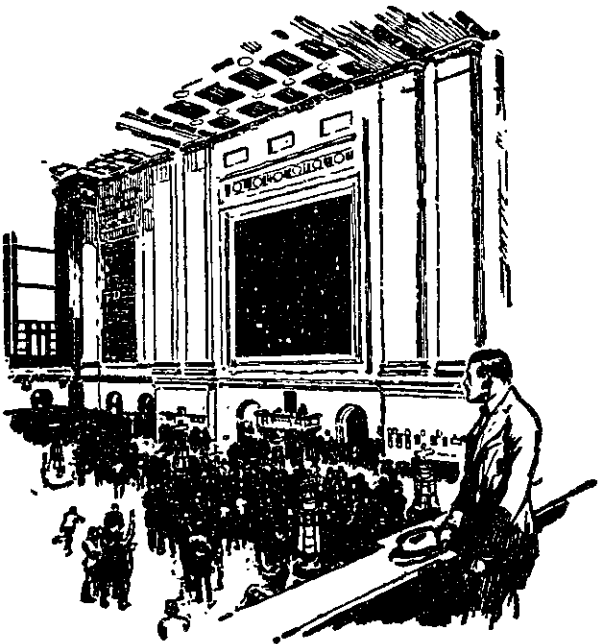

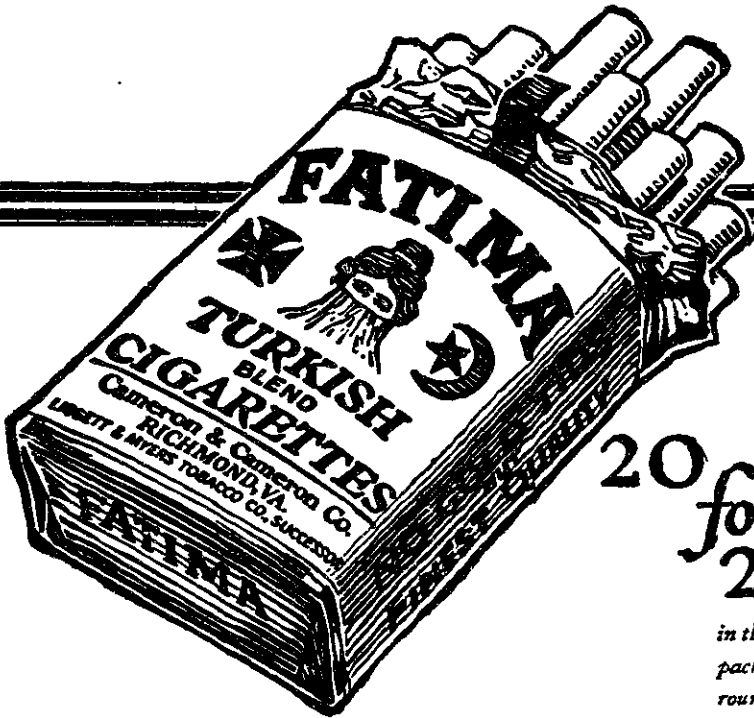

RIFLE CLUB HAS NEW
RANGE IN CAMBRIDGE

Marksmen Practice at Armory
Until New Gallery is Built—
First Trip of Year to Wake-
field Saturday

ORGANIZATION MEETING SOON

President Dean of the Rifle Club,
announced Wednesday that the Club
would be organized soon and would
begin practice. The question as to
where the club will shoot, now that
the gallery has been removed, will be
answered either by using the Cam-
bridge Armory as a temporary gal-
lery, or, if possible, by having a new
range built. Money for this has not
been definitely appropriated, but it
has been approved by the Bursar that
a 75 foot range for rifles and a 60
foot range for pistol shooting be built.

This year the team will be a sepa-
rate organization from the club.
Sophomores will be eligible for three
vacant positions, but freshmen will
not be allowed to compete. They
will have a team of their own, under
the assistant manager of the Rifle
Club. The schedules have not been
made up for either team, but it is
understood that the usual colleges
will be met by the varsity and a
number of freshmen and prep school
teams by the freshmen.

The first trip of the Rifle Club
will take place next Saturday to
Wakefield. All members and others
interested are invited to go, and can
reach there on Boston and Maine
trains. Open air shooting in all
classes will take place under the di-
rection of the Marines.
