INSTITUTE COMMITTEE ASKS FOR SUBMISSION OF BUDGETS

A., including all class teams, and also those responsible for the finances of all such activities as the All-Technology Smoker, are requested to hand in budgets to L. W. Conant '21, treasurer of the Institute Committee, as soon as possible. No budgets will be received after Wednesday, October 13. The budget committee will meet today at 5 o'clock in the chairman's office for the first time this year, and again at a later date, to pass upon the budgets presented.

T. C. A. BOOK EXCHANGE MADE SALES OF OVER \$1000

Employment Bureau Has Many Positions on Hand

Now that the rush and demand for rooming quarters is over, the Technology Christian Association is devoting its energies to the Book Exchange and the Employment Bureau. Several good positions have been sent into the office. A list of these may be found in the bulletin board in the basement of Walker Memorial. All men who have filled out applications for employment are requested to call at the office to complete their cards at once.

Men are coming to the Book Exchange in large numbers with the result that the list of books on hand is quite depleted. The biggest call for books is from the freshmen, especially for the Descriptive Geometry, the supply of which is exhausted at the Co-operative Society store.

Almost \$1000 worth of books, drawing instruments, etc., have been handled by the T. C. A. since the first of October. This amount already exceeds the sales for all of last year by more than \$300. The Employment Bureau has been running want ad advertisements in the leading Boston newspapers from time to time so that jobs are coming in all the time.

FRESHMAN TUG OF WAR PRACTICE BEGINS TODAY

MANY CHANGES OCCUR IN FACULTY

Vacancies Filled by Promotion And New Instructors

The changes in the Institute faculty this year extend into practically all departments and rival in numbers the changes in the student body itself. Exclusive of student instructors, there are seventy-five alterations in the instructing staff. Seven full, five associate, and twelve assistant professorships have been filled, and nineteen new instructors have been named. Thirty-three men have left the staff.

In Course I, Civil and Sanitary Engineering, H. L. Bowman has been promoted from instructor to assistant professor.

In Course II, Mechanical Engineering, the changes are as follows: C. W. Berry, H. W. Hayward, and J. C. Riley have been promoted from associate to full professors. J. J. Eames has been advanced from instructor to assistant professor, and James Holt, E. F. Nelson, and C. L. Svenson have been added as instructors. I. A. Stearns, T. S. Derr, and A. L. Hamilton, former instructors, have left the Institute.

Drawing Has Most Changes

Courses III and XII now combined into the Mining, Metallurgy, and Geology Department report the following changes: W. F. Jones has been promoted from instructor to assistant professor and H. E. McKinstrey has been made an instructor. J. G. Barry has left the Institute.

The Department of Architecture Professor C. H. Peabody, former head of the department, has retired, and has been made professor emeritus, and Professor J. R. Jack takes his place. H. W. Gardner is now a full professor, having been promoted from associate. F. A. Magon has been added as an instructor. S. R. H. Codman, R. H. Doane, E. Putnam and G. B. Brigham, former instructors, have left the Institute.

Course VIII Has Lost Many

Course V, Chemistry, has had numerous changes. Professor H. M. Smith and Assistant Professor W. C. Schumb have entered the department. P. E. Mueler, J. W. Phelan, and R. E. Wilson have been changed from assistant to associate professors and

F. R. Kneeland is advanced from instructor to assistant professor. T. S. Pitre and N. P. Woodward have been made instructors. Associate Professor E. B. Spear has resigned and instructors L. B. Smith and Louise P. Johnson have left the Institute.

In Course VI, Electrical Engineering there have been four changes. C. W. Ricker has been promoted from instructor to assistant professor. Instructors B. O. Burlingame, J. Kaufman, and J. W. B. Kennard have left the Institute.

Course VIII has lost a large number of men. D. L. Webster, assistant professor, and R. R. Chamberlain, A. C. Hardy, F. C. Hoyt, F. L. Hunter, S. A. Norton, H. H. Palmer, and T. E. Shea, instructors, have left the department. M. D. Hersey and J. A. Clark, associate professor and instructor, respectively, and R. B. Lindsay and P. B. Taylor have been added.

Name Directors For X-A Stations

There are two changes in Course X, Chemical Engineering. Professor R. J. Haslam and Instructor R. F. Tenney have been added to the department.

In Course X-A the following have been appointed. Assistant Professor D. W. Wilson is Director of the Buffalo Station of the School of Engineering Practice, while Assistant Professor P. G. Woodward and W. G. Whitman are Directors of the Everett and Bangor Stations, respectively. Two instructors have been added to the department, F. P. Baker and W. P. Ryan.

In the Department of Economics, D. S. Tucker has been promoted from instructor to assistant professor. C. H. Reed and C. E. Taylor have been added as instructors, while H. E. Packard is leaving.

Instructors P. T. Kepner and C. W. Pipkin have been appointed in the Department of English and History. Four men are leaving this department; F. V. Scholes, H. P. Boal, E. P. Chase, and F. L. Hewett.

Three men have left the Language Department, namely, Instructors R. R. Cawley, L. J. Cook, and A. W. Hanson.

In the Department of Mathematics, C. L. E. Moore has been promoted from associate to full professor, while W. J. Ingram and K. L. Wildes have been added as instructors.

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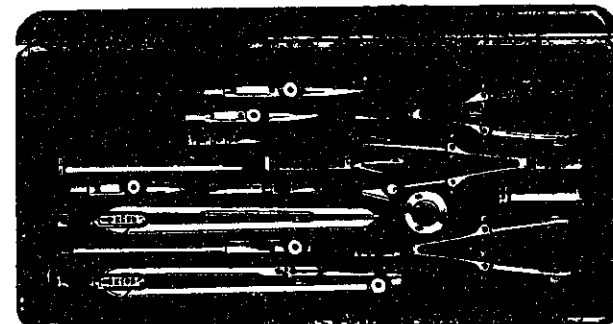
