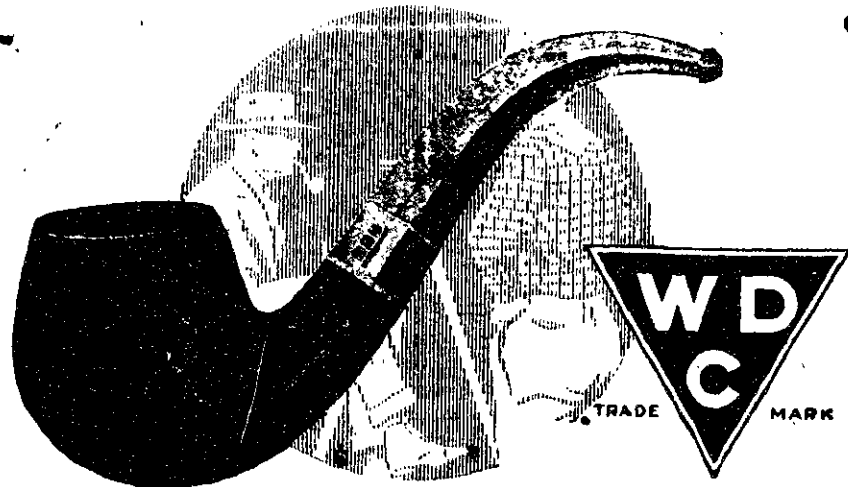

reading a letter from Major Briggs, an Alumnus and member of the Council, who pointed out the main weakness in the manager's way of conducting the teams and gave a word of advice for its correction. Dr. Rowe then made it clear that only Institute teams, recognized by the A. A. were eligible to apply to the budget committee for financial support. He then gave a brief explanation of the purpose of the Council, which holds meetings on the first Wednesday of each month at the Engineers' Club, and he furthermore urged that all managers or other men wishing to consult this body of advisors be present at these meetings which after 7:30 o'clock are open to such men. He insisted that all managers and captains of the various teams read that part of the pamphlet on Athletic Rules and Regulations, prepared by the Council, which pertains to their conduct and policy. In conclusion, Dr. Rowe urged a pamphlet with the schedules of the meets of all teams be prepared and sent on to the Alumni and a special offer of season tickets sent as a means of increasing the funds for athletics at the Institute.

Urge Support of T. A. C.

Frank Kanaly then announced that freshmen measurements would start next Monday and continue until November 1 in room 375 Walker Memorial. During this period only freshmen will be allowed to sign up for one of the listed sports (track, fencing, soccer, wrestling, boxing and gym) for the full term. Men choosing any one of these sports and signing with Mr. Kanaly during this period will be allowed to substitute that sport in place of the regular gymnasium work.

At the close of the meeting an announcement was made by Bursar Ford, suggesting that the sea plane hangar be converted into a hockey rink. He explained that some heat mains from the power plant lay just under the rink causing the ice to be constantly soft and in an unserviceable condition. His suggestion was immediately acted upon and plans launched to realize the suggestion.

In connection with athletic affair, it was urged that all students support the new Technology Athletic Club, which is an entirely separate organization from the M. I. T. A. A. by securing one dollar membership. It admits a member to all meets and games held on the campus in which a Technology team takes part.

Among others who have returned are Harvey, E. D. Deming, E. Plaisted, W. N. Webster, A. D. Smith, who broke the technology record for the 440 during the meet with Exeter last spring, H. J. Bruner and A. R. Holden. Enough new men have shown up to complete the number for a strong relay squad. No other meets besides the Field Day meet have been arranged except the fall handicap.

Other features of the Sophomore preparations are the organized cheering and the new Sophomore band. A competition for cheer-leaders will be started soon in charge of Brantingham. J. A. Pennypacker is leader of the movement to put the band in shape to lead the support for the Sophomore teams. Take-offs on popular songs will be used to supply the musical program. F. O. Billings, Sophomore class president has promised funds for incidental expenses. Further details concerning all events will be announced at the Sophomore Class meeting today.

GENERAL FAYOLLE VISITS INSTITUTE

General Emile Fayolle, commander of the first American army troops to fight on the battlefields of France, and now, as a representative of Marshal Foch touring the eastern part of the country after attending the American Legion convention in Cleveland, was a visitor at the Institute Friday.

At his own request to visit the Technology buildings, General Fayolle was shown through all the departments, expressing a profound interest in the work being conducted. He was received by Professor H. P. Talbot, chairman of the administrative committee, Professor E. B. Wilson, Registrar Walter Humphreys and Dean A. E. Burton.

Professor Wilson and Colonel Christian, of the Military Science Department, conducted the General through the buildings. After leaving the Institute, General Fayolle proceeded to Harvard University where he was guest of honor, lunching with President Lowell of Harvard.

In the evening he addressed over a thousand members of the Harvard faculty and members of the Harvard Union. In his talk, he said that he would bear with him, on his return to closer the bonds between French universities and those of America.

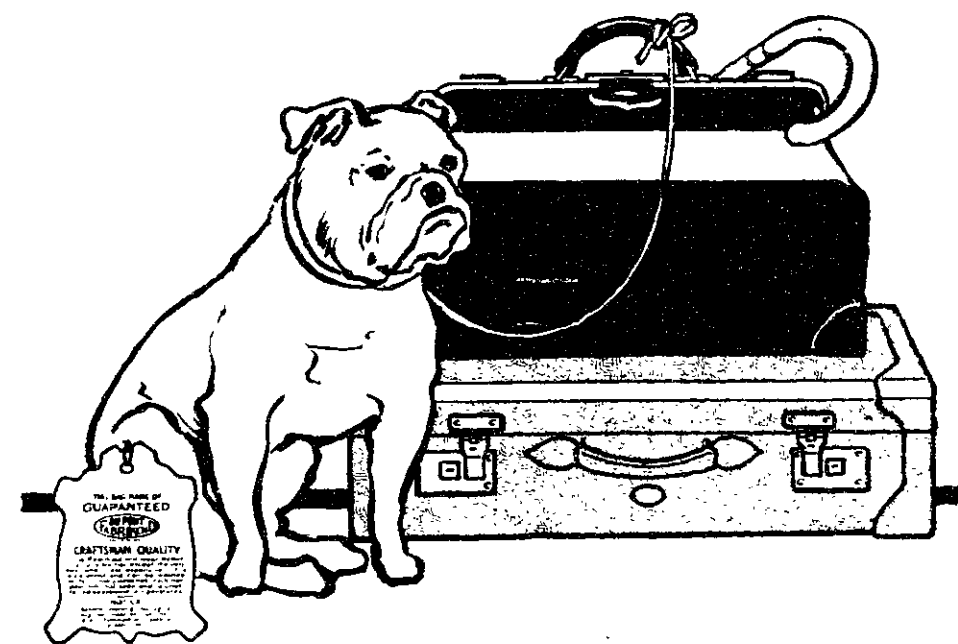
