

FORM GOLF CLUB

Start Fall Tournament Next Week At Winchester

A golf club is being formed at Technology. For a long time some of the men have felt that such a thing was necessary as there are many golfers here who do not belong to a country club in the vicinity. The athletic association has therefore sanctioned a committee whose duty it is to form the club.

The Winchester Country Club has generously consented to grant playing privileges to the members of the club. Anyone in school is eligible and the committee hopes to get at least one hundred members this year. The golf club will organize a golf team which it hopes will be recognized by the athletic association. Matches will be played with other colleges and golf clubs. A Fall Tournament will be run next week, October 18 to 22 by the club. It will be played at the Winchester Country Club and will consist of thirty-six holes medal play. Prizes will be given to the winner and runner up. The men making the best twelve scores will form the golf team for this fall.

Although the schedule has not yet been definitely arranged it is expected that it will include meets with Yale, Harvard, Dartmouth, the Massachusetts Aggies, Amherst, Williams, and Tufts. All of these games will be played in the new Boston arena.

This year there will be a freshman hockey team which will have matches with the various prep school teams around Boston, such as Exeter, Andover, Milton, and possibly a game can be arranged with St. Marks. Competition for assistant managers will begin shortly before December first when it is expected that the first call will be made for candidates for both teams.

EIGHT MEMBERS OF RIFLE CLUB COMPETE AT WAKEFIELD

Rifle practice and competitions at Wakefield, last Saturday and Tuesday, were attended by eight members of the Rifle Club.

Shooting was done at all ranges, thirty caliber guns being used throughout the matches. Representatives from all the Eastern Colleges were present, and among the contestants were three members of the American Olympic Team, and two members of the A. E. F. team.

Technology had several good entries, but owing to lack of practice so far, took no prizes. S. Hall '22, and C. A. Chase '22, shot in a pistol match, using 45 caliber guns.

The Marines, who are in charge of the range paid for all expenses of its upkeep and use, while ammunition and rifles were supplied by the army and navy.

So far as actual practice at Technology or work on the proposed range is concerned, nothing has been done.

The freshman relay team, with about six promising candidates, continues to show up well. As only 12 men have reported for practice, the coach states that he would like to have more men turn out every afternoon next week.

Men Badly Needed from Class of '23 for Field Day

Dean Burton gave the Sophomores a final word in their class meeting Wednesday noon in 10-250 in his appeal to the members of the class to turn out for the various Field Day activities and prevent a stain of two years defeat from following them the rest of their lives. Pointing out that only four classes in the history of the Institute do not have their numerals engraved on the famous Field Day cup, the dean mentioned that these classes are to this day often reminded of that fact.

F. O. Billings, President of the Class of '23, presided at the meeting supplementing the various speakers in their attempts to bring out material in quantity and quality from which winning teams may be formed.

Coaches Baldwin and Brantingham spoke for the football team and encouraged men to turn out—especially those with previous experience. D. C. Sayre '23, spoke for the crew and announced the plans for having both the second and first crews race on the coming Field Day. He also pointed out a lack of men now in practice and training. R. P. Bolster '23, last year's freshmen relay captain, placed part of the blame of last year's defeat in track to the fact that a very late start was made and urged all men with ability in this line to start work at once so that the many vacant positions on the squad may be soon filled. The greatest lack in men was shown by Manager P. A. Herrick '23, of the Tug-O-War team who issues a call for 50 more men. They do not necessarily have to be experienced or weighty, but must have perseverance, fight and strength, according to Manager Herrick.

FORMER PREP SCHOOL STARS OUT FOR FRESHMAN FOOTBALL

1924 Gridiron Combination Developing Into Fast Outfit

The freshman football squad which has shown much promise is beginning to round into shape. The line is heavy and a few experienced and fast men are out for backfield position. The coaches say that the entire squad promises to work well together, although the men are weak at forward passes.

At the first scrimmage which will be held Wednesday a better line will be gotten on the several former prep school stars who are out, among them are Lehan from St. John's; Davidson, who played on the University of Michigan freshman team; Bowers from Exeter; Kemp from Pasadena; High, and Evans from Dean Academy. It is not too late for men to come out and all men interested are requested by the management to report.

The freshman crew outlook is very good but more candidates and candidates for freshman manager are needed. Men interested in either the Varsity or freshman managership are asked by those in charge to report at the B. A. A. boathouse Monday afternoon.

Although most of the men who have come out for the tug of war practice appear good, the coaches emphasize the need of more material with which to work. About 20 men have reported so far and the coaches say that the number is not enough to build a good team from. The men are working daily at Tech Field.

GRAPPLERS TURN OUT TO DISCUSS PLANS FOR YEAR

Efforts are being made to secure "Cyclone" Burns to coach the team. Burns is a professional in the heavy-weight class and has been among the foremost wrestlers in the country for many years. He coached the Tabor Academy wrestlers and the Andover team for some time.

The outlook for the freshman team is particularly good. As large squad has reported among which are two men from the Andover team.

Last year the Institute was represented by one of the best mat teams in New England. Under the leadership of Captain Bill Russell they won all their matches, Yale going down to defeat for the first time in seven years.

a year for 5 years. He graduated from Course IV, Architecture, and is at present engaged in the cotton business in New Bedford. He holds the record of 41 min. 36 sec., for the Wakefield course, and in 1913 was one of the main supports of the team, finishing twelfth in the I. C. A. A. A. run, third in the Holy Cross dual meet and eighth in the N. E. I. A. A. event.

Benson is also a former harrier leader. He graduated from Course I and is at present located in Melrose. The opponents for the Technology aggregation on October 30, have not as yet been definitely picked, but from present indications either Dartmouth or the University of Maine will be booked for the date.

Coach Kanaly stated that the meeting this afternoon would be very important and it was necessary that every track and cross-country man should be present. He said that if the men found it necessary to attend the late meeting they would be away in plenty of time to be present at the opening of the smoker.

All Belmont runs in the future will be from the New High School, where the men have better dressing facilities.

Squad Shows Improvement

Improvement to a very considerable extent was noticeable when the cross-country men ran over the Belmont course on Tuesday, for the second time this year. The work of the freshmen was especially commendable, according to Coach Kanaly, and the varsity is fast rounding into shape.

Especially noticeable at this time is the work of Robbins, Flanders, Hendrie, Sanborn, Hennessy and Walker. Flanders' showing last Tuesday, when he ran two 10 mile races inside of four hours, winning the first and capturing the time prize in the second, shows that he is in excellent condition. His judgment in entering both races is open to criticism, his times of 58 minutes 45 seconds in the former race and Lowell and 1 hour, 2 minutes and forty seconds at Fitchburg, indicated that he was able to stand pushing.

Hennessy is running better than he ever ran before, while Captain McMahon is in excellent form for this time of year.

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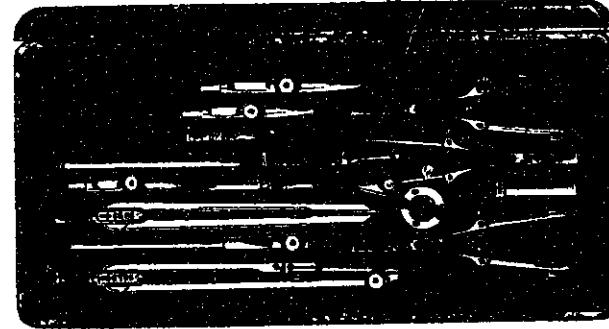
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
