The War is over. The Fourth Technology Reunion is the first since the War. Many Alumni are coming back to meet once again the comrades they met overseas perhaps.

The committee in charge has chosen the dates for the Reunion with especial care, based in great measure upon the fate of past Reunions as determined by the weather. They hope that this year their efforts will enable Alumni to see Boston in its best behavior, or at least see Boston when Jupiter Pluvius is on his best behavior.

Institute Open to Visitors

The regular sessions of the Institute are over. Commencement Week has come and gone. Yet Technology has not stopped, for the summer sessions are in full sway and visitors will have an opportunity to inspect the buildings and laboratories at their will.

Many Alumni will be interested in the various new machines and equipment which have been added to the teaching and research facilities since they were students. Every department will fling open its doors to visitors and a special day has been set aside for this inspection.

The replies that were sent in from Alumni who were coming to the Reunion indicate that there will not be a great demand for hotel accommodations. Most of the graduates are planning to locate at clubs or the homes of relatives or friends.

Park Cars on Institute Grounds

At first it was feared that the hotels' crowded condition would seriously handicap those who attended the Reunion. The Boston hostilities have been crowded all winter and with Harvard Commencement and tourist travel the demand for rooms this week will be great.

Alumni who come in automobiles will find ample parking space on the Institute grounds. Drivers should enter by the Massachusetts Avenue gate, opposite the library dome. Watchmen will be in attendance to check and look after cars.

Will Honor Dr. MacLaurin

This Reunion has been deemed a necessity to consider the large number of new problems facing Technology. These problems are of such a nature as to merit discussion by the Alumni as a whole. Furthermore the new spirit born of the success of the endowment fund campaign must not

be allowed to die out for lack of stimulus and ammunition.

An opportunity to pay fitting tribute to the late president of Technology, Dr. Richard C. MacLaurin, will be offered the Alumni by this Reunion. The men who died in service will also be honored. A special memorial service is one of the big features of the program for this afternoon.

Explains Purpose of Reunion

Professor Prescott expressed the purpose of the Reunion as follows: "This Reunion should prove to be an occasion of great significance and importance in the life of the Institute, combining as it will, opportunity to pay our deep respect and gratitude to the memory of the great leader we have so recently lost, to give our cordial support and constructive suggestions for the future work of our Alma Mater, and to renew the bonds of friendly association and solidarity of purpose that have been so effective in the past in building up Technology's reputation and prestige."

"You are now called upon to use your influence with your class and local organizations to secure for this meeting an enthusiastic attendance and to stimulate as fully as possible such helpful criticism and support as we all feel to be a necessity if the great ideals of the Institute and its place in the educational fabric of America are to be properly maintained."

WEST POINTERS TAKE INSTITUTE COURSES

Are Honor Men of the Military Academy—Lieut-Colonel Included in the Twenty-five Graduates

WILL RECEIVE B. S. DEGREES

Twenty-five officers, graduates of the United States Military Academy at West Point, arrived at the Institute last week to take courses in Electrical Engineering, Civil Engineering, Mechanical Engineering and kindred subjects. The various courses which these men are to take will commence today and are to last throughout the summer. In the fall all of the officers will take up the regular courses of study for three terms and next summer they will be given a special course of training at Camp Humphrys, coming back in the

fall for two more terms at the completion of which the men will receive regular B. S. degrees from the Institute. Under the present plans the men will be allowed to return after their graduation to take studies in special lines.

The group of officers is made up of one Lieutenant Colonel, six Majors, four Captains, and fourteen First Lieutenants. Eight are of the West Point class of 1916, two are of the class of 1917 and the fourteen First Lieutenants belonged to the class of 1921 but on account of the great demand for officers they were graduated in 1919. All have been overseas and one, Lieutenant Harris is still on the way from Silesia, Germany.

At present the officers are living at the Delta Tau Delta and Delta Kappa Epsilon fraternity houses, but have formed an Army Tech Club and are equipping a club house at 562 Newbury street, Boston, and will soon move to these new quarters.

This is the first time that officers of the Corps of Engineers have been sent in a body to a civil technical school and the results will be watched by many officers and the engineering profession at large with a great deal of interest. All expenses will be met by the government, except the laboratory charges and incidental fees.

Athletic teams are already being organized and it is expected that a large number of games will be arranged with the fraternity teams and others. A dance is also being planned for the near future and the West Pointers are preparing to take an active part in activities around the Institute.

SELECT PLACE FOR MACLAURIN PICTURE

Gift of Class of 1920 to Technology Will be Placed in Lobby of Walker Memorial Outside Main Hall

DAVIDSON OUTLINES PURPOSE

The lobby of Walker Memorial, directly outside the entrance to the main dining hall, has been selected as the place for the picture of Dr. Richard C. MacLaurin which the graduating class this year presented to the Institute as the class gift.

The picture was tendered to the Institute on Class Day. Hobart O. Davidson '20, of Holland Patent, N. Y., as class orator, made the speech of presentation, and Reginald H. Smithwick, president of the class of 1921 and chairman of the Institute Committee, accepted on behalf of the Institute.

It was Davidson's idea, as he put it in his speech on Class Day, that the picture should be hung in such a place that it would serve as an inspiration to those executives who follow Dr. MacLaurin and to the faculty, and also serve to acquaint future generations of students with the man who made the present Technology buildings possible.

Sir Auckland Geddes to Speak

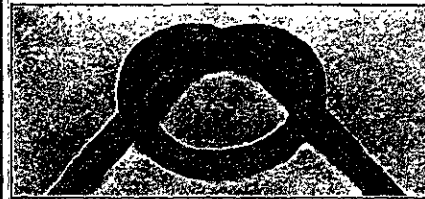
The evening will be given over to the big banquet in main hall, Walker Memorial. His excellency, the British Ambassador, Sir Auckland Geddes, will be the speaker.
