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THRIFT IS ESSENTIAL

Dr. Judson Tells College Students They Must Save

The first element of good citizenship is industrial competence, declares Dr. Harry Pratt Judson, president of the University of Chicago in a recent injunction to college men and women going forth not only to make their own way in the world but to make a place as leaders and directors of thought throughout the nation, at only is it necessary for college men and women to be imbued with the idea of thrift but it is essential that they practise it and urge its practice if their influence is to bear fruit. It is to that end that educators all over the nation are working with the Savings Division of the Treasury for the establishment of systematic habits of saving and safe investment in government savings securities.

Dr. Judson in his recent communication on the subject says: "Certainly our colleges should train students to be good citizens and the first element of good citizenship is industrial competence. No one who is mentally and physically normal should be unable to earn a decent living but the essence of industrial efficiency is elimination of waste."

DESIGNED RESOLUTE

Famous Shipbuilder Graduate

The Resolute, the ship which recently proved its superiority by defeating Sir. Thomas Lipton's boat, was designed by Nathaniel G. Herreshoff '70. asking for admission having been received from students connected with universities or technical schools in Latin American countries, China, Japan, India, the Scandinavian nations and Russia. Inquiries have also come from American correspondents in behalf of friends in Germany and Austria, whose privileges have been cut off by war conditions. Occasionally an applicant whose education began in one of the war-ridden countries before the great conflict arose and who has made his way here after seeing military service with the Allies, comes in person to inquire about the opportunities at the Institute to fit himself for a career in civil life. Some students are applying from Dalhousie, Acadia, University of New Brunswick, Toronto, McGill, Manitoba and other Canadian institutions of learning.

Every department of the Institute is likely to receive additions, as the applications practically cover the whole range of courses given, whether in science, engineering, or business administration.

Will Try New Plan This Year

In order to arrange for the reception of these men from other colleges and adjust their past work to the curriculum of the Institute, the committee on admissions has organized a procedure that differs from that of former years. This procedure is intended to lessen the extra burden of detail in signing off credits that falls alike upon students and instructors in the opening days of the fall term when it is desirable to get started with studies. Last year, in September, when six hundred new men, many of them without notice, came from other colleges, much time had to be devoted to fitting them into their right places in the courses. Every man as a rule had a brief preliminary interview with Secretary Allyn L. Merrill in order to have his general status approximately determined, and to be advised how and where to present his case. After this interview he went to the instructors to have the subjects with which he was credited signed off. This work of adjustment, especially for the first and second years, which was formerly done by personal interview, is now being done on paper.

Circulars Sent to New Men

The committee on admissions is anticipating the September congestion by dealing with applications by mail. Ahead the way has been prepared by circulars sent from the correspondence office. In response to notifications sent out months ago by Secretary Merrill to applicants from other colleges many students intending to come from them have already applied or are applying by letter for admission to advanced standing. They are asked to describe the work they have done in their own colleges and to state what courses they wish to pursue at the Institute. Their applications, together with their certified list of studies already taken and grades received are laid before the committee with the catalogues of the institutions represented. Their work is then compared with that of Technology in which they desire equivalent credit and their standing is determined. In this inspection the different departments are represented by some member of the faculty who is on the committee, or if need be the heads of departments are consulted for special advice. Special help outside the committee is usually required when adjustments are made in the Senior and Junior years or in questions of graduate work of a highly specialized character.

Membership of New Committee

The membership of the committee is as follows: Professor Frank Aydelotte, chairman; Professors H. W. Tyler, A. L. Merrill, J. Lipka, E. F. Lanley, J. W. Phelan, H. G. Pearson, A. E. Burton, W. H. Lawrence, E. Kenison, A. L. Goodrich, N. C. Page, A. G. Robbins, W. H. James, W. A. Johnston, and Walter Humphreys, registrar. Dean Burton served on the committee at the outset, but during his absence in California his place is taken by Professors Lawrence and Goodrich. Professor F. S. Woods and



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Prof. F. L. Hitchcock are taking the place of Professor Lipka, who is on his vacation in California, and Professors Robinson and Seaver are acting for Professor Pearson.

The work of the committee began in May under the direction of Professor Tyler, acting chairman, in place of Professor Aydelotte, who is in England on leave of absence in connection with his work for the Rhodes Scholarship Trust. It will continue throughout the summer or until the admission of transferred students is as far as possible complete.

It was seen at the start that the work of the committee would require the services of a correspondence officer. Dr. James L. Tryon, formerly of the English-History Department and teacher of International Law at the Institute, as well as at the University of Maine, who has had administrative experience in the world-peace movement and as travelling lecturer on international topics, has become acquainted with universities in this country and Canada, was put in charge of the correspondence of the committee of admissions. At the same time, they assigned to him the correspondence of the committee on advanced degrees and fellowships which had been in the care of Professor Laws, who was its secretary, and needed relief from overwork, and the general correspondence of the Institute much of which relates to entrance admissions.

The admissions and general correspondence office is now reorganized as a section of the office of the registrar, Professor Walter Humphreys. There are now two assistant registrars, Mr. Frank L. Clapp and Dr. James L. Tryon, the correspondence officer. Professor Allyn L. Merrill, who for twelve years has conducted the correspondence of the Faculty, will remain secretary of the Faculty, and will return to teaching.



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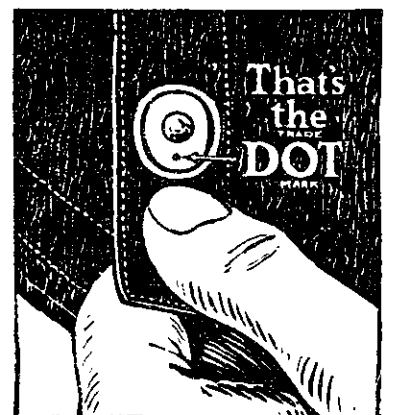
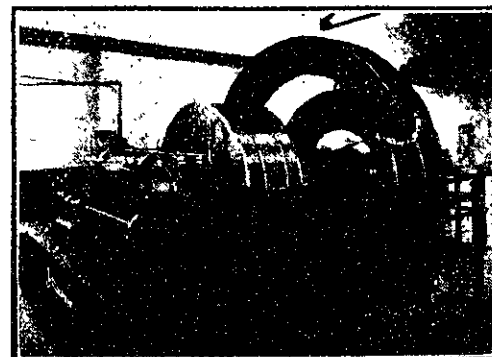
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
