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DARTMOUTH BEATS SOCCER TEAM 2-1

Eleven Outplays Hanoverians in First Intercollegiate Contest But Breaks Favor Green Combination

SOUZA KICKS GOAL

Dartmouth turned back the Technology Soccer Team, in its first intercollegiate tilt, Saturday at Tech Field to the tune of 2 to 1. Technology outplayed the Green eleven but the breaks favored the Dartmouth outfit. Technology's forwards did not seem to be alive until the second half but then played with a rush that kept Tobin, the Green goal, busy during the entire period. Two easy tries for goals were stopped by freak plays. Ruiz and Macorra shone for Technology while Caswell was the star for the Hanoverians.

On Friday, Dartmouth easily outplayed the fast Harvard team trouncing the Crimson by five goals to one.

During the first five minutes of play, Technology held the ball at the Dartmouth end of the field but Dartmouth took the offensive and for some time it was rushed from one end of the lot to the other.

On a corner kick by Arthachinca, nothing was accomplished, but soon after, Macorra took the ball down the left side to the goal, where Tobin stopped him, and kicked to the other side of the field. It was thrown in, and M. I. T. rushed it to the goal again, but could not score.

Dartmouth Scores First

Dartmouth took the ball up to the Technology end, some seventy yards, but Macorra rushed it down the left, and was only prevented from scoring when Tobin fell on the ball in front of the goal.

In the last three minutes of the period, on a corner kick by Carroll, Smith drove the ball for what appeared at first to be a goal, the kick missing the side post by a few inches.

In the second half the Technology men seemed to be warmed up, and played a far better game than in the first half. Atahualpa was the mainstay of the defense, and Ruiz and Macorra showed clever offensive team work.

Technology Forwards Wake Up

At the opening of the half Thomas took a free kick for Dartmouth on Technology's thirty yard line. Fletcher ran up and rushed the ball through for a goal. A few minutes later Technology had a free kick which was taken by Luykx. The Dartmouth men, throughout the half played forward, and tried to hold the game on the Technology end of the field. Ruiz and Macorra, broke through the Green defense, and again and again the Dartmouth goal was threatened.

Dartmouth Goal Threatened

Several minutes later when the ball was up to Dartmouth's thirty yard line, Souza drove a long kick through the goal, making the only score of the day for the Red and Gray.

It looked as though another goal would be scored when Luykx made a kick from almost the same position, near the end of the quarter. The ball struck the top bar, however, and bounced back. After this, Ruiz took the ball up the left and passed it to Arthachinca, who made a good bid for a score but Tobin's fast work stopped it.

T.A.C. STARTS ITS MEMBERSHIP DRIVE

Offers Free Seats for Members at All Technology Athletic Meets—100% Enrolment Is Aim of Officers

DUES ARE ONE DOLLAR

The enrolment of the entire student body of the Institute is the goal set by the governing board of the Technology Athletic Club for its membership campaign. The whole week will be devoted to this effort. The board plans to approach every man in the Institute through one of three divisions of the student body. One man will be in charge of canvassing the dormitories; another, the fraternities, and a third, the general undergraduate body. Desks will be set up in the lobby for the convenience of subscribers. The fee is one dollar.

Members of the club will have access to the best seats in all Technology athletic contests, and will have a vote in the annual meeting of the club. The club will purchase at least two thirds of the seats at all meets on Tech Field, all indoor contests in the Walker Memorial, and all Technology swimming meets held in the Boston Y. M. C. pool. These seats will be open to members of the T. A. C. In cases where the seating capacity is limited first choice will go to the earliest arrivals.

For Field Day, November 5, T. A. C. is going to purchase one thousand seats, which will be available to members without charge. Seniors and Sophomores will occupy one-half of this block of seats, and Juniors and freshman the other half. These seats, which are in the center of the grand stands will comprise the cheering section.

Committees Named

At the present time all committees are working toward one end—a 100 per cent. enrolment, but at the beginning of next week, each committee will take up its own work. According to the temporary plan, the committees will be six in number, publicity, entertainment, membership, a committee for the reception of visiting teams, an investigating committee and a committee on arrangements.

The officers for the current year are: president, R. F. Officer '21, president of the M. I. T. A. A., and former manager of hockey; vice-president, Richard McKay '21, former manager of swimming; secretary, A. E. Pew '22, of the crew and gym teams; and treasurer, Frank Maconi '21, the originator of the T. A. C. These men constitute the Executive Committee. In the present campaign L. L. Stuart '21 is the chairman in charge of memberships from the general student body, W. H. Noyes '22, for fraternities, and G. P. Schumacker Jr. '21, for the dormitories.

FRESHMAN PHYSICAL EXAMS GIVEN IN ROOM 335 WALKER

Appointments made in the various drawing rooms for freshmen physical exams refer to those given by Mr. Kanaly in Walker 335 and should not be confused with the medical exams given by the Institute clinic is Kanaly's warning. During the past week, there have been many men to miss their exams and seek another appointment in order that they may have a chance for the Cabot medals which are awarded to the five men whose physical improvement is best during the school year. However, only one appointment can be made and therefore, Kanaly says, every man should make a special effort to report to him at the time scheduled for his appointment.

At this time, men will be able to sign up for any one of the following sports as a substitute for gym work, track, boxing, wrestling, swimming, soccer, fencing, and the gym team. Any freshman not having a physical examination this fall is not eligible for the Cabot medal competition, nor will he be able to substitute any one of the above sports unless he signs up in Walker room 335 on or before the noon of November 4th.

35 ENTER GOLF TOURNAMENT

35 entries have already been received for the fall tournament of the recently organized Golf Club, which will be held at the Winchester Country Club from October 18 to 22. The men making the twelve best scores in 36-hole medal play contests will form a team which may compete against other colleges.

FRESHMEN ORGANIZE

The freshmen have put into operation a temporary class organization of which J. C. Bower is president and W. J. Pierce secretary. This has for its sole purpose the defeat of the Sophomores on Field Day. Members of the committee have been chosen one from each freshman section, and through the committee the officers hope to have a means of rapid cooperation with the class. This is by no means a permanent organization, and will lose its present power after the class elections.

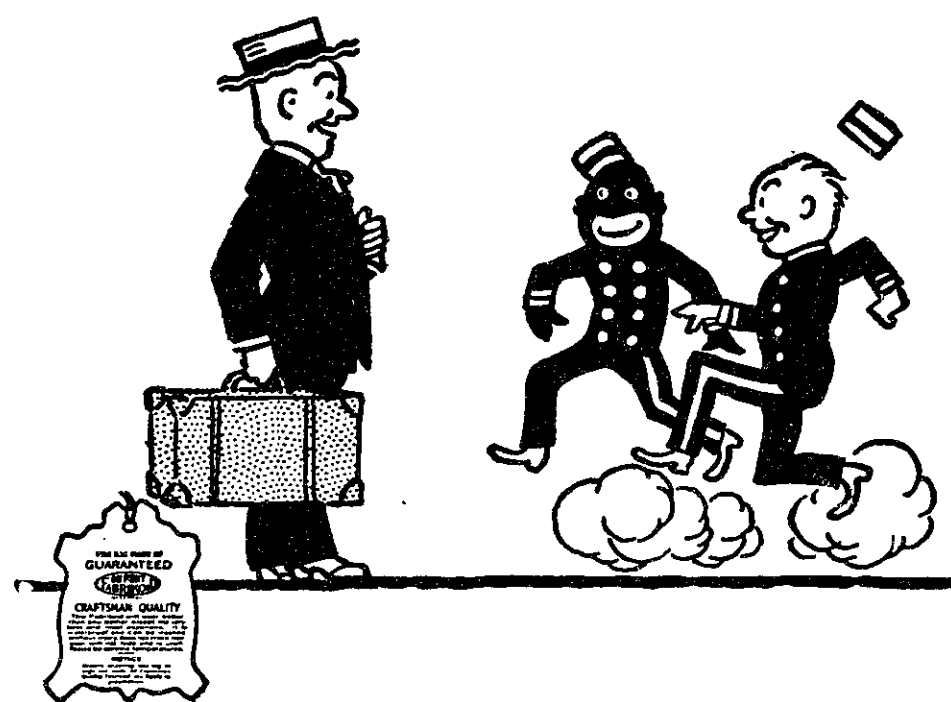
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SECOND CREWS MAY ENTER FIELD DAY COMPETITIONS
