MAC NAUGHTON '11-KITSON

DIRECTOR RETURNS FROM FRANCE

M. S. Gunn '04, associate director of the Rockefeller Foundation Commission for the prevention of tuberculosis in France, has just returned from Europe for work in this country. Mr. Gunn has been health officer of New Jersey, editor of American Journal of Public Health, secretary of the American Health Association, and has served on other special health commissions. From 1910 to 1917 he was instructor, assistant professor, and later associate professor of Sanitary Engineering, Biology, and Public Health at the Institute. He is a graduate of Course VIII, Biology and Public Health and received the Certificate in Public Health. He is a member of American Public Health Association and many other health societies.

DAKIN '18 BACTERIOLOGIST

Miss Loretta Mildred Dakin Sp '18 has just been appointed bacteriologist for the United States health service at New Haven, Connecticut. Miss Dakin goes to New Haven from the health department of Toledo, Ohio.

After graduation from the Toledo Normal School, she came to the Institute and specialized under Professor William T. Sedgwick of the Biology Department in bacteriology and chemistry, leaving in 1918 to take further work at Harvard Medical and Columbia University.

The appointment of women in the health service has been found to be better than filling the positions with men. The war gave the first impetus to this movement and the women have become more and more prominent in health work.

APPOINTED COMMISSIONER

Harry R. Gabriel '05 has just been appointed American Relief Commissioner for Poland with headquarters in Warsaw and a member of a board of Technical Advisors to the Polish Ministry of Railroads. Mr. Gabriel took up work with the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad soon after his graduation. He was construction engineer for a number of Alaskan railroad companies and had charge of the construction of railways in Uruguay and Argentina. Previous to America's entrance into the war he served as field engineer of the southern district with the Interstate Commerce Commission.

He went to the Officers Training Camp at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, and during the war he was major of the 21st Regiment of Engineers in France. He was in charge of the construction and maintenance of light railways in the St. Mihiel and Argonne fronts. During the summer of 1919 he was a member of the Inter-allied Coal Mission to central Europe with headquarters in Czechoslovakia. Mr. Gabriel graduated from the course in Civil Engineering.

Yale University:—Captain J. F. Leicester of the fencing team will represent the American colleges in the fencing bouts at the coming Olympic games. Leicester won this privilege when he defeated all 15 of his opponents at the recent tournament in the Hotel Astor, New York City.

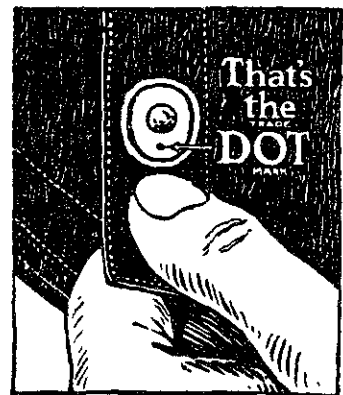

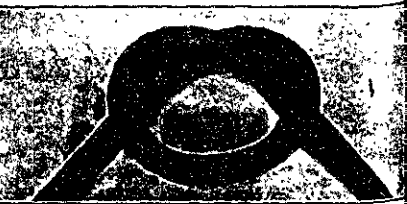
