to "escape" the old shoe and confetti ceremony. Kirkpatrick and the bride's sister, discovering they had fled, started in pursuit in a racing car.

The racing automobile sped down Walnut street across Commonwealth avenue and was about to overtake the fleeing machine when a steering knuckle broke, as the car reached Homer street. The machine crashed into an iron telephone post and turned turtle, holding the couple beneath the wreckage. Found unconscious by a passing automobilist, the couple were rushed to the Newton Hospital where they are on the danger list.

Kirkpatrick is pledged to the Alpha Tau Omega fraternity. He entered the Institute in the fall, taking Course X.
