

1920 HEARS BACCALAUREATE SERMON; KANALY PICKED FOR ARMY POSITION

Technology Mentor Will Superintend the Training of All Army Olympic Track Candidates

RETURNS TO INSTITUTE IN FALL

Frank Kanaly, track coach and physical director of Technology, has been selected as head tutor for the athletes in the U. S. Army who will train for the Olympic Games at Antwerp. The Cardinal and Gray department was notified of his appointment by the War Department last Saturday.

Kanally left Boston yesterday for the Jefferson Barracks, St. Louis, where he will begin his work of conditioning the soldier athletes on Thursday. He will have about a month's time in which to complete the training, as the final for his charges will take place in the Harvard Stadium July 17.

Although the final selections for head coach of the American team have not been made public, it is generally expected that the position will be offered to Jack Moakley of Cornell, and that Lawson Robertson of Penn will be first assistant. Frank Kanaly may also possibly be included in

PROF. BABCOCK GOES TO WASHINGTON THIS SUMMER

Will Help Finish Work of Railroad Administration

Following the return of the railroads to private ownership by the government, there has remained the task of satisfactorily settling all business between the United States and the railway owners. Engaged upon this work, Professor J. B. Babcock of the department of Civil Engineering will spend part of this summer in Washington.

He will assist in the straightening of accounts relating to the maintenance of track and arrange any remaining difficulties in that branch of the former railroad administration's work. The summer camp of the civil engineers at East Machias, Maine, will not be entirely without his services, however, as Professor Babcock plans to arrive there by the middle of its course.

Rev. George Crocker Gibbs of New York, graduated at the Institute in the class of 1900 as an engineer, came back to his alma mater Sunday afternoon as a minister of God and delivered the baccalaureate sermon to the class of 1920 in the new Old South church.

The service attending the baccalaureate was simple yet impressive. The 475 members of the senior class marched up the center aisle of the church two by two to the front of the auditorium where seats had been reserved for them. They were led by President Norris G. Abbott, and Marshals Kenneth F. Akers, John C. Nash and H. O. Davidson.

INSTITUTE SUMMER COURSES WILL COMMENCE ON JUNE 14
For Freshmen to Attend Ten Weeks—Registration Now

Registration for the summer courses which will be offered at the Institute for freshmen chemists, junior freshmen and those who were unfortunate enough not to meet with the requirements of various professorial records during the regular term, will be accepted until June 12, when registration must be complete for those subjects which are given early in the summer.

The subjects which are not given in the late summer, students have until June 28 to file their registration card.

Junior freshmen must attend for ten weeks during June, July and August, make up for the term which the senior freshmen took last fall, the fee for which will be \$31.

Fee for Required Summer Courses for the required course in qualitative analysis lasting for six weeks, beginning June 14, which is required of freshmen taking chemistry courses, will be no fee, other than a storage deposit. The same is true for required summer courses. The fee for courses which are not required ranges from ten to a hundred and twenty-five dollars.

For those who enter the summer courses are not Institute students as shown by the figures of previous years, a great many of the registrants are those who plan later to come to Technology or in some cases those who want merely a few courses. Last of the 891 who registered but were not Institute students, while in the year before, 356 were actually taking courses.

WEST POINTERS TO STUDY HERE

War Department Orders Graduates of Military Academy To Institute for Advanced Training

WILL TAKE SPECIAL COURSE

Twenty-five West Pointers are coming to Technology this summer, while twenty more will be sent here in the fall as the result of negotiations between the War Department and Institute authorities. These men will enter the Senior Class in the fall, but while taking work largely in Civil Engineering the course will be a special one, with several mechanical engineering subjects and some mathematics.

Courses Not Offered at Academy

The men who are coming this summer graduated from West Point during the War but did not get the full training there. Those appearing in the fall are regular graduates who will be in the same class as the men who took the summer work, due to the extra training that they received at the Military Academy.

The men are all members of the Engineer Corps, who are here for intensive training. They will get the work that the proposed school at Virginia would have given. This school was to have been established by the government for the purpose of giving the Engineer Corps men special training that the United States Military Academy at West Point does not afford.

HOLD CONFERENCE

The Young Democracy organization of New York has asked that Technology be represented at a students' conference which will be held in Monroe, New York, near New York City, from June 17 to 20. The purpose of the conference is to find out how American college men and women can help solve the present problems of public welfare and how they can best aid in the social progress of the country.

In the program are included inspiring speakers, interesting discussions, and outdoor recreation. Delegates from the leading colleges and universities of the country will attend the conference.

REQUIRED EQUIPMENT FOR R. O. T. C. CAMP ANNOUNCED

Complete Directions for Travel Now Procurable

The Department of Military Science and Tactics has announced the adoption of a new and efficient means for the transportation of students to the summer camp. Groups of men have been arranged, based on the reports of the men themselves, who expect to arrive at the camp on the same train or boat. A leader has been appointed for each group and he will be issued the transportation request covering all members of his group.

The allowance for sustenance while traveling is set at a maximum of \$3 per day, and according to the officer in charge, receipts for all expenses incurred while on the journey will have to be presented to the battery commander or Finance Officer for reimbursement. The men are cautioned by the officer to arrive early in the day, of June 17, so they may get adjusted before their duties begin.

Suggest Bringing Many Articles

The students are requested by the department to take all the articles that they bring with them in a bag or suitcase that can be locked as their civilian clothes will be placed in it and stored away until the camp breaks up. Upon the student's arrival at camp he will be issued clothing necessary, with blankets. The following is a list of the things that will be needed, as quoted from the directions issued by the War Department:

- 6 suits, underwear.
- 8 (or more) pair of socks (light wool socks recommended).
- 12 (or more) handkerchiefs.
- 1 pair high tan shoes, to be well broken in, similar in pattern to the army garrison shoe.
- 4 face towels.
- 1 set toilet articles, razor, brush, soap, hairbrush, comb, toothbrush, paste, nailbrush, file, and toilet soap. Metal mirror con-

MACMAHON CHOSEN FOR TRACK CAPTAIN

Star Distance Runner Captains Hill and Dalers Also—At Present Is Training for the Olympic Games

SUCCEEDS GARVIN BAWDEN

William K. MacMahon '22, of Atlantic, was unanimously elected captain of next year's track team at a meeting of the Cardinal and Gray athletes held last Saturday. MacMahon was one of the mainstays of the track squad this season, on both the indoor and the cinder paths. In the New England Intercollegiate he finished second to Brown of Williams in the two-mile race, and a week later grabbed third place in the same event in the I. C. A. A. A. meet at Philadelphia.

He also holds the captaincy of next year's cross-country team, to which position he was elected at a recent gathering of the harriers. MacMahon's performances this past season were marked with exceptional brilliance, and he has been hailed by sporting solons as a coming champion. At present he is training for the Olympic tryouts, which will be held next month.

RACQUETEERS ELECT

Bill Cauldwell Named Varsity Tennis Captain

William A. Cauldwell '22, of Hartsdale, N. Y., was chosen captain of the Technology tennis team for next season at a meeting of this year's combination. Cauldwell's election is unanimous.

Cauldwell has shown classy form on the courts this spring, winning the majority of his matches in straight sets. He will probably form one of the team that will represent the Institute in the intercollegiate at Philadelphia this month. He is a member of Phi Beta Epsilon fraternity.

Captain Herman Brookman, Hamilton Beattie, Bill Cauldwell, and Bill McWane were awarded the title by the M. I. T. A. A. on the basis of their work this year. The insignia was also awarded to Joseph Greenblatt, varsity manager, who has been reelected for next year.

1500 ALUMNI REPLY

Committee expects Even Greater Number at Reunion

Already, over 1500 graduates of the Institute have signified their intention to attend the fourth Technology Alumni Reunion, which lasts from June 21 to June 23. According to figures which the reunion committee has obtained up to date, at least 1000 Alumni will be present at the main banquet in Walker, and an equally large number expect to go on the sail to Plymouth on June 23.
