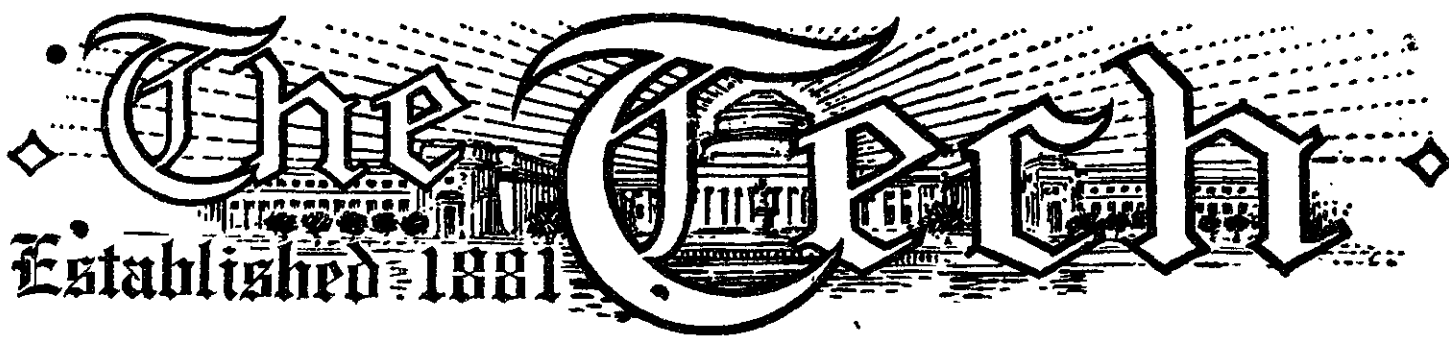

NO DUES—NO ASSESSMENTS

Registration of members in the Technology Republican Club is being carried on today. All Republicans in the Institute are urged to sign up. There will be no dues or assessments of any kind. The club will hold a rally at which nationally prominent men in the Republican party will speak. The date for a mammoth torchlight parade has been set, Thursday, October 28.

The Massachusetts State Republican Committee held a dinner at Young's Hotel last Monday, October 11, for the Republican representatives of colleges around Boston, for the purpose of forming an intercollegiate club of all of the colleges in New England. At this dinner Chairman Hall gave a speech in which he emphasized the desirability of organizing the college Republican clubs under one central head.

Torchlight Rally

The executive committee of the club is composed of one member from each college in the club: Robert Quimby of Boston University, Rollin F. Officer '22 of Technology, R. W. Eldridge of Tufts, and John N. Hamlin of Harvard. This committee is empowered to decide on all of the activities of the club and is responsible for the carrying on of all campaigning in the colleges. They will have charge of the intercollegiate section in the torch light parade and all other activities. The club has the support of the Republican State Committee.

The torchlight parade will have representatives from all classes of life.

Two Cups Donated

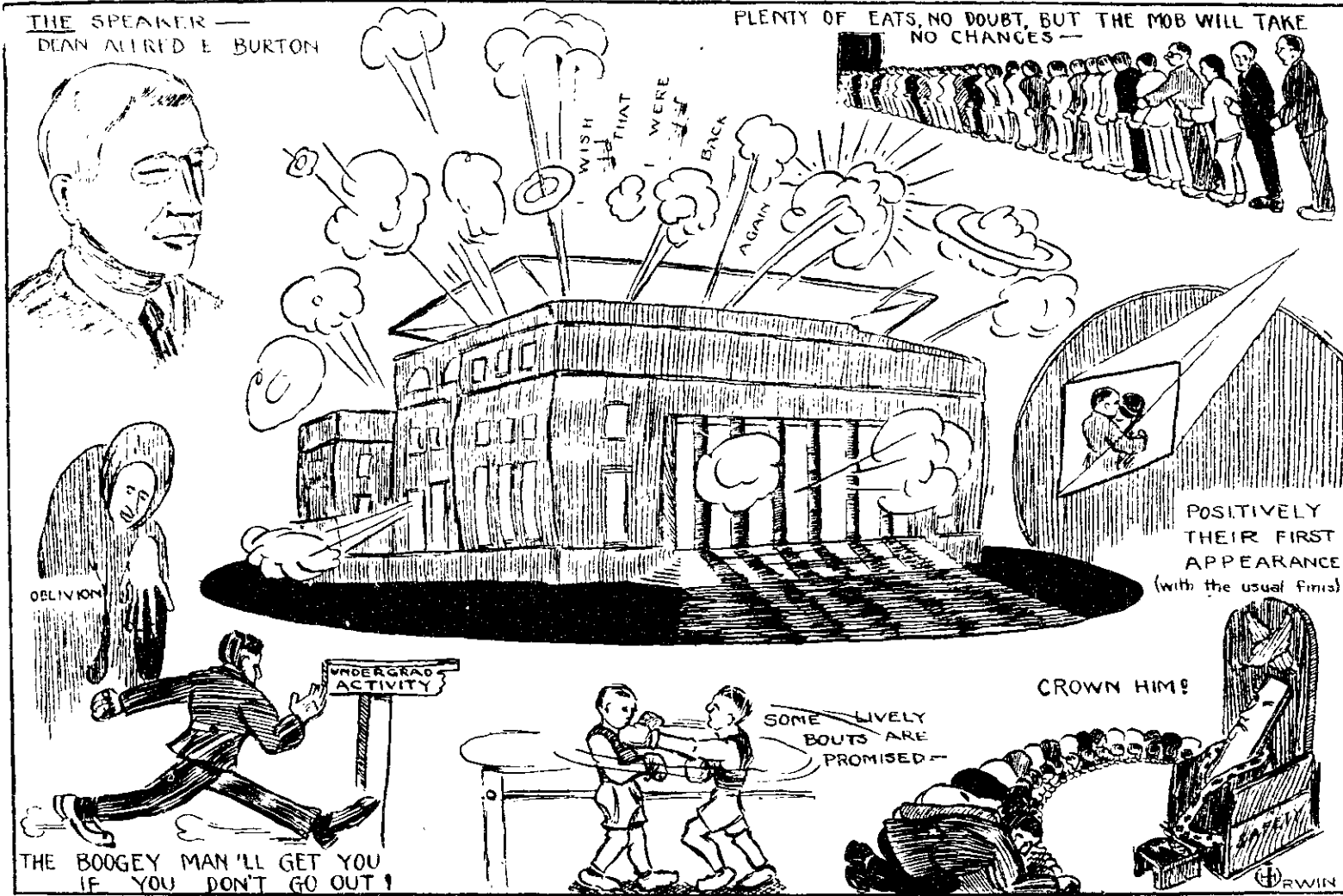

STUDY AUDIONS

Members of Radio Society Hear
Address on Vacuum Tubes

The first professional society to hold a smoker this year was the Radio Society. At their meeting Wednesday evening two speakers presented the first number of the program which has been planned for the year. In the north hall of Walker Memorial, about 75 members of the society heard Mr. C. S. Dellenbaugh, head of the Research work of the Department of Electrical Engineering at the Institute, who chose as his subject "Vacuum Tubes." He traced the development of the vacuum tube in radio work through the investigations of Edison, Fleming and De Forest up to its present stage.

After his address a general discussion was followed by the address of Lieutenant Watson of the Department of Military Science at the Institute. Lieutenant Watson showed the peculiar need of the government for technically trained men for the Signal Corps, and explained the present R. O. T. C. plan by which men taking the advanced work at the Institute would receive a commission in the reserve corp upon graduation.

The president, H. R. Kurth '21, welcomed the new members and the vice president, C. A. Clarke '21, explained the new system for the operation of the society's station.

COURSE VI-A EXTENDED

Special Training in Business
Courses Now Possible

Arrangements have been completed between the officials of the General Electric Company and Technology, whereby students in the Senior and post-graduate years of Course VI-A may get special training on turbines in the Schenectady plant, on high tension transformers at Pittsfield and on electric railway equipment at the Erie plant. The opportunities for further practical experience have been further extended by including accounting, sales and advertising departments. This will enable a student to specialize in other than strictly engineering subjects during his last year in the co-operative course, if he so desires.

The members of group A, junior year of the course, who are at Lynn this term, were addressed by Mr. A. R. Stubbs, vice-president of the first National Bank of Boston upon the subject "The Business End of the Engineering Profession." This is the first of a series of lectures to be held in the assembly room of the new VI-A Club house in Lynn.

On Friday the new VI-A club house at 95 Newbury street, will be duly opened by a housewarming. A program of stunts has been arranged including a repertoire from Tech Show 1920 by Frank Gage.
