**Committee Aids Foreigners**

The credentials which acknowledge the applications of the foreign students for special reservations have been received from Dr. Philip K. Hitti of the Committee on Friendly Relations in New York. This committee is an organization whose object is to promote the general welfare and friendship of foreign students studying in the United States. It has the support of many prominent foreigners and other wealthy gentlemen, through whose beneficence it is made possible to present special conditions to all foreign students who desire to attend the conference. The registration fee of \$15 is paid by the committee, which also provides for one-half the price of the board and lodging of the student enroute to Silver Bay.

**Institute's Representation Small**

Technology has no tradition to uphold in regard to this annual student conference as has Harvard, Dartmouth or many of the other great Eastern institutions of learning. Every year Harvard sends 40 men to the meeting, and they are planning to send 40 men again this year. Most Technology students are not free to spend their summers in resting up as do the students of other schools. The Silver Bay Committee of Technology urges that all men who can give up the next week to the trip report to the T. C. A. office at once, as they believe that 11 men is not a truly representative body of an institution of 3000 students.

As has been previously announced in some detail in THE TECH, the price of the round trip is about \$19. The delegation will leave from South Station Thursday night, June 24, on the 10:30 o'clock standard time (11:30 o'clock daylight saving time) train and will arrive at Lake George at noon of the following day. All reservations on board the sleepers have already been made.

Besides Technology, Columbia, University of Kansas, Virginia Military Institute, Virginia Polytechnic Institute, Iowa State, Georgia, Tech, Alabama, Mississippi, University of Michigan, Citadel, Minnesota and Case School of Applied Science are a few of the colleges represented.

The camp is comfortably situated on the beach at Old Point Comfort several hundred yards from last year's camp site. Each battery has its own barracks, mess hall and lavatory. The officers' quarters and headquarters are at one end of the camp. A club house, luxuriously fitted with easy chairs, writing desks and stationery and a piano, is in the center of the camp, and a post exchange and dispensary are conveniently located.

The students are receiving every consideration and all courtesies extended to officers. The Officers' Club is open to students in free hours. The men are at liberty after 4:30 o'clock every day and week-end passes may be secured from Saturday noon to Monday reveille. At all social affairs the men have the same status as cadets and are on an equal standing with the officers.

Friday afternoon the entire camp was addressed by Colonel Bunker, camp commander, and by Major Carson, head instructor at the camp. They emphasized the seriousness of the work and expressed their hopes that the men would enjoy themselves during free hours in athletics and on liberty. General Cronkhite, commander of the Coast Defenses of Chesapeake Bay had hoped to be present, but was unexpectedly delayed and was unable to attend.

Friday evening a hop was held by the Commanding General and the officers of the post in honor of the students and to enable them to see another phase of army life. The dance held in the ballroom of the Coast Artillery School was largely attended and students mingled freely with the officers. An excellent orchestra was provided and men were permitted to remain till the end came at midnight.
