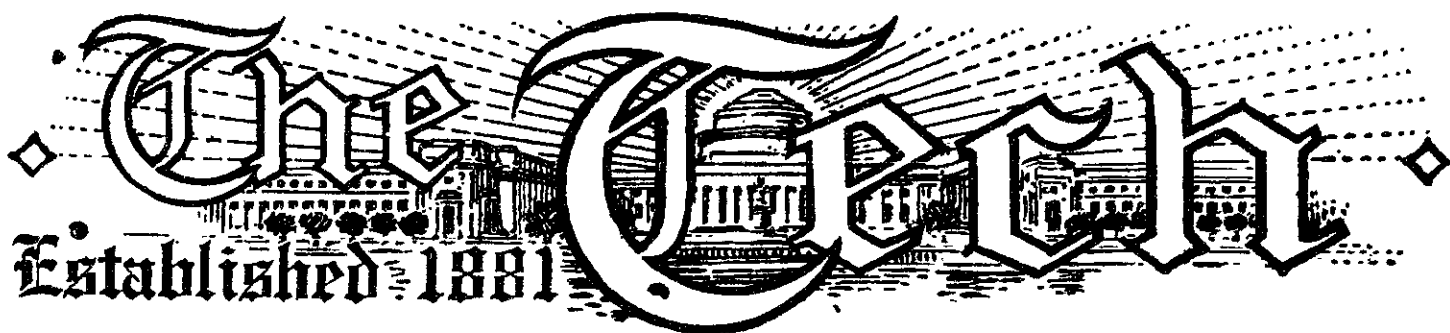

BURSAR LAUDS STUDENT TAX

At a joint meeting of the Alumni
Advisory Council on Athletics and the
M. I. T. A. A., held Sunday afternoon
in Walker, a unanimous vote was cast
in favor of introducing new budget
forms and building a hockey rink in
the old sea-plane hangar.

The meeting was opened by Dr.
Rockwell who extended a word of
welcome. Dean Burton followed him
with a short speech on Field Day
events. He also gave an historical
sketch telling of the old time rushes
and the institution of the Field Day
program. Following him, Bursar
Ford gave an explanation of how the
student tax was divided and the
amount apportioned to athletic ac-
tivities. His report gave the man-
agers of the various teams a clear
insight of the system used and also
gave the budget committee figures on
which to base their work for the
coming year.

Mr. Ford also spoke in praise of
the men of the Class of '17 who insti-
tuted the tax as the step of greatest
importance in the advancement of ath-
letics.

BIG WALKER SMOKER

HEAR CORRECT TIME
SERVICE IN WALKER

Radio Society Provides Ampli-
fication System — Arlington
Can Be Heard All Over Main
Dining Hall

SIGNALS START AT 12.55

Correct time service will be ren-
dered the student body tomorrow in
the main dining hall, Walker Mem-
orial, when the Radio Society puts
into operation an amplifying system
for receiving Arlington, Va. The
signals start coming at 12.55 and last
until 1 o'clock.

Through the courtesy of the Atlan-
tic Radio Company, Boston, a Mag-
navox, or loud speaking telephone,
and four stages of amplification, have
been placed in the movie booth, above
the entrance to the hall. This tele-
megaphone will be connected through
the Cambridge Telephone Exchange
with the society's receiving set in
building 35. The signals as they
come from the air will be amplified
so as to be heard all over the hall.

The signals consist of dots every
second for five minutes, except the
29th and 55th to 59th seconds, which
are skipped. At ten seconds to 1
o'clock the dots cease and at the ex-
act stroke of one, one long dash is
given.

During the lunch hour of the first
few days the service is in operation,
officers of the society will be on hand
to sign up any new men who wish to
become members.

HARRIERS HOLD RUN

Cross-Country Work Includes
Hare and Hounds Race

The finest showing in recent years
was made by the Institute harriers
last Saturday afternoon in the first
run of the season, a hare and hounds
chase.

Dressing facilities were provided in
the old Belmont High School, and
shortly after 2 o'clock Coach Kanaly
started from in front of the public li-
brary with the men who had had the
least training this year, including
most of the aspirants for the frosh
team. Several minutes later an inter-
mediate group left the library and
shortly after them the varsity men,
under the leadership of Captain Mac-
Mahon, started out. About two miles
from the start the three groups
merged and a half mile further the
first men to start turned back, while
the stronger men continued and com-
pleted the full 6 1/2 mile course.

Coach Kanaly stated that he was
well pleased with the turn out and
that the men ran very close to the
desired set times.

George B. Tuohey Sends His Latest Talent From
Abroad to Annual Affair—Star Pro-
fessional Boxers Perform

TICKETS WILL BE DISTRIBUTED TODAY

Professional wrestlers from abroad, under the management
of George B. Tuohey, local wrestling promoter, are going to give
exhibition matches at the big All-Technology Smoker, Friday,
October 13, in Walker Memorial. It is through the kindness of
Mr. Tuohey that the men will be able to appear.

The next feature of the smoker is a professional boxing bout
between Frank "Nappy" Boutelier and Jack "Twin Sullivan, for-
mer world middle weight champion. This bout will be followed
by one between Willy Corbett, who has won a consecutive string
of 22 victories, and his sparring partner, Bobby Rhodes. O'Mal-
ley, Olympic champion, was forced to go an extra round recently
in order to defeat Rhodes. These two professional bouts will be
followed by an amateur clash between Captain Addicks of the
Institute's boxing team, and Longmaid, Technology's 145 pound
champion.

The referee will be James H. Fitzpatrick and the judges, Doc-
tor Rowe and Frank Kanaly. Mike Hoar, famous New England
dash man and keeper of the athletic grounds, is to time the
bouts.

Admission to the huge affair will be by ticket only, and
these are to be given out in the main lobby on Wednesday,
Thursday and Friday, from 12 to 2 o'clock. The number is lim-
ited to 2800. This ticket system was found to be satisfactory
last year in handling the big crowds and the idea of running the
affair in relays will also be retained.

The remaining part of the program consists of supper from
5 to 7 o'clock, movies, vaudeville acts, a speech by Dean Burton,
free smokes and short talks on Technology's undergraduate activi-
ties by men in charge of them. In every way the committees
in charge of the various parts of the program have endeavored to
produce a smoker which shall set a precedent for those to follow.
