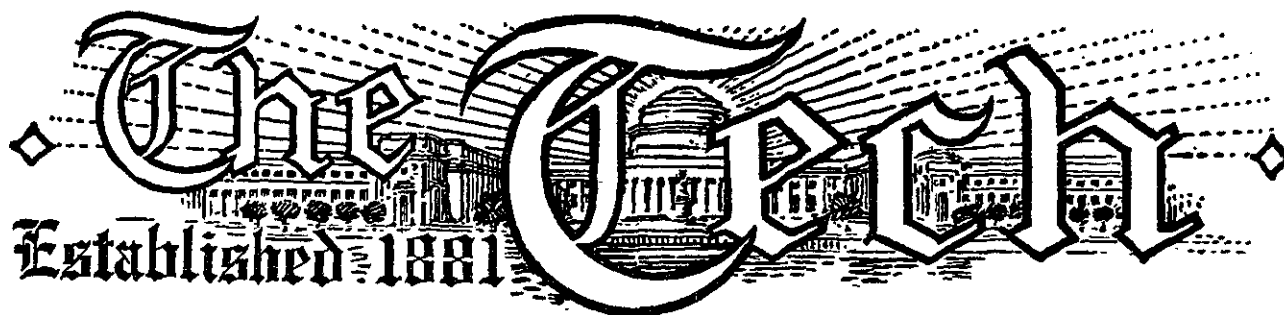

ALUMNI GATHER THIS MORNING IN WALKER

Speakers from Both Graduate and Undergraduate Bodies Will Talk on Topics of Vital Interest to Technology

DEPARTMENT LUNCHEONS FOLLOW

A large gathering of all the Alumni attending the reunion will take place this morning at 9:30 o'clock in the Main Hall of Walker Memorial, where speakers will entertain the audience with talks on those things of vital interest to the school. There will be speakers from both Alumni and undergraduate bodies, each dealing with his phase of the work. Dr. W. H. Walker will open the meeting with a talk on the Technology Plan and he will be followed by Merton L. Emerson '04, who is slated to speak on "The Future of the Alumni Association and What It Can Do for Technology." Following will be four prominent undergraduates who will speak on Institute Activities. These men are R. A. St Laurent '21 who will address the gathering on publications; R. F. Officer '21, will talk on Athletics; R. H. Smithwick '21, who will represent the Institute Committee; while W. R. McKinley '19 will make a plea for the new dormitories.

BANQUET TONIGHT

Sir Auckland Geddes Will Address Technology Alumni

Events of the second day of the fourth Alumni Reunion will terminate with a banquet in the main hall of Walker Memorial. This big gathering of hundreds of former graduates of the Institute is scheduled to take place at 7 o'clock tonight.

General T. Coleman du Pont '34, will be the presiding officer at the dinner. As one of the main speakers of the evening there has been selected a noted man, Sir Auckland Geddes, the present and recently appointed ambassador from Great Britain to the United States. In addition, Lieutenant-Governor Channing Cox of Massachusetts is to address the assemblage, as well as other speakers.

Other entertainment on the program consists of music furnished by Teel's Band, which will play during the banquet. George B. Glidden '93, will be in charge and lead the general singing of Technology songs by those present.

R.O.T.C. CAMP AT FORT MONROE OPENS WITH BIG ATTENDANCE

Fifty Technology Men Among Those Assembled At Virginia Retreat for Advanced Study in Military Science

TWO INSTITUTE INSTRUCTORS ON STAFF

Fort Monroe, Va., June 21—The second Coast Artillery R. O. T. C. Camp opened here with a registration of nearly 400 students. The men began to arrive Thursday, June 17 and spent the remainder of the week getting fitted out and organized.

The camp is divided into four batteries, comprising one advance and three basic units. Technology's quota is about fifty men, half of whom are in the advance unit, Battery "A" and attended the first C. A. R. O. T. C. Camp held at Fort Monroe in 1919.

The personnel of the camp consists of about thirty officers and twenty sergeant-instructors and is under the command of Colonel Bunker C. A. C. Captains Burdick, Purdis and Anderson and Lieutenant Hogan, instructors at the 1919 C. A. R. O. T. C. Camp and Captain Pendleton and Sergeant Vaughn of the Military Science department at Technology are assigned to this year's camp.

The students comprising the four batteries "A," "B," "C," and "D"

DINERS MERRY

Class Banquets Last Night Bring Old Friends Together

Boston restaurants, hotels and clubs were sprinkled last night with some twenty gatherings of Alumni, at which jollification and reminiscence mingled with serious discussion ranging all the way from class organizations to international affairs.

The City Club was apparently the most popular gathering place, housing seven of the class dinners, while three of the classes chose to banquet at Young's Hotel. Many of the classes chose dining houses which had been favorites with its members during their days at the Institute. The class of '19 headed the list in point of numbers, having 85 men present, with '99 trailing in the rear with ten men. The groups also vied with each other with respect to the distance their remotely resident members had travelled to reach Boston. Reporters at the meetings were given excellent evidence of the greatness of Technology in attendance.

First Ten Combine

Members of the first ten classes, instead of holding separate dinners, joined in a dinner at the City Club. A total of 45 men were thus brought together, including Professors Emeritus of the Technology Faculty, R. H. Richards and C. R. Cross, the former of the Institute's first class, the latter for 50 years head of the Physics department.

Cannot Locate One Member

The Class of '34, with Professor Tyler presiding at the dinner, and Coleman duPont, President of the Alumni Association, Professor Gill, the Institute's noted chemist, in attendance, made a strong bid for the honor of having the most distant member. At least, they defy anyone to locate Ygnacio Bonillas, a candidate for the Mexican Presidency recently captured by his opponents.

'98 Has Notables

Fifteen diners of the class of '98 included Professor C. E. A. Winslow, of Yale University, and speaker at

Hold Commemoration Meeting in Walker—Coleman du Pont and Dr. Elihu Thomson Among the Speakers Who Addressed Alumni

NAME GREAT COURT FOR GEORGE EASTMAN

With a deep sense of appreciation and the greatest of attention, nearly 600 Alumni of Technology as well as many invited guests, listened yesterday afternoon in Walker Memorial to a Commemoration of the services of our late President, Dr. Maclaurin.

T. Coleman du Pont '84, the retiring President of the Alumni Association delivered the introduction to the meeting. He was followed by Dr. Charles E. A. Winslow '98, Professor of Public Health at Yale University, who told of the great progress and wonderful achievements of the Institute. Acting President Elihu Thomson of Technology gave the history of Dr. Maclaurin's Service as President. Dr. Ernest F. Nichols, formerly of Columbia University addressed the gathering on "Dr. Maclaurin as a Colleague." General du Pont then introduced Dr. George A. Gordon of the New Old South Church, who offered a personal appreciation of Dr. Maclaurin. The history of the Institute's Soldiers in the Great War was given in detail by Henry M. Waite '90, formerly a colonel of engineers, A. E. F.

In his introduction General du Pont stated that the purpose of the meeting was twofold: first, to honor the memory of the late Dr. Maclaurin; and second, to repeat the story of the part Technology men played in the World War.

General du Pont also announced that George Eastman has finally consented to allow his name to be given to what has heretofore been designated as "Great Court." From now on the enclosure will be known as "Eastman Court."

Dr. Charles E. A. Winslow '98 professor of Public Health at Yale Univer-
